Work Postponed Until Spring—Except to prevent the overloading and undermining of expensive retaining walls, work of the state highway department in clearing the Columbia river highway between Viento and Wyeth will be postponed until spring, according to Engineer Collier of Hood River.

Hood River Apple Shipments—Carlott shipments of apples from the Hood River valley in 1921 greatly exceed harvest estimates. Up to the close of last week a total of 2125 cars had been shipped, and it is estimated that about 750 cars remain.

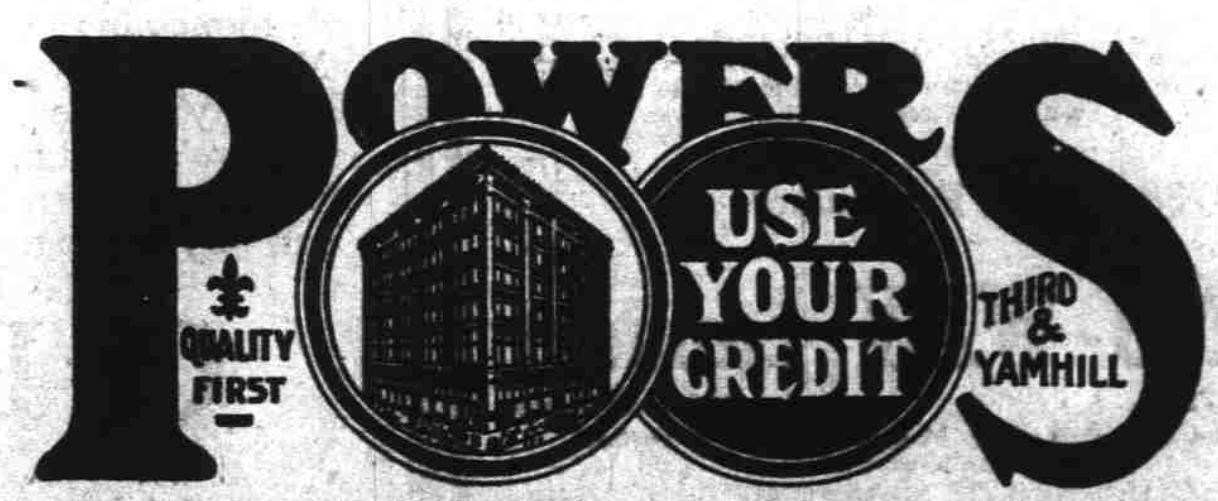
