To Talk of Iowa Birds—"Nests and Eggs of Iowa Birds" will be the subject of an illustrated lecture by Ira N. Gabrielson before the Oregon Audubon society Saturday night at 8 o'clock in the library hall. For several years Mr. Gabrielson has been conducting investigations in the East and Middle West on the economic value of birds to the farmer and is at present with the United States biological survey in Oregon as an expert on the extermination of rodent pests. Mr. Gabrielson will give a second lecture in February, entitled, "Close-Up Studies of Bird Life."

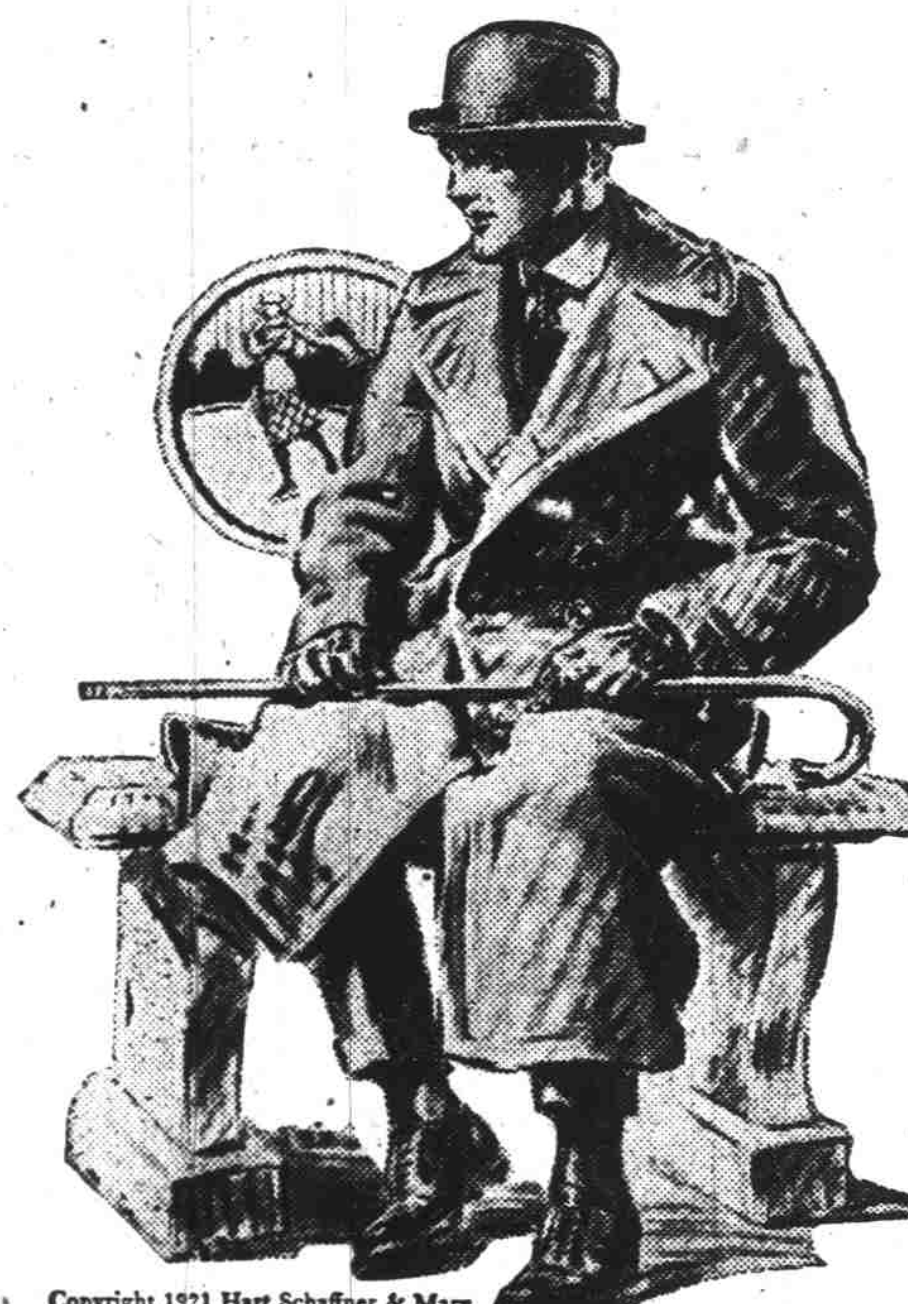
