Low pressure prevails in Alaska and Western Canada, and is part of Northern California. Over the remainder of the country the pressure is high. The highest reading being in the Midwest valley. Precipitation has occurred on the mid-land and North Atlantic slope and over a belt reaching from Louisiana to the District of Columbia. The heaviest precipitation reported was 1.15 inches at Marshall, Va. The weather is considerably milder over most of the northern half of the continent, but is much cooler in the extreme northern plains region and east of the Mississippi river.

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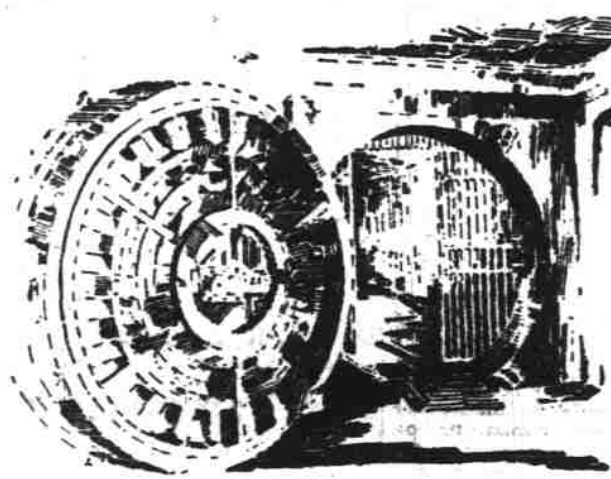
