

ARMISTICE DAY PARADE WILL BE RECORD BREAKER

Plans Are Made for Turn Out of
All War Veterans; Local Business
Houses to Show Spirit.

Portland's biggest military parade, in which 10,000 of Uncle Sam's fighters will take part, was decided upon Saturday afternoon by the Armistice day committee appointed by Mayor Baker from the various veterans' organizations of the city.

If the committee succeeds in its purpose, Vancouver barracks will be emptied of troops to lengthen the parade; every military or semi-military organization in the city will turn out in force; automobiles plenty will be supplied to carry the feeble veterans of the Mexican war, Civil war and Indian wars, as well as the disabled veterans of the World war who are now in hospitals; and every business house in Portland will be expected to deck its doors.

PARADE IS GENERAL

C. M. Bristol, publicity manager for the parade, said Saturday night: "Portland has not had a real military parade since the war. In every case only part of the organizations have taken part. We are going to get them all out on November 11."

The parade will start at 1:30 p. m. and will last for at least two hours, winding through the principal streets of the downtown district. It will end at the Auditorium, where a monster patriotic mass meeting is planned. American songs will be sung, with a good song leader in charge, after which a few effective speakers will be called to the platform. It is also hoped to have moving pictures of wartime scenes on the battlefield.

ORGANIZATIONS NAMED

Organizations that are expected to take part are: National guard, Grand Army of the Republic, Indian War veterans, Mexican War veterans, Spanish-American War veterans, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Army Nurses corps, disabled veterans, seamstresses of the navy, sailors in port, marines and naval reserve members.

Adjutant General George A. White will be grand marshal of the parade and the following committee will have charge: A. J. Monteth, J. S. Hyatt, F. W. Anderson, Miss Grace Phelps and John A. Beckwith.

Governor Olcott will be asked to review the parade bringing with him state officials and members of the supreme court. County and city officials also will be expected to sit in the reviewing stand.

The committee decided Saturday to do everything in its power to have business houses closed tight for the afternoon as the president has already proclaimed November 11 a legal holiday. Personal letters will be sent to employers of ex-service men.

TO DISPLAY FLAGS

"Every available flag in the city should be waving on that day," said Bristol. "A campaign will be waged to get residences to hang as downtown firms to display flags."

The secretary of the committee has been directed to write to the Oregon State Motorcar association, asking for cooperation in securing enough cars to care for the crippled and aged veterans who are unable to tramp the streets.

Nature Is Obeying Dry Law; Hop and Raisin Output Fall

Washington, Oct. 15.—Nature is obeying the prohibition law, even though the home bootleggers are trying to evade it. The 1931 hops and raisin crop estimates are about 60 per cent of normal.

Hops yielded about 25,000,000 pounds this year as against 35,000,000 last year. Out in California the raisin crop is 125,000 tons, or 60 per cent of last year's yield.

Brewers consumed about 6,000,000 pounds of hops this year, as against 15,000,000 in 1927 and in between the figures show the rapid fall in supply as the dry squads tighten their hand.

On the other hand, exports of hops have increased in proportion. In 1921 some 22,000,000 pounds left the country, whereas in 1927 only 5,000,000 were sent overseas to swell the warburgers.

Piper Nomination Still Held Up; No Action Being Taken

Washington, Oct. 15.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Another week has elapsed without developments concerning the nomination of George U. Piper as collector of customs for the Oregon district, and without definite information as to when Senator Stanford, Piper's chief sponsor, will be here. Stanford has been absent since the present session of congress opened last month.

Senator Jones of Washington, chairman of the senate commerce committee, before which Piper's nomination is pending, is also absent, but is expected later in the month. Ordinary procedure in case of charges against an appointee is appointment of a subcommittee to hear and report upon testimony, which may be either written or oral, information as to the charges is withheld pending the arrival of Chairman Jones. The clerk of the committee is said to be corresponding with the complainants.

lower court and brought up to the supreme court on appeal for final decision well before the date set for the sale of the first bond issues of \$10,000,000, November 30.

With the attorneys and appraisers appointed, it is expected that much of the preliminary work incident to the payment of cash bonus and loans will have been attended to and that it will be possible to begin the disbursement of funds immediately after the cash is delivered on the bond issue, about January 1.

While the applications already on file with the commission are more than enough to absorb the returns from this issue, it will require some time to disburse the fund, and the money from the second issue, which the commission plans to offer for sale the latter part of January, will be forthcoming before the first issue has been completely exhausted.

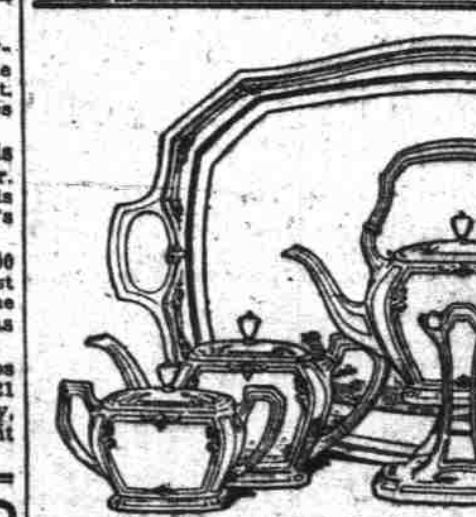
Business Men From Japan Invited to Come to Portland

The chamber sent a message to Tokyo last week inviting the business men to visit Portland during the visit to the United States. The message received by the chamber accepts the invitation and says that at least part of the delegation will visit Portland. The chamber is confident that it will be able to bring the entire party.

FAIR IS INDORSED BY TOURIST BODY; OFFICERS ELECTED

Four New Directors Are Chosen;
W. J. Hofmann Retained as
President; 60 Delegates Present

Because the 1932 exposition will be of vast benefit not alone to Portland and Oregon but to the whole Northwest, the Pacific Northwest Tourist association officers and board of directors unanimously indorsed the fair project at their annual meeting in the green room of the Chamber of Commerce Saturday afternoon.

Officers of the past year were reelected and only four new directors were chosen for the organization. The new directors are Will Wright of Oregon City, who will replace E. E. Brodie; Alderman Fred Cromwell of North Vancouver, who will replace Mayor C. W. Vance; Mayor McCarty of Nelson, B. C., who will replace G. H. Cottrell of Vancouver; and George Agar of New Westminster, who will replace Mayor J. J. Johnston.

HOFFMANN REELECTED
By unanimous decision W. J. Hofmann was reelected president; Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary; F. H. Wait of Seattle, Emory Olmstead, Mayor R. H. Gale of Vancouver, B. C., vice presidents; A. E. Todd of Victoria, honorary secretary; J. C. Ainsworth, treasurer; and Chester Thorm, Tacoma, assistant treasurer.

About 60 delegates were present for the convention. A morning session was held at the Imperial hotel, at which financial affairs were discussed. The afternoon meeting opened at 2 o'clock and the meeting concluded with a banquet given by the Chamber of Commerce at 7 o'clock.

Hofmann opened the meeting and told of the thousands of booklets and circulars which had been sent out during the past year and said that the bureau would cooperate in sending Frank Branch Riley East on another lecture tour about November 1.

The delegates were informed that within two years Portland would have the finest rose gardens in the world, in an address by Jesse Curry, who reported that work was proceeding rapidly on the 11-acre rose test garden in this city.

THOUSANDS VISIT CAMPS
Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary, reported that records sent in to his office showed that 445,000 people had visited the automobile camps of the Northwest this season. He also reported that Medford had reported 100 new families in that district and that in every instance these were automobile tourists.

"Before the Northwest Tourist bureau was established Rainier National park averaged 300 Eastern visitors a year, but this season it was the mecca for 6000 Eastern visitors," T. H. Martin, manager of the Rainier National park, told the delegates. He said that Eastern tourists were anxious to get close to nature, but that they wanted a room and bath while they were doing so.

Governor Olcott echoed the sentiments of Martin and said that Mount Hood would become such a famous mecca as Mount Rainier until roads equally as good were built to the Oregon peak.

550,000.00 TO COME
Julius L. Meier, president of the 1932 exposition board, then told the bureau directors that the 1932 exposition would increase the work of the bureau a thousand fold by the year of the fair. He predicted that the publicity incidental to the exposition would bring \$50,000,000 into the state before the fair gates were opened and that \$200,000,000 more would follow before the end of 1935.

A. B. Howe of Tacoma introduced a resolution endorsing the exposition and pledging the aid of the bureau to the project. This resolution was unanimously adopted.

The election of new members and selection of officers concluded the meeting.

Manila, P. I., Oct. 15.—(U. P.)—Economic, efficient and moral government for the Philippines was promised by Mayor General Leonard Wood at his inauguration as governor general here today.

Wood declared he was highly pleased and honored with his appointment and urged the co-operation of Americans and Filipinos in the islands in his address.

"The people of the Philippines are at the outpost of occidental religion and democracy and must not fail," he declared.

Wood announced that officials of the government under his direction must recognize they hold offices of public trust and the policy would be toward government by the people in the highest degree.

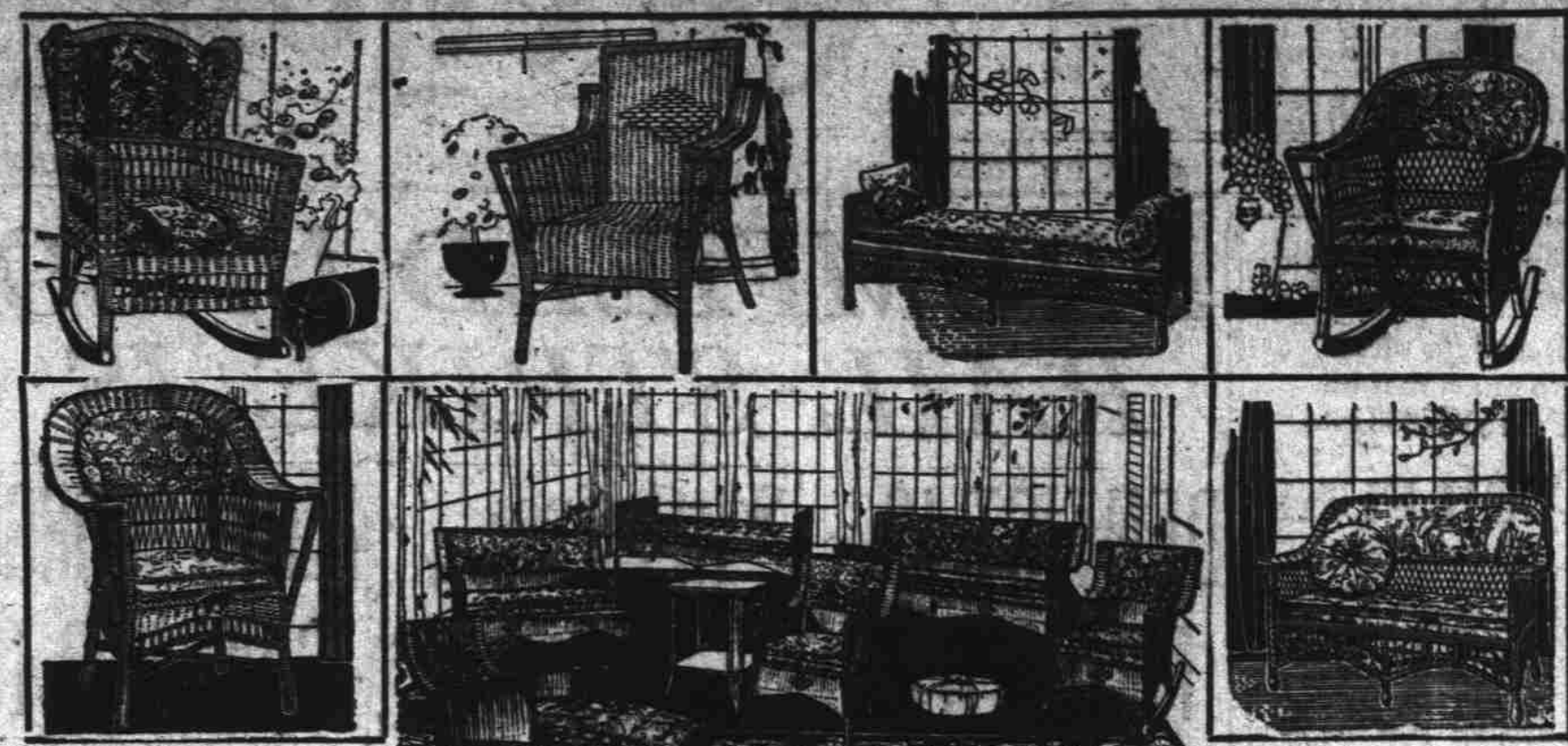

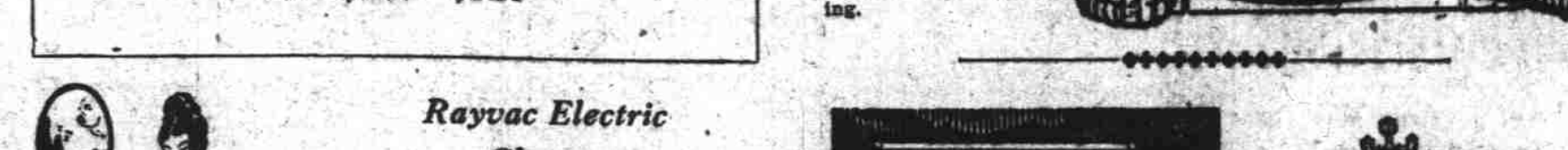

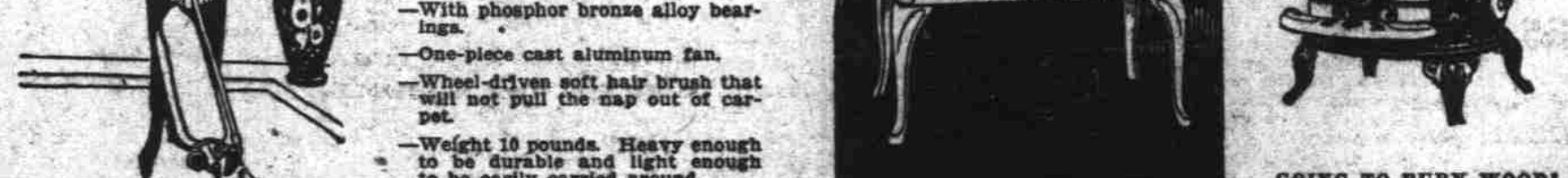
