Vancouver Garbage Problem Up Again

Vancouver, Wash, Nov. 30 .- "An incinerator is the only solution of the garbage problem," said Councilman J. B. Atkinson, Tuesday, "and the sooner we begin work with that end in view the better. Vancouver has outgrown the open garbage dump that is unsanitary, unsightly and causes complaints from citizens wherever located. We should be able to build a plant that will care for the garbage of Vancouver for not more than \$10,000." A decision by the supreme court in the case of Loveland brothers, who were restrained from comlecting garbage on the complaint of Sherman Drew, who has the contract from the city, is expected in a few days and then the question will again be taken up by the council. Lovelace brothers appealed from the decision of Judge Simpson, who held that the city council was within its rights in letting an exclusive contract for garbage col-lection, and that Lovelace brothers were trespassing on the rights of Drew in continuing to collect independently. The question is sure to be threshed out again before the council no matter what the decision of the court may be.
