

EX-PRESIDENT TO ATTEND FUNERAL OF UNKNOWN HERO

Appearance in Public of Woodrow Wilson on Armistice Day Will Be the First Since March 4.

Washington, Oct. 29.—Woodrow Wilson will attend the funeral ceremonies at Arlington on Armistice day when an unknown American soldier killed in action in France will be buried.

The former president has not appeared at a public function since inauguration day last March, when he was too feeble to do more than greet Mr. Harding in the President's room in the senate wings of the capitol. When the services at Arlington are concluded Mr. Wilson will proceed to his home, where an informal demonstration will be tendered him by his old friends. It will be similar to the affair on March 4th, when thousands of people crowded the streets in front of the Wilson home and paid their respects to the ex-president. The same committee of women who arranged the demonstration last March is preparing this time to give Mr. Wilson a greater ovation.

WANT BREAK SILENCE

The former president has not said a word publicly in nearly nine months, and there are rumors that he may break his silence on Armistice Day and give his views on world issues.

As an exponent of the idea that the most practicable way to get limitation of armament is through a league of nations, which by providing a machinery for the settlement of disputes, makes less necessary armament burdens, Mr. Wilson might give another plea for ultimate American co-operation with the other powers of the world. On the other hand, Mr. Wilson has heretofore refrained from doing anything which might be construed as a re-entry on his part into the political arena, and while it is known that many of his friends would be glad to have him express his views and give momentum to the policies which he has championed, but which his own party leaders have been neglecting, there is no certainty that the president will decide to do at the last moment.

WANT OF LEADER FELT

The truth is the Democrats are very much distressed by the lack of aggressive leadership inside their party. The treaty with Germany could have been defeated, or at least reservation included to make easier the ultimate entrance of the United States into the League of Nations, if it is contended, if the Democrats had been solidified. SENATE LEADERS SEE DELAY FOR REVISION BILL

Sales Tax Advocates Insist They Will Demand Fair Hearing Before Bill Goes to Conference.

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That the final vote will be delayed was conceded by Chairman Penrose of the finance committee and other influential Republicans, after sales tax advocates and the proponents of other amendments to the bill served notice that they will insist upon a fair hearing before the bill is sent to conference.

Sales tax advocates insisted on having two days in which to debate the sales tax plan. Senator Reed, Democrat, Missouri, also demanded a day in which to discuss the soldier's bonus bill, which he yesterday offered as an amendment to the tax measure.

Senator Penrose conferred with other Republican leaders and then announced that plans made yesterday for speeding up the bill would be abandoned.

Senator La Follette, Republican, Wisconsin, attacked the finance committee amendment proposing to exempt from American taxation that part of the business of American corporations that is carried on in China. He said:

"The amendment would open wide the doors to the Standard Oil, the Beef trust and all other gigantic corporations that are seeking a monopoly in every country. They would take the enormous profits they have made in this country and use them to build up a tax free business in China."

Archduke Albrecht Said to Have Given Up Trip to America

Budapest, Oct. 29.—An authoritative informant that Archduke Albrecht has given up his plan to go to America. New York papers announced that he was coming there in connection with the transfer of all the immense properties of his father, Grand Duke Frederick, to an American syndicate headed by Frank Munsey and William L. Replogle. A bill introduced in the Czech parliament at Prague appropriating the large holdings of the monarchical nobility is understood to be a countermove to prevent the American syndicate from obtaining possession of Frederick's holdings.

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Last Member of Party Is Caught; \$10 Fine Levied

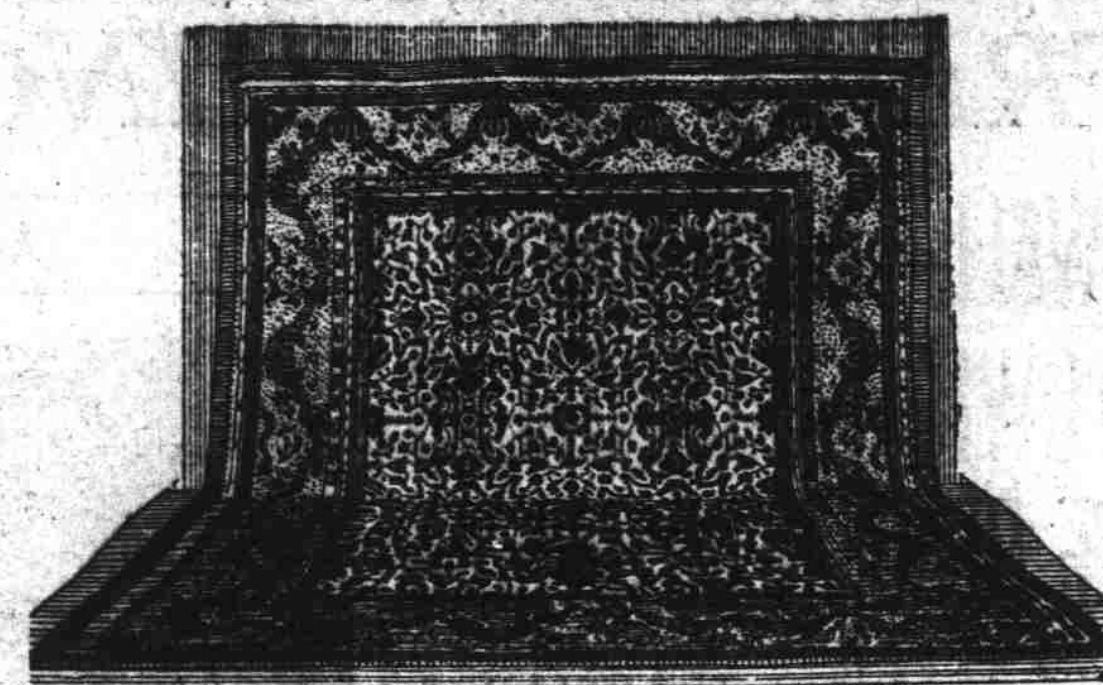
"For the last part of every party is the worst part, if you get caught."

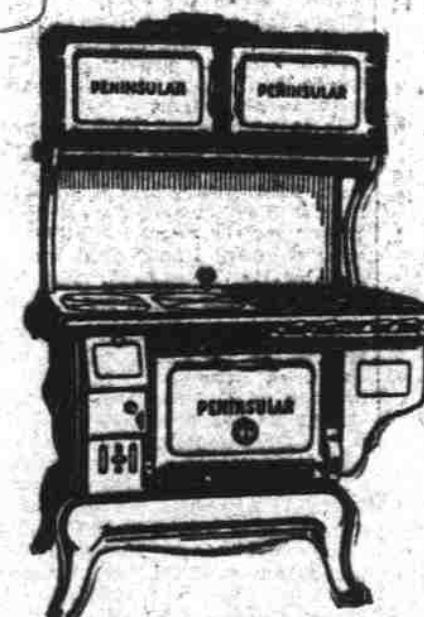
