

MRS. MILES' DEATH SHOCK TO FRIENDS

Funeral services for Mrs. Juanita Miller Miles, only daughter of former Internal Revenue Collector, Milton A. Miles, and wife of State Representative Sherman Miles, banker at St. Helens, will be held at Lebanon, her old home, Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The body will be brought to Portland this afternoon from St. Helens and will be taken to Finley's where it will remain until tomorrow. Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock it will be shipped to Lebanon, arriving there at 11:45. The burial will be at the Lebanon cemetery, beside the body of Mrs. Miles' mother.

Mrs. Miles was killed in an automobile accident that happened near St. Helens shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday evening. A striking coincidence is that about the same time in the evening, exactly one year before, a sister of Mrs. Miles and aunt of Mrs. Miles was killed in the same way near Ashland.

IN PORTLAND DURING DAY
Mrs. Miles, whose tragic death was reported yesterday in Portland, where she formerly resided, and is well-known, had been in Portland during the day to visit her father, who for a week has been confined to his room in the Oregon hotel with grippe. After spending the day with him, accompanied by her husband, she left at 3 o'clock for St. Helens.

At St. Helens, Mr. and Mrs. Miles dined at the home of H. F. McCormick of the McCormick Shipbuilding & Lumbering Co., after which Miles went to a garage to have his car repaired. The job took longer than was expected. Mr. Miles phoned the fact to the McCormick home, and George Perkins, brother of Mrs. McCormick, started to drive Mrs. Miles to her home two miles away, where her two children, left during the day in the care of the mother of Mr. Miles, were to be brought back to the McCormick home, where all were to have spent the evening.

CARS TURN OVER
Momentarily mistaking the road, Perkins tried to recover the highway by a sharp turn, and the heavy car turned turtle, pinning Mrs. Miles under it. Dr. Flynn, the attending physician, believes that death was almost instantaneous.

The surviving members of the immediate family are the husband, two children and the father.

Mrs. Miles was a devoted daughter, mother and wife and was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends. She was a former student of the University of Oregon.

Dakota will succeed Penrose as chairman of the powerful senate finance committee.

The succession will practically be automatic under the senate rules of seniority. McCumber has served continuously in the senate since 1899. It will be the task to guide the permanent tariff bill through the upper house. The finance committee is at work on the measure now and expects to report it out shortly after congress reconvenes Tuesday.

McCumber also will have chief responsibility in connection with changes in the new revenue law, which President Harding will recommend when he considers the time opportune.

McCumber "STAND PATTER"
The death of Penrose will not materially affect the policies of the committee. Penrose was regarded as a "protectionist" and a "stand-patter." So is McCumber. Their views have been in accord on all principal matters that have come before the committee. In addition McCumber has been taking an increasingly prominent part in the activities of the committee because of the weakened physical condition of Penrose. It was McCumber who had charge of the soldier bonus bill, which was shelved at the request of President Harding.

the chairmanship of the committee passes from an industrial to an agricultural state.

Members of the senate finance committee decided today not to attend the Penrose funeral in accordance with the wishes of the senator's family. Resolutions on the death of Penrose will be offered tomorrow in the senate and house.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR PENROSE FUNERAL NOT COMPLETED

Philadelphia, Jan. 2.—(U. N. S.)—Arrangements had not been completed this morning for the funeral of Senator Boies Penrose, who died Saturday night in Washington. His brother, Dr. Charles B. Penrose, was awaiting word from another brother, Spencer Penrose of Colorado, before making final plans for the services.

In keeping with the wish of the Pennsylvania senator, the funeral is expected to be private. Penrose had expressed the desire before his death that the services would be as quiet and as simple as possible.

The body is lying at the senator's bachelor home in Spruce street.

Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning at the Portland crematorium. The Masonic order of which he was a member, will conduct the ceremony.

Taxes Withdrawn And Old Fountain Prices Come Back

"Oh, Skippy! Hey! 'Chokes' are only a nickel."
All boydom, not to mention little girlhood and all the grownups, woke up Sunday morning in a rosy-tinged world to begin the new year, with one more item in the back-siding to "normalcy" realized.

All soda fountain taxes levied as a war measure were withdrawn with the coming of 1922, and again every youngster could have his soda pop and root beer for the famous nickel.

A general reduction at soda fountains all over the city went into effect, ranging from 1 cent on the 6 cent drinks to 10 cents on the fancy sundae. According to a careful comparison of this year's and last year's menus at representative confectionaries.

For example, one of the leading confectioneries of Portland furnishes the following comparison on counter prices: "Coca" drinks, formerly 6 cents now 5 cents; plain ice cream, formerly 15 cents, now 10 cents; milk shakes and plain iced milk, 15 cents. Some difference in the prices of different establishments remains. Ice cream sodas may be had in a few stores for 10 cents.

Confectioners explained that in many instances the price reductions are twice as much as the war tax withdrawn. "We saved all cuts in prices which would formerly have been made until now," said one dealer, "and made them all in one chunk."

ALUMNI TO FORM TO ENDOW REED

Creditable plans for the establishment of an alumni endowment fund for Reed college were given preliminary consideration by the Reed Alumni association at its annual Christmas banquet Friday evening at the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting informed the idea of incorporating the alumni body under the educational section of Oregon laws, with a board of trustees and other officers necessary for a business administration covering the suggested system of gifts, which in 10 years might amount to \$75,000 on a conservative estimate.

The alumni fund would consist of contributions from members of the association on a sliding scale of a few dollars the first few years after graduation, up to a \$10 maximum in 10 years. Gifts from classes, funds derived from benefits and from pledges of friends interested in the development of Reed college, would be included in the fund. The pooling of all alumni finances on interest, the possibility of a bonus from the general education board are features recommending the scheme.

Following an explanation of the system of progressive payments by members of the alumni association by Professor R. L. Griffin of Reed, and an outline of the legal aspects of incorporation by James B. Kerr, the plan was introduced and referred to a committee to prepare the plans to be voted on by the entire membership next June.

The meeting was a combination of business and social matters and following the business session an entertainment program was held. Plans for the "Reed Night" at the Baker theatre, Tuesday, January 24, were discussed and previous to adjournment, Dr. Norman F. Coleman, well known to Reed students, gave a timely address on the accomplishments and future of Reed college.
