

# Aggies Expect Hard Battle From Cougars :: Boxers Shaping Up for Wednesday's Bouts

## Aggie Coach Makes Shift In Lineup

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—We will back up against the hardest fight we have had this season," said Coach Rutherford in discussing the game with Washington State college on Armistice day. "As to who will win—well, we'll see, we'll see."

The "Fighting Aggies" had a three day rest over the week-end but are again being hammered into shape by Coach Rutherford. A shake-up of the right end of the line is being made by the coach. "Dick" Herbert, who played half in the former games, is showing good ability on the end of the line. Right end was the Aggie weak point in the Stanford game.

The backfield positions will probably be filled by the same men that started against the "Cardinals." "Joe" Kasberger at quarter, "Ev" Miller, left half, "Stan" Summers, right half, and "Gip" Powell, full. Touzey will probably replace Powell during part of the game.

"Dad" Butler, trainer, says the team as a whole are in fine condition. There have been no serious injuries to the players except "Dick" Garber, who was hurt early in the season. He will be out for the rest of the season.

The Aggies will play the University of Oregon at Corvallis Saturday. This game has always been the hardest fought game on either team's schedule.

"Guy" Rathbun, assistant coach of the Aggies, said that Oregon should have won from W. S. C. at least three touchdowns. All the breaks of the game were against her. He also said that the Cougars took a slight slump from the California game and the O. A. C. would receive the reaction from the game against Oregon.

All entries were in the ring and all but one went over the five jumps, and made a creditable performance; few, however, cleared the canyon "swater" and those who did the VanCleave stable were one-two-three. The Oakland battler is rated as a clever boxer with a style that is his own. He is a small edition of Willie Meekins. He is a man who has Willie beat many ways for funny stuff in the ring, but nevertheless he can put up a good battle.

Cappelli has been here a couple of days putting himself in readiness for the bout.

The other bouts on the card are expected to produce some good mills. The semi-main attraction between Sam Langford, not the Boston Tar Baby, and Archie Stov should be a six pound cyclone. Stov is a battler who likes to rat and he is anxious to show the Portland fans that the showing on the benefit card was not fluke.

Jimmy Cole will tangle with Frankie Britt of Tacoma. Britt is a corner and possesses a lot of speed and cleverness. The four round bouts arranged will bring together Jack Rose and Billy Lang and Charley Helman and George Welch. Ralph Gruman will referee the bouts.

Stanford University, Cal., Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—To his original selection of 28 Western football players to be considered as possibilities for Walter Camp's All-American football eleven, Walter Powell has added three more players: Ehr. Backfield, and McMillan, line of the University of California; Boyle, line, University of Southern California; Howard, end, University of Oregon. Powell has recommended that "Brick" Muller of the University of California be dropped from consideration because he has been unable to play most of the season on account of injuries. Buff is 33 years old and will weigh probably not more than 113 pounds when he enters the ring at Madison Square Garden. Sharkey may weigh as much as 118 pounds.
