\$100,000 IN WHEAT LOANS AVAILABLE

The first \$100,000 of the \$10,000,000 loan promised to the Northwest Wheat Growers' association by the War Finance corporation was received Wednesday by George J. Jewett, general manager of the organization, at Spokane. The sum received is declared to be sufficient to meet immediate needs.

The \$1000,000 fund is for financing growers and for export operations of the Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana Wheat Growers' association. Supplementing it are loans aggregating nearly \$2,000,000 from Spokane, Seattle and Eastern banking institutions which have been distributed in advance to the growers.

"We did not anticipate so much time being necessary for us to secure the

War Finance corporation money," said Jewett. "Consequently we are pressed for funds with which to take care of the advances on wheat receipts which came in at the rate of hundreds of thousands of bushels daily.

"Local banking institutions gave us every assistance and the power to bridge the interval before the government money became available, and our members have these concerns to thank for the fact that our advances nearly kept even with wheat receipts sent in, despite the delay in completing arrangements for the war finance loan."

Lebanon Man Makes Success at Poultry
