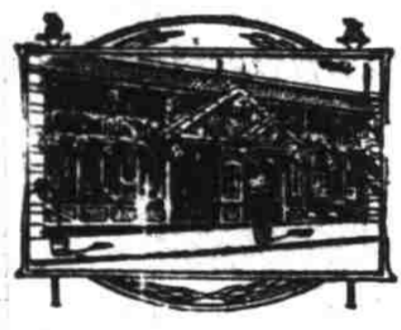

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American Legion's
Program Outlined;
Will Move Offices
The American Legion's 1922 program
of work in Portland was launched Mon-
day night with the installation by Port-
land post of its new officers. A review
of the work done in 1921 was given by
Henry Boyd, retiring commander and
newly elected committeeman. Cheers
greeted his statement that although the
post faced a \$15,000 debt a year ago the

obligations had all been settled during
the year.
The post voted to move its clubrooms
and offices on February 1, from the
present location at Sixth and Pine streets
to the former quarters of the Portland
Transportation club at Fourth and
Washington streets.
