

MRS. OBENCHAIN INSPIRED MURDER, SAYS PROSECUTOR

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 10.—(U. N. S.)

Kathryn Obenchain broke up the home of Arthur C. Burch, on trial for the murder of J. Edgar Kennedy, and his infatuation for her caused him to desert his wife, Allie Quayle Burch, and their baby, Deputy District Attorney Asa Keyes charged in his argument to the jury in the case today.

Picturing Burch as a weakling whom Mrs. Obenchain, co-defendant in the case, knew would do anything she asked, Keyes swung into the most important part of his address to the jurors with a rapid review of the prosecution's evidence which, he said, showed that the two conspired to kill Kennedy.

"Now let's see about Mrs. Obenchain and Burch," the prosecutor said. "We have evidence to show they were together several years ago at college. We find that Burch visited Mrs. Obenchain's apartments in Evanston and one witness has said he walked into her apartments as if he owned them."

"We have seen him taking groceries there, visiting her often. And we know it was about this time that he separated from his wife. I want you to bear that point in mind—it was about May, 1930, that he separated from his wife."

Referring to the motive alleged by the prosecution for the murder, Keyes gave the familiar quotation: "He had no fury like that of a woman scorned." He said that Burch killed Kennedy because the love of Mrs. Obenchain.

KENNY STUCK
"There's only one verdict, if you consider the evidence in this case, and that is 'guilty,' Keyes said. "There's only one punishment which fits the crime, and that's death."

"If you think him insane, acquit him. If you think him sane and guilty, however, there's but one penalty. The laws of this state declare that a person who lies in wait for his victim and kills him shall be punished by death. There can be no other verdict if you decide he's guilty."

BURCH'S CHECKS REDDEN

Burch paled perceptibly when Keyes spoke of the death penalty. Then, as the prosecutor referred to Mrs. Obenchain as a "home-wrecker," two bright spots of red showed in his cheeks and his eyes glared behind his big spectacles.

When Keyes resumed his address to the jury at the opening of the trial today it was expected that he would continue his argument until late in the afternoon. Defense Attorney J. J. Sullivan was prepared to follow Keyes before the jury. Paul W. Schenck, chief of defense counsel, and District Attorney Woolwine will follow Sullivan in turn.

CEMETERY CRITICS GO AFTER MANAGEMENT

The state legislature passed in 1932, according to Mr. Ladd, chairman of the board of trustees, it never had been possible to set aside 30 per cent of the money received from the sale of lots for this fund. The legislature of 1931 repealed the act which created and made the irreducible maintenance fund necessary.

The principal criticism of alleged mismanagement was directed against the neglect of the board of trustees to inform the lot owners of the financial condition of the cemetery association. John C. McCue and other lot owners stated that they had never received notice of meetings of the board of trustees and McCue stated that until the call for the meeting Monday he did not know that he was a member of the association.

It was also brought out that a bonded debt of \$115,500 had been taken up many years ago by the irreducible fund. The bonds bore interest at 4 per cent and were held by W. L. Ladd, H. W. Corbett and Henry Felling and mature in 1930. Their purchase by the trustees was evidently made as an investment of money then accrued in the irreducible fund, but the committee of stockholders recently appointed to investigate the affairs of the association charged the amount to the trustees of the bonds.

PRICE RISE URGED
The committee consists of George Lawrence Jr., Estes Snodgrass, T. D. Honeyman, C. C. Colt and C. H. Labbe. The report of the committee, read by Labbe, recommended an increase in the price of burial lots and the disposal of a portion of the association's holdings for the purpose of establishing a permanent fund for the maintenance of the cemetery.

J. N. Teal submitted a proposition calling for the reestablishment of the irreducible maintenance fund and reorganization of the association as a nonprofit corporation according to its original plan. He stated that there were approximately \$200 lot owners in the association and that the association had contracted with each of them to properly care for his burial lot. These contracts, Teal stated, required the maintenance of the irreducible fund.

Teal's motion was withdrawn after considerable discussion and the meeting adjourned till Monday, January 15, at Library hall. The stockholders' committee, headed by C. H. Labbe, was instructed to nominate six candidates for the board of trustees and present their names at the next meeting.

TRUSTEES NAMED
Present trustees are: W. M. Ladd, chairman; H. L. Ladd, F. M. Warren, C. M. Higgins, C. H. Carey and W. R. Mackenzie. The full board comprises nine members but there are two vacancies from resignations and by death. The terms of Ladd, Carey and Mackenzie expire at the next meeting.

W. M. Ladd stated that he had been a member of the board of trustees continuously for the past 40 years and was the only surviving member of the original board. He has been chairman of the board for about 20 years, having succeeded H. W. Corbett. Ladd announced that he would not be present at the next meeting of stockholders and would decline to serve any longer as a trustee of the association.

The Riverside Cemetery association, owned 440 acres of land about four miles south of the old postoffice building. The tract extends back from the Willamette river along wooded hillsides and is one of the most beautiful cemeteries in the country. It was suggested at the meeting that the river front property be sold to the city for park purposes, but this proposal met with mild response. Inexpensive of maintenance and competition of crematories and other enterprises is responsible for the perplexing financial condition of the association, according to Secretary Mackenzie.

Her husband was a Portland school teacher. He died several years ago, and Mrs. Wetzell was apparently in excellent health until a couple of days before her death, when she complained of pains in her chest. She died early last Wednesday morning.
