# **RED CROSS WILL**

Budget for 1922-Is \$5,000,000 Under That of 1921; Famine Relief in Orient Is Planned.

Washington, Nov. 5 .- (U. P.)-Appropriations totaling \$19,261,657 are contained in the budget of the American Red Cross for the current fiscal year. was announced at national headquarters today. These projected expenditures are more than \$5,000,000 lower than dishursements during the last fiscal year, when the total reached \$24.492,741. For the support of its work the Red Cross will hold its annual roll call throughout the country from Armistice day to Thanksgiving.

Reflective of the determination of the Red Cross to continue its service to disabled World war veterans until the last of these men is restored to normal civilian life and outstanding among the items of the domestic budget is the appropriation of \$3,669,256 for Red Cross service in behalf of the disabled exservice man and his family. For disaster relief, the Red Cross has set aside for the current 12 months an appropriation of \$543,976, virtually doubling the appropriation for the same purpose last year. More than \$2,000,000 provided for service and assistance to the 3600 Red Cross chapters by the national organization. RELIEF FUND RELD

Other items of the domestic budget include \$498,546 for miscellaneous activities and \$768,500 for management. Each of these items represents large refuctions over the last fiscal year. From a fund of \$10,000,000, \$5,000,000 of which was contributed through the uropean Relief Council campaign and \$5,000,000 allotted by the Red Cross for by the Daddies club to supply baskets child welfare work in Europe, there remains \$8,765,198 still available, of which it is estimated that \$5,000,000 will be required for this work during the current year. For Red Cross participation in the joint effort to relieve famine conditions in Russia, for final work in the China famine, for Junior Red Cross and other overseas activities including the closing of the old general relief program in Europe \$4,978,000 is made
