Lumber Rate Adopted—The 90 cent lumber rate recently published from Pacific coast points to New England territory except to points on the New York, New Haven & Hartford, Bangor & Aroostook and Maine Central railroads, has been concurred in by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company to apply to points on its lines. The present rate to these points is \$1.06 1/4. Announcement to this effect was received Saturday by J. H. Mulcahy, general freight agent for the Southern Pacific. The Interstate Commerce Commission has been petitioned for authority to publish the reduced rates on less than statutory notice.

Wilson Foundation Drive Speeds Up Oregon's \$10,000 by Jan. 16 Goal

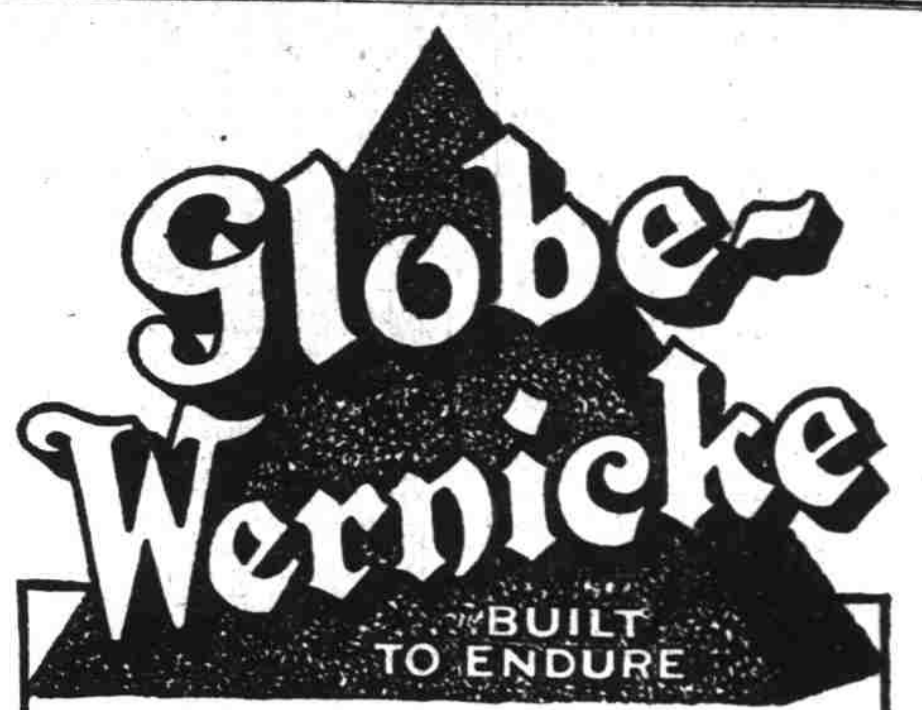
But a week remains for Oregon to rally her forces and go over the top again with another "Oregon First" recampaign officially opens January 16, during the 60 minutes between noon and 1 o'clock, which will be known as the Wilson hour. But Oregon campaign leaders have determined that Oregon's quota of \$10,000 will be completed before that time, and during the next week will put forth every effort to accomplish this end.
The national fund of \$1,000,000 for the Woodrow Wilson Foundation is to be donated by volunteer subscribers, who believe in and approve its purpose.
PURPOSE OF FUND
The purpose of the fund is to stimulate genius; to encourage interest in human welfare; to serve mankind; to perpetuate and promulgate Americanism; to champion liberty, democracy and peace.
The award or awards from the income of the foundation will be made from time to time by a nationally constituted committee to the individual or group that has rendered, within a specified period, meritorious service to democracy, public welfare, liberal thought or peace through justice. This fund is similar in purpose and plan to the Noble Peace prize, save that this fund is limited to citizens of the United States.
Veterans of the World war are showing a keen enthusiasm in the Woodrow Wilson Foundation and are eagerly en-

listing to actively aid in the work. The former fighters recognize in the movement not only a tribute to their commander in chief but they also see it as a means to establish on a permanent basis the ideals for which they fought. From all sections of the country letters are being received at the national headquarters in New York city, indorsing the movement and offering to help in any way possible.
LEADERS SOLICITED
The organization of the former soldiers and sailors is being carried out in close cooperation with the state organizations of the Foundation. A man in each state has been asked to assume the responsibility of exercising general supervision over the organization of his comrades in that state and to cooperate with the state chairman in the work. In each county an ex-serviceman is working with the county chairman in getting the former soldiers, sailors and marines of the county interested in the movement. They are working largely through the posts of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the various divisional societies.
Everyone who intends giving a subscription to the Foundation fund is urged to take it to the Lumbermen's Trust company, Broadway and Stark streets, where the Foundation has a window, or to give it to some campaign committee worker. All subscriptions are welcome, no matter how small they may be.

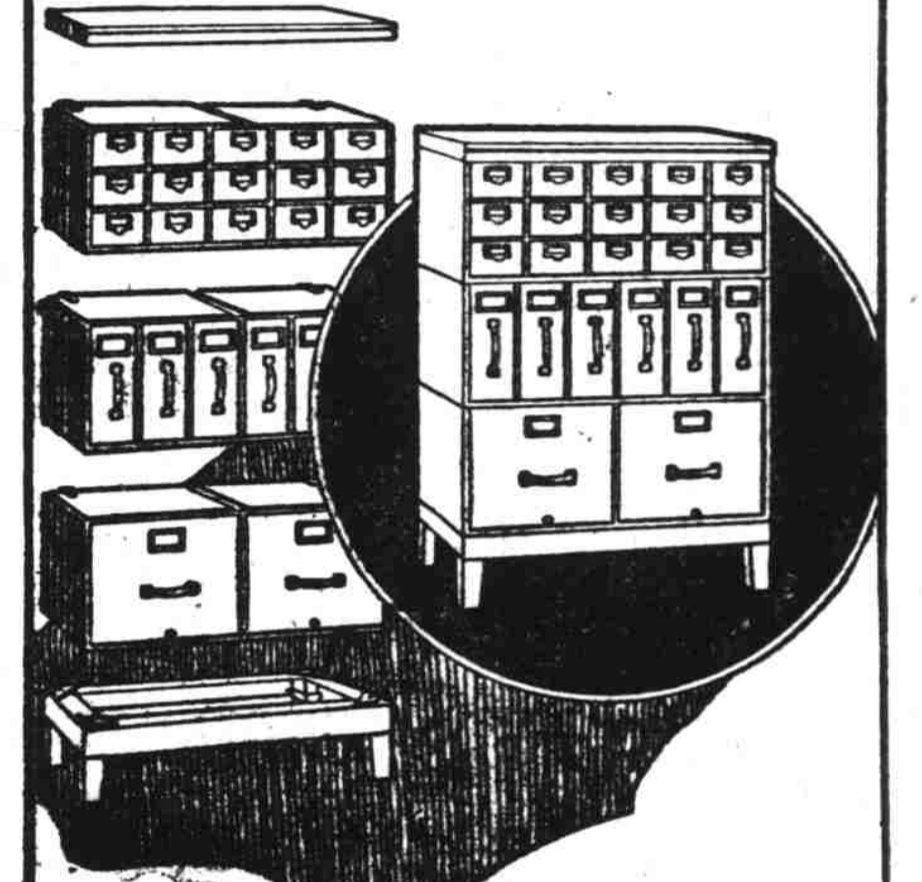

Injunction Asked To Halt Contract For Road in Baker

Baker, Jan. 7.—Sult to enjoin Baker county from entering into a contract with Oxman & Harrington for grading the 12 miles of the Bridge-Black section of the Baker-Cornucopia post road was filed Friday by E. H. Miller, who alleges the county court has authorized the awarding of the contract to the firm, although the bid of Copenhagen brothers was the lowest, being \$109,525.50, compared to \$111,750, bid by Oxman & Harrington. Failure of Oxman & Harrington to enclose a certified check for 5 per cent of the amount of the bid is also alleged. Members of the court said they acted on the theory that they were saving the county \$87.50 in awarding the contract to Oxman & Harrington, as the differ-
