Bridge Tourney
In Portland at
Hotel BensonEnthusiasm Is Being Shown,
Which Is Scheduled to Take
Place November 28.

MUCH enthusiasm is being shown the country over in the Par Auction Bridge tournament which is to be held in the Eastern and Pacific divisions of the United States on November 28. In Portland the tournament will be held in the crystal room of the Hotel Benson, in Boston, at the same time, entrants will be playing the same hands at the Vendome, Somerset and Lenox hotels in New York, at the Plaza, Ritz-Carlton, Waldorf-Astoria and Biltmore ball-rooms.

Pittsburg, Buffalo and Detroit are following suit and the smaller places are doing likewise. This makes one hope much for the assistance to the child hygiene department of the American committee's work for devastated France. In the Pacific division, Spokane, Seattle, Portland, Pasadena, Los Angeles, San Diego, Coronado, San Francisco and Phoenix are in the play. It is explained that there are endless possibilities in this new form of auction, and its simplicity of deal makes it altogether a great source of pleasure and instruction. The opportunity is there and it is all up to the individual. The Par-Auction scores and cards are provided by the committee. The winning pair at each table retains the cards as a prize after they have played the 24 deals which constitute the tournament. There are no rubbers and it takes about two and a half hours to play out.

After the tournament, the winning pair also receives the book, now in press, which tells how each hand should be played in order to make the highest possible score, and this will afford some surprise.

The judges are Milton C. Work, H. H. Ward and Charles Cadley and their decisions will be final.
