

### AUTO SHOW ADDS BUYING INTEREST; ATTENDANCE GAINS

In the matter of financial benefit to Portland automobile distributors, the present automobile show promises to be the most successful in years. A prominent dealer declared Tuesday that buying interest on the part of out-of-town dealers is three times as great as last year.

Dealers from Eastern, Central and Southern Oregon will monopolize the program of the show today, with a meeting this morning to organize a state dealers' and service men's association and a banquet at 6 p. m. at the Benson hotel at which the Portland Dealers' association will entertain out-of-town dealers.

An entertainment intended to present conditions of 10 years ago was staged by members of the Old Timers' club, which includes veterans of the industry throughout the country, at the Benson hotel Tuesday night. The party began with a dinner at 10 p. m., after the doors were closed for the night on the automobile show, and continued after midnight. Vaudeville and musical numbers of the last decade served to create hilarity. The party was arranged by A. S. Robinson, H. M. Covey and Arnold Cohen.

An accident that recalled the old troubles of motorists occurred during the parade of aged automobiles Tuesday. While cranking his car, a 1910 Franklin, after it had stopped in the parade, W. F. Grunow, one of the entrants, received a jolt from the recalcitrant motor that knocked him to the pavement and broke his arm.

Visitors to the automobile show from all parts of the state continue to pour into the city. Attendance of out-of-town dealers is expected to break all records when the registrations for today are reported.

### Christian Science Directors Suggest Two for Trustees

Boston, Jan. 25.—Judge Clifford Smith of courts for the Christian Science board of directors Tuesday suggested to Supreme Court Justice Crosby the names of two more men acceptable to the directors for appointment as trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society. The names are those of C. A. Norwood, Brooklyn, Mass., general counsel for the Christian Science church, and Sara Palmer, Denver, head of the Christian Science publishing committee in Colorado.

Counsel for the de facto trustees, Herbert W. Rustace and Paul Harvey, have notified the court that they endorse for the appointments Fred Lamson, James Patton and Irving B. Howe.

### Physician Held to Answer Charges of Sale of Morphine

Dr. Charles Lisicum, 401 Raleigh building, was held to answer to the federal grand jury Tuesday afternoon by United States Commissioner Fraser on a charge of selling morphine and cocaine without proper prescriptions. Federal officials stated during the hearing that Dr. Lisicum is not a licensed physician and therefore not entitled under the law even to have the drug in his possession. Assistant United States Attorney Flegal refused to consent to a reduction of bail from \$2500. The defendant said he could not furnish \$2500 bond.

### Bend Legion Wins Fight on Japanese

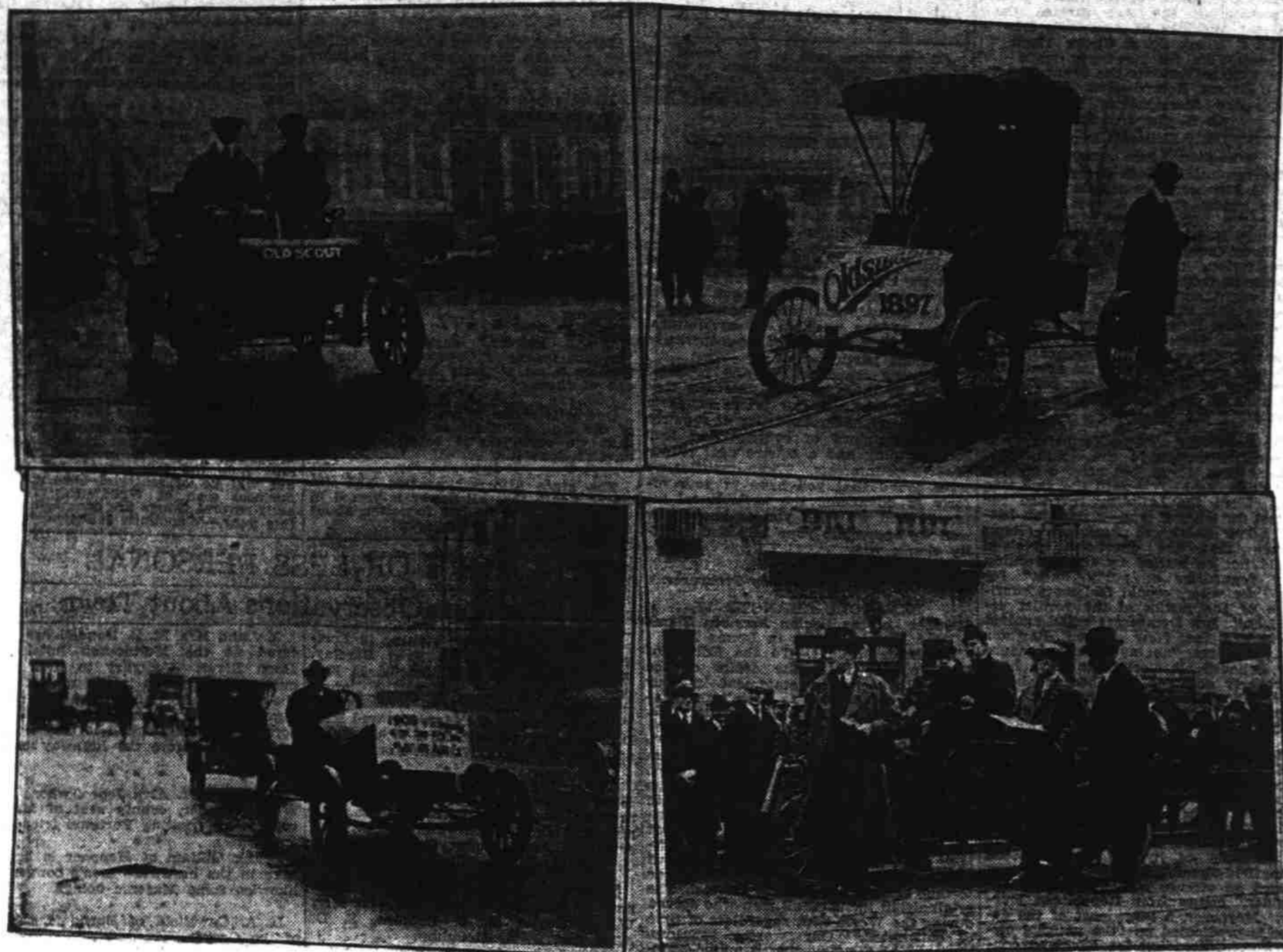
