

KELLOGG STREET IMPROVEMENT IS TO BE PETITIONED

To facilitate traffic to terminal No. 4, it was decided at a conference held Tuesday afternoon between J. L. Barbur, commissioner of public works, G. B. Hegardt, engineer of the dock commission, and F. C. Knapp, member of the commission, that petitions should be circulated among property owners of Kellogg street.

The street was paved with an 18-foot strip by the county but increased traffic has made a wider strip necessary. It is proposed that an additional 12 feet of pavement be laid and that a sidewalk be built on one side of the street. The distance to be improved is about one mile.

Barbur stated that this project would have priority over all other improvements despite the reduced program, because it affected a public utility. As soon as the petitions have been signed by the proper number of residents, the specifications for the work will be made up by the city engineer.

BIGLOW SUGGESTS THAT CITY MAKE ITS OWN WATER METERS

Believing upon the opportunity offered by a verbal tilt between Ed Kropp, agent for the Badger Water Meter company, and Commissioner John M. Mann, the advisability of manufacturing meters at the municipal shops was suggested by Commissioner C. A. Bigelow in the city council today.

Kropp protested against the recommendation of the purchasing agent that the award for furnishing 4250 meters be given the Gamon Water Meter company. The bid made by the Gamon people was for \$12,170, more than \$6000 less than any other bid.

Kropp's contention was that the cost of upkeep on the Gamon meter is greater than on the Badger. In attempting to introduce evidence to that effect he incurred the wrath of Mann, who charged him with unfair practices.

Bigelow pointed out that the shops are making five alarm boxes at half the usual cost and suggested that all future difficulties be avoided by also manufacturing meters.

After Fred Randall, chief engineer of the water bureau, stated the Gamon meter had proven satisfactory, the award was made to the Gamon concern.

COUNCIL JUDGE OF WHAT IS AN EMERGENCY OUTLAY

Whether or not an expenditure is an emergency is a question that the city council alone should decide, the ruling submitted to the council this morning by Frank S. Grant, city attorney.

The ruling was asked for to assist the council in deciding whether an appropriation could be made to continue the operation of the plumbing division in the building bureau after the general reduction in the city's expenditures. Grant in making his ruling stated that when a specific item had been eliminated by the commission the council could replace it, but when general reductions had been made accompanied merely by a suggestion the matter rested solely with the council.

In part Grant said:

"The question of emergency is one that must be decided by the council. This decision when made is not reviewable from a legal standpoint."

Grant expressed the opinion that the use of the Auditorium by the veterans' organizations for a dance to raise funds for relief of the unemployed veterans was an emergency measure and that the council, if it so decided, could give the use of the building free or at a reduced charge without violating any of the tax commission rulings.

IMPROVEMENT IS ASKED OF EAST SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET

Signed by R. M. Janin and 12 other property owners, a petition was filed this morning to improve East Sixty-seventh street. The petition requested that grading be done and a suitable hard surface pavement be laid. Due to the number of petitions now on file, the department of public works will recommend that this petition be filed and brought up at a later date.

REMONSTRATORS FAIL TO APPEAR; PETITION FILED

No remonstrators appearing before the council on the day issued by the health bureau for the installation of cesspools in the Lents district, the council this morning placed the remonstrance circulated by J. C. Van Zandt on file.

An investigation made by John M. Mann, commissioner of public utilities, showed that the majority of those signing the remonstrance were not affected by the order, and that two were not even in the district.

REMONSTRANCE OVERRULED

Remonstrances to the extension of Dekum avenue from Albina to Michigan avenues were overruled this morning by the city council. The council authorized continuance of the proceedings to secure right of way.

LINTON BUS LINE FRANCHISE GOES TO TRAFFIC COMMITTEE

For final action the franchise of the Linton Transit company was referred today by the city council to the traffic committee. The franchise has been drawn up in completed form, but some details as to routing in the business district are yet to be decided.

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STEPMOTHER WAS CRUEL TO CHILD, WOMAN DECLARES

Mrs. Greta L. Thompson, as a girl, lived in a small, poorly furnished room in the fine house at Fourteenth and Vasco streets while her father, L. K. Moore, and her stepmother, Jessie Elrod Moore, occupied a "luxurious" room in another part of the house, according to Mrs. Ruth Thornton, friend of Greta. Mrs. Thompson is contesting her father's will, which cut her off with no inheritance.

Mrs. Thornton was called to the stand Tuesday afternoon and all this morning was taken up in cross-examination by E. V. Littlefield, attorney for Mrs. Moore.

Comparing it with the rest of the house, I would call Greta's room very poor," said the witness. "I was disappointed when I saw it."

Greta and Mrs. Thornton have been friends for many years.

Mrs. Thornton testified that though the girl was treated abusively by her stepmother, she remained quiet on the subject, never complaining about the treatment.

Mrs. Moore was very pleasant to callers and to her neighbors all this time, the witness said. On one occasion, the witness said, she saw Greta working on the second floor and Mrs. Moore was below. She began abusing Greta so loudly that they could hear her distinctly through the floor.

"I began to cry myself," said Mrs. Thornton. "Greta went downstairs and when she returned she was weeping and sobbing and she said that she did not tell me what the trouble was."

HAD FEARS FOR GIRL

When Dan Malarky, Greta's attorney, asked her why she feared for Greta when Mr. Moore was below, she replied that she did not believe he would be allowed to protect his daughter from under his wife's domination, who stated in answer to a direct question.

Beulah Hayes, friend of the Moores, was called to the stand, apparently much against her will. She said she was well known that Greta did not have parties like other girls. She had no clothes good enough, though her father was well-to-do, and her stepmother entertained frequently, the witness testified.

COUNTY ACCEPTS LANCASTER OFFER ON TWO VIADUCTS

The county commissioners today accepted a proposition submitted by Samuel C. Lancaster, builder of the Columbia river highway, to make permanent repairs to the two highway viaducts near Multnomah falls for 10 per cent of the cost. The viaducts have been badly damaged by the heavy weight of ice resulting from the December storm.

The condition of the highway, once the spring thaws free it from the abnormal grip of winter that now holds it, focuses public attention on this scenic roadway as never before. To this and Lancaster, who recently returned to Portland after a year's absence, is urging the several civic clubs to undertake given tasks that will insure the beauty of the highway for all time to come.

A city club committee named by President L. D. Bosley has before it the task of acquiring for the public the 40 acre tract that includes the celebrated Latourell loops. This tract, owned by the Latourell family, is preserved in its native state, graced by fine trees, shrubs and ferns, none of which were destroyed in the construction of the 4200 feet of highway that parallels itself five times in traversing this 40 acres at a varying elevation of 205 feet. Lancaster foresees the possibility that this beauty spot may be profaned by the destruction of the trees and therefore urges its public ownership, as was accomplished in the case of Multnomah falls and Wahkeena falls.

The Progressive Business Men's club has undertaken the task of further beautifying the highway by the planting of flowering plants in the rock ways, etc.

Before the Realty board Friday Lancaster will urge that that organization act to preserve the timber on the watersheds adjacent to Wahkeena, Multnomah and Onocenta falls, which, if removed, he maintains, would permit the melting of the snow at one time in the early spring and therefore in midsummer cause these picturesque falls to become dry.

Barber Business Is Ruse, State Police; Suspect Arrested

Apparently engaged in the barber business at 43 North Third street, Mike Lobo, whose soft drink license was revoked by the city council after he was arrested on a charge of selling poison moonshine while causing the death of George Murdoch last summer, was again arrested Tuesday night on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

In his supposed barber shop, which is next door to his old location, Lobo sold to a "stool pigeon" f Sergeant Keegan a pint of moonshine, Keegan says.

The police allege the barber business is merely a ruse to get around the city council's order.

Keegan's men also arrested five others on similar charges. Edgar Sedar, Second and Everett streets; Eli Fovell, 85 North Second street; Dorothy Millak, 49 Everett street; Guy Palmette, 287 1/2 First street, and William W. DeBullis, 262 Second street.

Lobo was convicted by Judge Rossman in November for violating the prohibition law. He was sentenced to six months in the county jail and fined \$200. He is now out on bail pending appeal to the circuit court.

City of Portland Improvement Bonds Bring Good Price

City of Portland improvement bonds, 6 per cent, brought higher premiums in small quantities today than at the sale held last month. The bond issue sold was for \$224,489.50, dated November 1, 1931.

The bidders and amounts purchased follow: Bank of America, \$2000 worth, \$104 for \$100; H. S. Raney, \$2000 for \$103.52; Julius Harr, \$2000 for \$102.60; Jack Eldon, \$5000 for \$102.50; and Abner Tiehner, \$100,000 for \$102.25 and \$99,489.40 for \$103.21.

The prices bid on the last issue was \$103.50 for the entire issue amounting to \$617,000.

MAYOR SNYDER OF MILWAUKIE WILL FIGHT RECALLERS

Mayor J. M. Snyder of Milwaukee will not resign in the face of a threatened recall.

"I have no intention of resigning," said he in a statement to The Journal today, "for the reason that I have nothing to resign for. The books of the boxing commission are open for inspection at the First State bank, and I would welcome an inspection by any one. They will also be shown that I have not appropriated any of the money to my own use."

The statement of the mayor is in response to charges that the affairs of the boxing commission have been mismanaged and that the city has not received its due share of the proceeds, made by Charles Mullan, chief of the Milwaukee volunteer fire department, who is agitating the recall movement.

DENY MAKING PROFIT

According to members of the boxing commission, which is composed of W. H. Counsell, Frank Arighi and Albert Thomas, the reason that the city of Milwaukee has not been deriving any great return from the boxing exhibitions is that there has been no net profit.

George P. Moore, manager of the boxing arena, claims that the institution is \$20,000 in debt and even under these circumstances the city has received \$3000 which it could not legally claim.

Moore was under the wife's domination, which, according to Mayor Snyder, has been placed in the general fund of the city and expended for pavement and other municipal purposes.

SAY MULLAN WAS FIRED

To reduce the debt of the arena it is stated that the pay of Mullan for janitor service was reduced some time ago from \$100 to \$50 per month, and that the pay of a number of other super-numeraries was cut off, being limited to the amount of their regular salaries. It is charged that Mullan's real grievance lies.

In the meantime the boxing commission has discussed with Mullan's services as janitor.

Quick Sale, Small Profit Works O. K., But for \$250 Fine

The profit E. P. Harling made from one pint of whiskey he sold a federal prohibition agent, will fall far short of paying the fine Federal Judge Bean levied upon him this morning. Harling was fined \$250 on his plea of guilty.

Harry Fisher, in whose suitcase narcotic agents found cocaine and morphine, was sentenced to three months in the county jail. Fisher was arrested in a north end rooming house.

Trouble similar to that of Harling is probably due for Harry Casey of the Elmwood apartments, who is charged with selling a federal prohibition agent a bottle of liquor Tuesday afternoon. Following the sale a search warrant was secured and his apartment raided. Six bottles of liquor were confiscated by Dr. J. A. Linville, prohibition director.

JURY OBTAINED FOR TODD TRIAL

A federal jury to try John W. Todd for alleged sale of the mails to defraud Salemites out of approximately \$50,000, was agreed on at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The jury panel of 45 names was exhausted this morning, and a special venire of 10 men were called this afternoon before the defense attorneys accepted the jury.

Todd, who was formerly superintendent of public instruction at Salem, was indicted with Charles L. Byron, for alleged use of the mails to promote a land fraud scheme, in which residents of Marion county are said to have lost upwards of \$50,000. Byron is now a fugitive from justice, having recently forfeited \$5000 bond.

The present trial started Monday and a jury was selected. Tuesday morning one of the jurors, F. J. Steward, failed to appear, owing to illness. This morning he was excused, as he was still sick. Todd's attorneys attempted today to have the entire jury dismissed on the grounds of a mistrial. Judge Bean denied the motion, but allowed the defendant his 12 peremptory challenges. Defense attorneys made use of this right and have excused six of the original jurors.

Todd was tried on a similar indictment last November. The jury acquitted him on three counts and disagreed on the fourth. He has since been reindicted. He is now being tried on the one count of the old indictment and on the new indictment, which have been consolidated.

Board of Relief Wants to Spend More of \$80,000

The board of public relief will fall signally to ameliorate the sufferings from poverty in Multnomah county during 1932 unless it is able to secure more than \$80,000, the fund provided by the county for work during the coming year, according to A. R. Gephart, general secretary, who appeared before the county commissioners today.

Gephart has called a meeting for Thursday of the commissioners and Community chest officials to discuss the crisis. He will ask the Community chest to set aside additional funds for relief work.

He submitted a letter asking the commissioners to allow the board to spend more than 12 per cent of the \$80,000 budget during the present month. The rule laid down by the commissioners previously was that between \$12,000 and \$14,000 would be needed each winter month and between \$6000 and \$7000 each summer month, averaging \$10,000 a month, which would bring the total for the year up to \$120,000.

The commissioners filed the letter. They promised to take action Monday, following the meeting called for Thursday.

WANTED FOR FORGERY

Jack Berry, said to be an ex-convict from the Washington penitentiary, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Schirmer today on telegraphic request of Sheriff Springer of Walla Walla, Wash. Berry was wanted for forgery. He was found beating the snare drums in a north end picture theatre.

ARRESTED FOR LARCENY

F. A. Frisby was arrested today by deputy constables on a charge of larceny by bailee of an automobile. He was taken to the District Judge Detoh bound over to the grand jury on \$250 bail.

HAND HURT BY SAW

Baker, Jan. 18.—C. M. Tracey of Sumpter was brought to Baker for surgical attention to his hand, cut by a saw, while at work.

OVERSEAS NURSE CHOSEN

Chehalis, Wash., Jan. 18.—Miss Mabel Hamblin, overseas Red Cross nurse, has been named Lewis county nurse to succeed Miss Made Bradish, resigned.

\$100,000 in Bonds Stolen in Pouch Returned by Thief

South Bend, Ind., Jan. 18.—(I. N. S.) A government mail pouch, said to have contained hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of bonds, was stolen from a truck on the New York Central station platform at Elkhart at 4:30 o'clock this morning, according to information reaching here this afternoon. Three hours later a package containing \$100,000 worth of the bonds was found abandoned in the postoffice.

A note, pinned to the package, said: "Here's your bonds—Tommy O'Connor."

CEREMONY SIMPLE AT BOYD FUNERAL

Simple but impressive were the final services for Dr. John H. Boyd at the First Presbyterian church this afternoon. The church was thronged with the hundreds of friends of the man who was a leader in Portland's religious and civic life during the eight years he was pastor of the First Presbyterian church. Dr. Boyd died last Thursday night in a Chicago hospital. He had been ill about 18 months.

At the request of members of the immediate family, and in keeping with the known wishes of Dr. Boyd, no effort was made toward an elaborate service. The scripture was read by Dr. Edward H. Pence, pastor of Westminster Presbyterian church and a close friend of Dr. Boyd; the prayer was given by the Rev. Levi Johnson, superintendent of the Men's Resort. A brief talk was made by Dr. Harold Leonard Bowman, pastor of the church.

Two church hymns, known to be favorites of the deceased, were sung by the church choir. They were "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go."

Delegations were present from many churches in the city, including churches outside the denomination. Civic bodies in the city were represented by prominent officials and members.

The active pallbearers included seven official members of the church and A. J. Hale, president of the Rotary club. Honorary pallbearers were church officials and four past presidents of the Rotary club. The pallbearers were: A. S. Pattullo, W. S. Mackenzie, R. H. Crozier, Norris Woodley, Fletcher Linn, Arthur Gray, Frank Kerr and A. J. Bale.

Interment was at Riverview cemetery beside the body of Mrs. Boyd, who died about four years ago.

COMMITTEE FIRM ON LIBRARY SITE CHOICE, AS MADE

The extension committee of the Portland Library association at a meeting at noon today, decided there is no reason for reversing its decision on the location of the University Park branch library at Fluke and Lombard streets. The committee announced that it believes it accepted the best of two offers, after looking over the whole situation and studying it from both sides.

The Fluke and Lombard location, on which a building is to be leased from the University Park Methodist Episcopal church, has paved streets on two sides and the church people are ready to begin work on the structure at once.

The chief protest to this site was led by the Rev. John D. Rice, vicar of St. Andrews Episcopal church and secretary of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon.

"We closed the University Park branch library because the site was unsanitary and unsuitable," said E. B. McNaughton, a member of the library board, "and put it up to the residents to find a more suitable location and building which we would rent for library purposes. Two propositions came to us both of them for a building upon which we would have a five year lease. The matter was referred to the library extension committee to investigate with power to act."

"The two sites in controversy are only three blocks apart, the second being at Dodge street."

The library extension committee which recommended the Fluke and Lombard street site of the University Park Methodist Episcopal church, is composed of Robert Strong, chairman; Hugh Hirdman, R. L. Sablin Jr. and Amodeo M. Smith.

Objections to the Fluke-Lombard site raised by the Lombard-Hodge faction as given by the Rev. Rice are that it is several blocks from the Portsmouth public school and the Holy Cross parochial school and away from the center of the district served by the library.

Two Boys Suspected Of Thefts Detained

Russell Cornelius, 14, and Jack Major, 13, who were arrested on charges of robbing four business houses along Thurman street, are detained in the Fraser home, but as yet no date has been set for their hearing in the juvenile court. Among the loot were several flashlights, one of which had been purchased by Walter Brown, 16, 364 North Nineteenth street. When Inspectors Coleman and Collins questioned Brown it developed that the youth did not know it had been stolen and he was exonerated from all connection with the robberies.

HEIRS TO GET PENSION MONEY

Baker, Jan. 18.—County Clerk A. B. Combs received a telegram from Congressman N. J. Sinnott that a pension for William Dickerson of \$20 per month with \$1400 back pay from March 4, 1917, was allowed. Dickerson died Christmas day and the money will go to his heirs.

Strayer to seek reelection. A unanimous vote endorsed the stand taken by the two on taxation for support of the 1925 fair.

American Help in European Affairs Is Needed, Says Wirth

Berlin, Jan. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Germany wants the United States to interest herself in European affairs, particularly economic reconstruction. This is the attitude of the German government as revealed by Chancellor Wirth in an address to the convention of the Centrum (Catholic) party.

The chancellor decried the allied "lemon squeezing" policy. His plea for American participation in European affairs was couched in the following language:

"The reestablishing of inter-European relations cannot be achieved unless the United States is again disposed to take an interest in European affairs. Even America cannot reconstruct herself at home if the policy is continued of making the people alone answerable for all war damage."

Dr. Wirth expressed pride in his own policy of "reconciliation"—a policy by which he pledged Germany to carry out all the conditions imposed upon her by the allies.

"It has been a year of honest endeavor on our part," continued the chancellor. "We shall continue to take the same road. A signing course would be death to all policy."
