SIX TRAINS IN PERIL IN GORGE

Another Is Ice-Bound in Central Oregon; Passengers Face Exposure and Hunger; All Relief Plans Futile; Bridges Go Out.

RAILROAD SITUATION North Bank—Trains No. 3 and 5. From to tracks west of Cooks and flanked by snowdrifts with one dining car to snowdrifts...

Encased in solid blocks of ice and swept by congealing blasts of wind, six passenger trains stand in the Columbia gorge today on the line of the O-W. R. & N. and S. P. & S., cut off from communication and all attempts of relief.

Passengers on three of the trains were in actual danger from exposure and lack of food because of the storm, which H. M. Davidson, general manager of the North Bank line, characterized as "the most terrific in the history of rail operation through the gorge."

To the south conditions were momentarily growing from bad to worse. The Santiam river is a raging torrent, which has torn out two bridges of the Oregon Electric at Beaver and one at Salem, and carried away a Southern Pacific bridge approach at Jefferson. All S. P. branch lines are out of service due to floods and ice.

So heavy was the snow and ice along the Columbia river line that at 10 P. M. station at Lyle collapsed this.

FATAL BLAZE DUE TO WINDY BLAST

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—One man was hurt and a big fire this morning directly traceable to the cold spell that held the Inland Empire in its grip since Friday night. An overheated furnace set fire to the Kensington apartments, at Short and Pine streets. A. O. Thompson, proprietor, was found at a window dead. His wife was injured in jumping nine feet to the ground.

STORM'S TRACES ON TREE AND RIVER

EVERYWHERE about Portland were seen Sunday and today effects of Sunday's "silver thaw." Upper picture shows trees bent down along Alameda drive by weight of ice. Effect of strong east wind is shown on fir tree at right of picture, all the branches being blown westward, in which position they froze. In Beaumont and other timbered districts this created a weird effect. Middle picture shows close-up of ice-crusted tree. Lower is a view of the log jam which battered at the pier of the Burnside bridge this morning.

WIRE SCATTERED

To the south the weather bureau is keeping its eye on a new danger. Rain falls to the south of the city, the Willamette valley Sunday, with a fall upward to eight inches being reported at various points. During the 72 hour period ending at 5 o'clock this morning a total of 6.37 inches of rain fell.

BULL RUN PIPE LINE IS BROKEN

Earth-Shift Snaps One Conduit; Other Stopped Up by Unknown Cause; All Urged to Conserve; Supply on Hand for 36 Hours.

Shortage of water loomed in Portland today following a break in pipeline No. 1 between the city and the Bull Run headworks at an early hour this morning.

It is thought from the meager reports of the damage that the break was caused by a washout carrying the pipe along with the earth surrounding it. The line broke a short distance west of the intake, Fred Randlett, chief engineer for the water bureau announced.

The break leaves the city with the water in the six reservoirs, two in Washington Park, one in Forest Park, one in the city, and one in the city.

Two disasters come. Number one conduit broke, according to the meager report brought to the water bureau, a short distance this side of the intake.

Randlett returned to the city from the headworks Sunday and said the Bull Run river was almost at flood while the Sandy river was a raging torrent.

The crews sent to repair the pipeline were equipped with welding apparatus. The entire outfit will have to find portage across the river, as the bridge is useless. The bridge is under the jurisdiction of Clatsop county.

To save as much water as possible, orders have been issued for the discontinuance of all street and sewer flushing. This means that street intersections where the storm deposited quantities of mud and debris will have to remain until the normal supply of water can be restored.

No damage was done to the intake, however, as the construction had reached a point where it could withstand any amount of storm. The break in the pipe line, however, makes the intake useless.

DATE FOR GRAIN CUT IS ORDERED
