

ILLEGAL SALE OF NARCOTICS STIRS GOVERNOR HART

Executive of Washington Calls Federal, State, County and City Officials to Meet.

Olympia, Nov. 12.—Stirred by continued reports reaching his office of the widespread illegal sale of narcotics in the state, Governor Louis F. Hart today sent letters to law enforcement officials throughout the state calling them to a conference in Seattle on November 26.

Little or no success in coping with the traffic in drugs has resulted from the "hit and miss" style of detection and prosecution, with little or no cooperation between officials of cities and counties, federal and state, and it is to bring about such cooperation that the governor has called this conference.

Letters were sent out from the governor's office today to the law enforcement officials, who are asked to meet at room 408, department 11, county-city building, Seattle, Saturday, November 26, at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Rabid Coyotes Go On Rampage; Two Killed by Woman

Wild tales of rabid coyotes were brought to Portland Saturday by Stanley G. Jewett of the United States biological survey, from that part of Oregon near the Nevada and Idaho boundaries.

"I found the coyotes exceptionally abundant and more cases of rabies being reported in Northern Nevada than for many years," said Jewett. "A few days ago a rabid coyote came into the corral 40 miles south of the Nevada line and bit two horses and a dog. A man killed it with a club. Numerous cases of rabies are reported right along. I stayed at a ranch house two nights where a bobcat two days previous had come to the house where a woman was alone with her baby and put its front feet on the window sill and looked in. The woman killed two rabid coyotes in her yard."

Jewett also found that a small patch of pine timber at old Fort Warner in being fast eliminated by porcupines. In less than one hour the party shot eight without hunting for them at all.

Jewett was accompanied by F. M. Brown, Tom Craig and Irvin Hazeltine of the state game department.

Half of \$10,000 Bond Issue of Post Subscribed

Approximately one half of the \$10,000 bond issue being floated by Post No. 1 of the American Legion in Portland already has been subscribed by members of the organization, according to E. C. Mears, chairman of the committee in charge of the issue. Funds acquired from the sale of bonds are to be used in paying obligations incurred in the operation of the Legion clubrooms at Sixth and Pine streets, Mears stated.

A sinking fund has been established for retiring the issue and it is proposed to pay off the bonded debt at the rate of \$2000 a year. The bonds bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent and are offered for sale only to members of the Legion.

SHERIFF'S HAND STAYS CAREER OF PROMISING SINGER

William Andree Loses Good Theatrical Job When He Is Nabbed for Alleged \$5000 Forgery.

William Andree, former Portland manager of Merrill Cox & Co., now a resident of the county jail, where he is awaiting trial for the forgery of a \$5000 note, told Deputy District Attorney Pierce, Saturday, that he got about \$10,000 for forgeries and that the money was used to pay debts.

Andree was brought to Portland from Los Angeles Saturday by Deputy Sheriff Schirmer. He was singing at one night stand at 45 a night—when picked up by the Los Angeles authorities on a warrant from the sheriff's office here.

"Just the night before they arrested me," Andree told Pierce, "a big theatre man down there heard me sing. He came up to me and said, 'Young man, where have you been keeping that voice all these years? I'll pay you \$400 a month and make a great singer of you if you will come with me.'"

Andree is said to have freely confessed his shady business methods while employed in Portland.

"But I couldn't rest until I had written a full confession and sent it to the Merrill Cox home office in Chicago," he declared. Merrill Cox is said to have received the confession.

Andree confessed to passing three bad notes, two of them in Washington towns and one for \$5000, made out against the Cappon & Berach Leather company of Chicago and passed on George W. Bates & Co., bankers, on Williams avenue, July 23.

Mrs. Andree and her two little children were in Los Angeles with Andree when he was taken into custody.

"My wife was sick in Portland and I kept getting deeper and deeper in debt," he said. "I had to have money to pay up with."

Briand Displeased As Choicer Seats Go to Britishers

Washington, Nov. 12.—As the delegates to the session of the armament conference there was a visible commotion among the French delegates when it was discovered that the three principal British delegates were assigned to seats at the head of the table with the Americans, while Briand and his associates were to be seated at the side.

Briand voiced his objection to the arrangement, but Ambassador Jusserand undertook to soothe him. Later, after President Harding had spoken, Secretary Hughes announced that the British delegates were to be seated at the head of the table for Briand, but the French premier refused to accept the place.

It was plain to the audience that the head of the French delegation was displeased with the arrangement which appeared to give precedence to Balfour and his associates.

London Cartoonist Pictures Harding as Big Pow-Wow Chief

British Ask More Time to Consider Ulster's Refusal

United Press Staff Correspondent. London, Nov. 12.—The British government wants further time in which to consider Ulster's flat refusal to accept the proposed compromise agreement for settlement of the Irish problem.

The full cabinet meeting scheduled for today was postponed over the weekend. In its stead Premier Lloyd George formally discussed the Ulster reply to the proposal which has been tentatively approved by both the Sinn Fein and the British peace delegates, with Sir Robert Horne, Lord Erykhead, Sir Horar Greenwood and Winston Churchill.

It was assumed the ministers carefully considered Ulster's counter proposals with a view to preparing the outline of a possible new compromise agreement to the full cabinet next week.

Germany Is Swamped And Impoverished by Too Many Officials

Berlin, Nov. 12.—Since Germany became a republic she has 248,000 more officials and government employees than under the empire. At least 100,000 of these are political appointees. These charges were made in the reichstag today by former Finance Minister Helfferich. To this information the former finance minister added:

"Our country has grown smaller, but government authorities and officialdom have grown as if we had conquered the world. To every three citizens there is now an official or government employee."

"Such a condition could not be maintained by the richest nation, much less by impoverished Germany."

WASHINGTON CITY CELEBRATES FOUR DATES OF HISTORY

Armistice Day and Birthdays of Dayton, Columbia County and Washington State Observed.

Dayton, Wash., Nov. 12.—Armistice day, the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Dayton and the forty-sixth birthday anniversary of Columbia county and thirty-second of the state of Washington were celebrated Friday. A huge crowd witnessed the parade and program. Dr. E. H. Van Patten spoke on disarmament. A military court, with Attorney Foust as judge and prominent citizens as criminal, caused merriment and added money to the coffers of the Legion. Retreat was sounded at 4:30 o'clock. Streets were illuminated by red fire at night. Two dances and games of chance at Hard Pan Gulch furnished fun.

RAIN NO DETERRENT
