Low pressure prevails from Alberta to the middle and north Atlantic count, on the west fulf coast, and in Southern California and Southern Arizona. The principal depression is appearently central in Northern Saskatchewan. The remainder of the country is covered by an agree of light pressure, the center of which is in Northern Nevada. Precipitation has occurred at widely scattered points, having been heaviest in Tennessee. The weather is much milder in western Canada and parts of Washington, Montana and North Dakota, and in Tennessee, Pennayivania and the District of Columbia, and is much colder over an acea reaching from Southeastern Oregon, Nevada and California to the Mississippi valley. Killing frost occurred generally in Northern California. At Baker, Or., the temperature fell to 14 degrees below zero, which is as low as has ever been recorded there in January.
