Washington, Jan. 26.—(WASHING-ON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)— Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, in his traffic club address at Philadelphia a ew days ago, added his voice to the de-mand that freight rates come down, tak-

mand that freight rates come down, taking their share in the drop with the prices of farm products.

"Forty per cent of our people are directly dependent upon what they grow from the soil," said Mr. Wallace, "and the purchasing power of that 40 per cent cannot long continue so seriously out of relation to the purchasing power of the other 60 per cent. If we do not recognize the national danger in this condition and take prompt measures to cure it, the cure will come through the operation of brutal economic forces which will lay upon the 60 per cent who ch will lay upon the 60 per cent who not live on the farms a burden beavy Mr. Wallace pointed out that after the railroads were confronted with largely increased operating costs they sought relief from federal authority, and were given an increase in rates. For a time the farmer did not suffer, for his products commanded high prices, also. Then prices for the farmer's main crops went down below cost of production and below pre-war normal. In lowa, his home state, corn is worth only 65 per cent of pre-war prices.

In railroad rates, however, the Iowa farmer pays 150 per cent more than he did before the war, and 160 per cent of former rent and taxes. Agriculture canthat the farmers are now bearing."
