

CONTRACTOR GETS SENTENCE TO JAIL FOR ROBBING U. S.

H. A. Macauley, local contractor and dealer in iron and steel, was sentenced to serve three months in the Multnomah county jail this morning by Federal Judge Bean after he pleaded guilty to stealing about 77,000 pounds of steel from the government at Fort Stevens.

"It is a very serious offense to steal from the government," said the judge to the contractor, "but owing to the recommendations of the district attorney the court will be lenient."

Last May Macauley purchased some old iron from the government at Fort Stevens and received permission to tear up car rails on an old wharf in order to move the old iron. Macauley loaded the rails and a few other pieces of railroad equipment on a river boat along with the material he had purchased and sold the entire shipment to the Brady equipment company of Portland.

FLEES TO CALIFORNIA

Macauley was in the Brady Equipment company office several weeks ago when a federal agent appeared for him with a warrant, but managed to escape and fled to California. Macauley said he did this in order to raise bail, as he did not want to stay in jail. Macauley returned to Portland later and surrendered.

Macauley is married and has a 7-year-old child. Since his arrest he has been unable to furnish bond. Assistant United States Attorney Lusk told the court the defendant has been reporting faithfully twice a week since his arrest. Lusk said he did not believe Macauley to be a criminal, and requested leniency. The court granted Macauley a two-day stay of execution in which to arrange his business affairs. He admitted the theft to the judge, but said he intended to replace the rails before long with some he had in Washington. The Brady Equipment company has returned the government's stolen property and Macauley has returned part of the \$1500 he received for the shipment.

FIREMAN FINED \$500

Harry A. Nicoll, locomotive fireman on the Southern Pacific, admitted to the court that he had made an unlawful use of a railroad pass and was fined \$500. Nicoll secured a pass from Ogden, Utah, to Oregon for Ole May King, alias Ole May Cummings, under the pretense that she was his wife.

Thomas Downing, alias William Martin, pleaded guilty to a charge of white slavery involving Mrs. Lola Stone, mother of two children. Downing is said to have transported her from Chico, Cal., to Fort Klamath, where he introduced her to a life of shame. Downing's attorney admitted his client lived off the woman's earnings. The court was advised by Assistant United States Attorney Veatch that the woman has now deserted her

husband for a second time and recently was living with the man who was to have been the chief complaining witness against Downing. Judge Bean added a two months' additional county jail sentence to the four months Downing has already served while awaiting trial.

Family of Hunting Victim Win Claims

Salem, Oct. 13.—The state industrial accident commission Wednesday approved the claim of the widow and child of C. E. Herbert of Oakridge, Lane county, killed by a hunter while engaged in work upon the ranch of his employer, J. D. Ash. Lane county rancher and stock man. The employee of Ash were brought within the scope of the workmen's compensation act through special application as required by law. A reserve of \$8417.48 has been set aside to meet the life pension for the widow and the monthly awards to the daughter until she shall reach the age of 16 years.

Another Blamed by Portland Husband

Astoria, Oct. 13.—Charging that his wife is infatuated with another man, F. O. Johnson of Portland filed suit for divorce against Doris E. Johnson. Deserter was given as grounds in a suit by Sarah Shafer against Ernest H. Shafer, and cruelty was charged by Ada Golden against Harry R. Golden. Decrees were granted to La Vina Andriani from Angelo Andriani, Amanda Hamilton from J. R. Hamilton, Florence Buchanan from Chris Buchanan, and Amanda Johnson from August Johnson.

Thanksgiving Day's Vacation Is Reduced

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 13. The way of the university student is getting harder. Hard-headed faculty members have passed a ruling that the usual two day Thanksgiving vacation would be cut to one day, on the theory that a two day break in the routine would destroy the continuity of student efforts. The fact that final examinations for the term are only three weeks after Thanksgiving is said to have caused the edict.

Two in Crash Hurt; Driver Speeds Away

Kalama, Wash., Oct. 13.—An unknown driver in a car bearing Washington license 30372, ran into the car of Peter Clift, Wednesday, breaking the windshield, bruising Mrs. Clift and cutting a gash in the lip of their little 2-year-old daughter which required three stitches. The occupants of the big car, a man and woman, sped on toward Vancouver without stopping.

Farm Waste of Union County Is Saved for Poor

Conservation of waste farm products as a means of caring for the poor and the unemployed in Union county this winter has been worked out by the Union County Ad club, A. W. Nelson, manager of the organization, informed the State Chamber of Commerce today so that other communities over the state could work out a similar program for their individual sections.

The Union County Ad club, which is a combination of all the commercial and civic organizations of La Grande and vicinity, recently appointed an unemployment commission of the heads of the Salvation Army, American Legion, City Welfare commission, Central Labor council and Red Cross.
