

HARDING'S CALL FOR FARM MEET WEAKENS 'BLOC'

Washington, Jan. 19.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—There are two ways of looking at the president's request for the calling of a national conference on agriculture. One view is that it signifies only what is shown upon its face, a desire to find a comprehensive program for agricultural benefit. The other is that somebody has conceived a new idea for thwarting the agricultural bloc in congress.

REPORT NOT FINISHED
As a matter of fact, members of the bloc from the senate and sympathetic members from the house comprised the congressional committee. Representative Anderson of Minnesota, was chairman, and Senators Lenroot and McNary were conspicuous members from the sen-

ate. It was a body distinctly in sympathy with the farmer.
Even before this commission has completed its report comes the call of the president for a conference covering the same outline, but with its agenda broadened to include related interests. That brings the packers, the railroads, the implement makers, the canners, the commission men and others into the picture. A conference including these elements may desire to modify the "farmer program" of the congressional commission.

It seems likely, anyway, that congress will be asked to delay action on some of the measures favored by the agricultural bloc until the new commission has time to make its investigations and present its report. By that time it may not be possible to obtain action in congress at the present session, which may end in June or July and is already confronted with a jam.

TRICK NOT SUSPECTED
It is not supposed that the president is trying to trick anybody, but there is a suggestion going about that some of his advisers may have had the blocking of the bloc in mind. If congress waits for the conference to propose legislative measures, the farmer will unquestionably have a long wait ahead.

The bloc probably will go ahead with its efforts for early action, but its hand is weakened by the calling of a conference upon which plausible pleas for delay can be founded. There is also a plain inference that the administration is not satisfied that the commission named by congress has covered the ground that should be covered, otherwise this conference would not be called.

Motor Association Elects Officers at Annual Gathering

The Oregon State Motor association elected directors for the coming year at its annual meeting at the Multnomah hotel Wednesday night. Those chosen were: A. H. Seeger, Great Western Smelting & Refining company; George O. Brandenburg, editor the Oregon Motorist, and L. Therkelsen of the Braly Auto company. Frazier, Stettler and Therkelsen were re-elected to the board. The other four are new members.

The new directorate includes these seven and eight who served last year. From this number the directors will choose officers January 24. Reports were given by Treasurer F. C. Stettler, Secretary Charles R. Frazier and A. E. Shearer, assistant secretary. Membership was shown to have increased nearly 100 per cent in 1931. The question of the association's having an advertising and membership seeking booth in the automobile show next week was referred to a committee headed by A. B. Manley.

London, Jan. 19.—(I. N. S.)—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalists, expecting Greek evacuation of Asia Minor, is concentrating his forces in positions that threaten the Dardanelles, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Athens today.

The Exchange Telegraph circulated a Constantinople dispatch last Saturday saying it was reported from Ankara that Kemal had been assassinated.

Pastor Resigns So He May Hang 2 Men
Des Moines, Iowa, Jan. 19.—(I. N. S.) William E. Robb, sheriff-preacher of Polk county, has resigned as pastor of the Federated church, "to avoid criticism when I execute Orrie Cross and Eugene Weeks." Cross and Weeks will be hanged in April.

VET DRUG DEPOT MAY LOCATE HERE

Washington, Jan. 19.—(I. N. S.)—The flinging of a network of government medical depots across the continent at a cost of \$7,000,000 for the treatment of wounded veterans in their home towns, will be recommended to congress by Director Forbes of the Veterans' bureau, it was learned today.

The program, which is the largest of its nature ever undertaken by the government, has been approved by the department. It includes the establishment of 62 new dispensaries and improvements, with new equipment for 77 others. It will add an army of 1850 medical workers to the hospitalization personnel.

The plan, Director Forbes said, will solve the treatment of wounded veterans. The need of local medical depots, he said, has been one of the bureau's most serious problems to date. One new Class A depot will be established at Kansas City at an expenditure of \$44,625 for space and equipment. With all other Class A dispensaries, it will carry \$4800 worth of drugs in stock. Ten other Class A depots will be enlarged, with new equipment provided. These dispensaries with the appropriations allowed are: Philadelphia, \$19,810; Pittsburgh, \$35,885; New Orleans, \$23,885; Cincinnati, \$10,945; Detroit, \$30,700; Minneapolis, \$15,535; San Francisco,

\$10,000; Los Angeles, \$10,650, and Seattle, \$26,490.
Six new Class B dispensaries will be established in Buffalo, Rochester, Albany, Omaha, Oklahoma City and Portland, Or. Each will have \$14,130 worth of new equipment, appropriations of about \$5000 each for floor space and drug stocks of \$2000.

Student Samples Poison Passed Around and Dies

Washington, Jan. 19.—(I. N. S.)—A thirst for knowledge cost Eugene Neary, 22, his life today.
Neary was a medical student at Georgetown university. He was particularly interested in poisons. During a lecture on poisons by one of the faculty the professor passed around among the students a few small samples of a deadly acontine. Neary put a small portion on his tongue to get the taste. He died soon afterward.

To Complete Plans For Program for Industries Week

Members of the general committee in charge of the Oregon industries week exhibit, which will be opened in the green room of the Chamber of Commerce Monday, following a public reception in the Oregon building, were scheduled to meet this afternoon to complete details for the show and the pro-

gram of social functions which will feature the week.
Monday's program following the public reception will be arranged by the Chamber of Commerce. A dinner, vaudeville sketch and dance are planned. On Tuesday the program will be arranged by the Portland Federation of Women's organization with a tea in the afternoon and a banquet in the evening. Wednesday the Portland Ad club will prepare stunts and a dinner. Thursday the Chamber of Commerce, the Business and Professional Women's league will provide entertainment and Friday the Associated Industries of Oregon will hold a dinner dance.

Coyote Poisoning Plans Successful, Jewett Declares

Huge success in the cooperative coyote poison campaign being conducted in Crook and Wheeler counties is reported by Stanley G. Jewett of the United States biological survey. The forest service in the Ochoco national forest has got out a lot of dead animals for poison stations, said Jewett. At the first station on the first night three coyotes were killed.
Wheeler county, after paying bounty of \$3 in excess of the state bounty, found in December that a large number of skins were being brought in from Grant and other counties. It immediately revoked the bounty January 1.
The Wheeler County Wool Growers' association is cooperating with the biological survey and has ordered 20 ounces of special processed poison for use this year and in March will make its plans for next year and order direct from the survey at Washington.

Missing Rector Is Back; Specialist to Test His Mentality

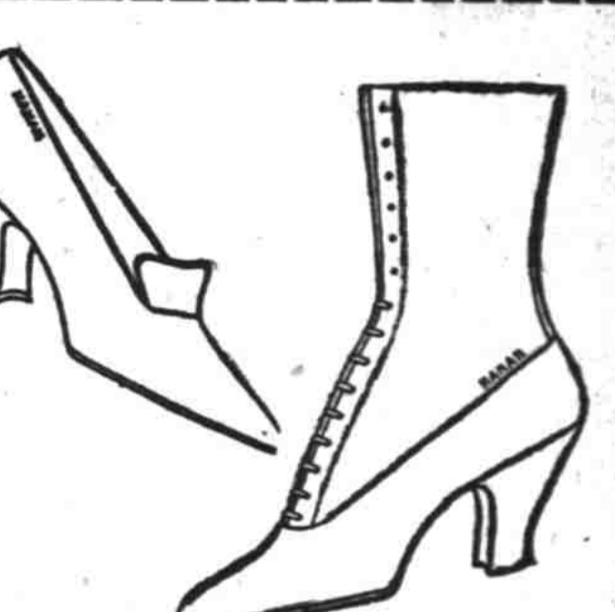
