Poweign butter continues to form the chief basis of interest in the leading markets of the United States, although to date this season Portland has been remarkably free of such supplies. However, other markets have received liberal supplies, and, naturally, this influences the entire American trade. influences the entire American trade.

California has received additional stocks of Australian butter, and with New England stock available in both American and Canadian markets during the next few days the coast trade will be fully supplied with foreign stock.

Eastern markets have received considerable Darish butter of late, and this has sold at lower pices. It quite naturally follows that the price on domestic stock should be influenced. Consilerable New Zealand stock is being of-fered to Portland by Northern and Southern importers, and some small sales were reported

Beriew of the butter market at San Francisco for the week ending Friday:

The market did not hold up this week, as was generally looked for. The principal factor in the decline was the influence of the expected arrival of Australian butter December 26. Dealers were buying for immediate needs only and were anxious to keep stocks cleaned up, anticipating a declining market. Large receivers were forced to make concessions to move their surplus receipts, but reduced prices did not stimulate business. The market declined 4 % c on 92 score from Monday to Friday. It is reported from fairly reliable sources that the two steamers Ventura and Friday, it is reported from fairly reliable sources that the two steamers Ventura and Tabiti will dock December 26 with about 19,-400 cubes (56 pounds), or approximately 1.086,000 pounds of Australian butter. Some of this will be needed on the Pacific Coast, but the bulk of it will go to Eastern markets. Further declines are looked for at San Francisco next week, as many dealers have foreign butter coming and will be off the market for local goods. Market closed weak and unsettled.
