WEATHER CONDITIONS Low pressure prevails in Alaska and north-western Carnada, while the entire United States is covered by two high pressure areas, one cen-trai in the upper Mississippi valley and the other in Northern Nervada. Precipitation has occurred along and hear the north Pacific coast, and in the gulf states and Tennessee. The heariest rainfall reported was 1.48 inches at Mashfield, Or. Milder weather prevails over most of the country, the change amounting to more than 30 degrees in Southerts Alberta, but except over small areas the imperature is still below normal, the great-est deficiency being in the upper Mississippi val-ley.
