

NATION MOURNS AT DEATH OF SENATOR PHILANDER C. KNOX

ern affairs and his loss will be keenly felt.

Because of his experience as secretary of state during an interesting period in the national development of the nation, and his long experience as a member of the senate foreign relations committee, the Pennsylvania senator was peculiarly well equipped to counsel on international matters.

Secretary of State Hughes, Elihu Root, Senator Lodge and Senator Underwood—the American four—all expressed deepest sorrow today over the untimely passing of Senator Knox.

The senator leaves three sons and a daughter. One of the sons, Junior, was in Washington at the time of his father's death. Two other sons, Reed and Hugh S. Knox, with the daughter, Mrs. J. R. Tyndal, were at Valley Forge, Pa., the Knox home. They were notified at once of their father's death and are en route to Washington.

Philander Chase Knox was born in Brownsville, Pa., in 1853. He was graduated from Mount Union college in Ohio in 1872, receiving a master's degree, and later the degree of doctor of laws. He also had honorary degrees from Yale, Pennsylvania and Pittsburg universities, and from Washington and Jefferson, and from Villa Nova college.

He practiced law in Pittsburg between 1875 and 1902. President McKinley named him attorney general and he served in that capacity until 1904, when he was appointed to serve in the vacancy in the senate caused by the death of Matthew S. Quay.

He was later elected, to fill Quay's unexpired term and then to a full term of six years.

TOOK STATE POLIO

He resigned from the senate to become secretary of state in the cabinet of President Taft in 1909, in which capacity he served until 1913.

Again elected in 1914 to the senate, he succeeded George T. Oliver, Senator Knox's term of service would have expired in 1923.

During the last pre-convention presidential campaign friends of Senator Knox recognized his long recognized ability, advocated his nomination as a compromise candidate for the presidency, as between Major General Leonard Wood and Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, then the leading Republican candidates.

At that time, however, Knox had begun to fail in health and it was stated by his friends that he preferred not to be proposed. He joined in the Pennsylvania delegation after this decision in supporting the candidacy of Governor Sproule of Pennsylvania.

Sproule, it is believed here, will unquestionably succeed Knox in the senate, for the period of the latter's unexpired term.

When Knox began the practice of law he formed a partnership at Pittsburg with James H. Reed and almost immediately thereafter the firm established a lucrative practice. They had as clients such firms as the Carnegie Steel company, although the clients were not limited to corporations. Knox established

himself as an authority on industrial combinations and acquired a reputation for great legal ability.

PERSUADED TO ACCEPT

At first he declined the attorney generalship under McKinley when it was offered in 1897, but when the offer was renewed he was persuaded to accept.

While attorney general, Knox was subjected to some criticism on the ground that he was not sufficiently active in the prosecution of firms accused of doing business in violation of the anti-trust laws. However, it was under Knox that a suit was filed against the "Beef Trust."

When Knox went into the senate he became a prominent member of the judiciary committee and had an active part in the debates concerning the Panama canal. Part of the time he was chair-

man of the important "steering" committee.

"FAVORITE SON" CANDIDATE

In 1908 he was put forward as a "favorite son" of his state for the Republican presidential nomination and his candidacy attracted considerable attention.

After Taft became president and had installed Knox as secretary of state important diplomatic matters required attention. These included American relations with Japan, and particularly the Latin-American countries.

Knox made a tour of South American countries with the avowed intention of fostering closer and more cordial relations, commercial and political, between Latin America and the United States. Knox was received cordially, and was warmly entertained. Diplomatic principles which he enunciated and put into practice are generally credited with having inaugurated a new epoch in the relations between the northern and southern hemispheres.

FIGURED IN FAR EAST

One of the most important steps taken by Knox when he was secretary of state was his initiation of the movement to "neutralize" the railways of Manchuria. He sent notes to the various world powers suggesting this plan as a remedy

for the tangled railroad situation in Manchuria.

The Knox plan was summarily rejected by Russia and Japan, and, largely because of the opposition of these two nations, the other powers also failed to back the Knox scheme.

The plan of Secretary Knox was for the powers to lend China sufficient funds to buy back the Manchurian railways, the railways to be operated jointly by the powers until such time as China had paid back this loan. The various agreements by which Russia and Japan held the railways of Manchuria provided that they were eventually to be taken back by Japan.

In addition to his membership of the important committee on foreign relations, Knox was chairman of the rules committee and was credited with being an authority on parliamentary questions. He was likewise a member of the committee on interoceanic canals, libraries and territories and insular possessions.

Youth Accused of Holding Up Man And Woman Friend

Alfred Manning, 26, victim of a recent daring highway robbery, seems to have gathered enough experience from that one encounter to guide him in his own career: if the police are correct in their claim that the boy is responsible for the hold-up of Harry C. Mueller and a young woman companion at Twelfth and Market streets on September 11.

Manning was first arrested on a charge of passing an alleged bad check. A check, signed with Mueller's forged name was identified as written by Manning, the police say. Later they learned that in passing the check he had pro-

ceeded for identification at a downtown clothing store a driver's license said to have been taken from Mueller by the robber.

Manning was held up, robbed and shot in the arm by a negro about a month ago. The negro was later arrested and bound over to the grand jury.

Head of O. A. C. Stock Farm, Long Ill, Dies

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 13.—C. E. Robinson, superintendent of the animal husbandry stock farm, died after a long illness. His funeral was held Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Robinson has been with the college for 18 years and has held the position of superintendent for the animal husbandry department for 12 years.

Barge Jams Into Morrison Bridge; Traffic Affected

Street car traffic on the Morrison street bridge was slowed down Wednesday evening shortly after 8 o'clock when the tug Charles Greiner, towing a barge of sawdust, struck a pier at the west approach to the draw. A locking device which holds the draw in place when it is closed was broken by the impact, allowing the east end of the draw to swing slightly out of line.

The extent of the damage will not be determined until an examination of the structure is made today by engineers. It is not believed that the bridge is in any danger as a result of the accident.

The tug, belonging to the Hackett Dredging company, was towing sawdust for the Northwestern Electric company up the river when it struck the pier.

Street cars were obliged to move with care in order to prevent them from jumping the track. A flag man was stationed on the bridge to guide the traffic.

Expectant Mother Kills Her Husband

San Diego, Cal., Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—Walter J. Conley, 25, special policeman at the office of Secretary of State Robert Lansing during the war, is dead here today. He was shot, officers said, by his wife, Ruth Conley, at their home.

Conley had been drinking, according to witnesses, and making threats against his wife, who is an expectant mother. No charge has been placed against Mrs. Conley.

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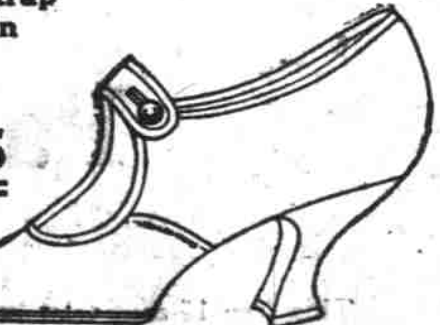
