# \$50,000 ON WORK

Following a regularly adopted policy 12.85 of the Willamette the Port of Portland 11.85 yesterday set aside \$50,000 for work at 11.15 Morgan's bar. The work will be along the line being followed by the United States engineers at Henrici and Willow bars below.

Work at Morgan's will consist in construction of three wing dams jutting out from the Washington shore and respectively 965 feet, 700 feet and 975 feet and the widening of the channel to 300 feet. Work will be commenced immediately

in order to secure the benefits of the spring rise. Construction of the wing dams and the dredging will be entirely under the direction of Engineer Polhe-The bar at Morgan's is in the Columbia and just below the mouth of the Willamette. The three wing dams to be

constructed will act as aids to the new jetty recently constructed at the mouth of the Willamette. In lieu of a dredging bill owed the Port of Portland by the government the United States engineers will construct a dike at Henrici. President Warren and Engineer James H. Polhemus will consult with Major Park, United States engineers, on the details of the agree-

ment. With the work on Willow bar complete and the projects to be completed this spring permanent improve-ments will have been made as far down the river as St. Helens. The object of the permanent work is to prevent the annual shoaling following the June rise and the subsequent dredging. Engineer Polhemus was authorized to

construct a pile driver and to purchase a dipper dredge and bucket dredge to be used where occasion demanded, to expedite the work. A contract was entered into between the port and Inman-Poulsen Lumber com-pany, whereby the port agrees to dredge a basin in front of the mill plant for a length of 350 feet and a width of 300 feet and conform to the 35-foot harbor depth. The mill people in turn will con-struct a new dock conforming to the


