

EPISCOPALIANS URGED TO GIVE CHILD ATTENTION

A call to arms to the need of religious education in the Episcopal churches of Oregon was issued this morning at the diocesan convention by the Rev. Thomas Jenkins, rector of St. David's parish and chairman of the religious education committee of the diocese.

The speaker said the Episcopal church could not survive in this state unless more attention is paid to the children. He declared that the church was only increasing one half child per communicant.

John W. Lethaby, executive secretary of the nation-wide campaign, also spoke to this point. He said during the last 10 years that the diocese has been merely marking time. He said the church had increased 25 per cent in membership, the Sunday schools but 10 per cent, while the public schools had increased 50 per cent.

ROSEBURG SENDS CHECK

But for the erection of missions in new settlements and the gathering in of children there, Lethaby said the church would have shown an actual loss. Lethaby became so enthused during his talk that he offered to give \$50 if nine others would follow, toward a \$400 religious educational fund. The convention also voted to expend \$600 for this purpose and considered the matter of employing a part time secretary to do Sunday school work.

While the convention was in session this morning Bishop W. T. Sumner was handed a check for \$250 from the Roseburg parish to be applied on its deficit. This parish is without a rector.

The convention memorialized the general convention to change the name of the National Wide Campaign to a name "not so cumbersome and more expressive of the purposes of the drive."

SLATER REELECTED

Judge W. T. Slater was reelected chancellor of the diocese, and Bishop Sumner announced that Dr. William Hornefall of Marshfield had given a site in Bandon for an Episcopal church in memory of his father, the late Dean William Hornefall.

The pension committee reported that all pension money had been paid in full by every parish, so every deceased pastor's family in the diocese would be entitled to the full amount due it.

Election of delegates to the general convention and discussion of the question of depriving churches of lay representation at the convention when assessments are not paid in full will occupy the afternoon session. The convention will adjourn this evening.

Chaplain Howard introduced a resolution asking the general convention to recommend that the church canon of marriage and divorce be printed in the book of the next prayer book. The resolution carried. The matter will be referred to the next general convention.

State Attempts to Prove Killing Was Caused by Tong War

Lee Fong, Hop Sing, told of the tong affiliations of the murdered man and alleged murderer.

BODY OF POPE IS PLACED IN VAULT

Rome, Jan. 25.—(U. P.)—Pope Benedict's mortal remains were interred today in the vault of St. Peter's.

With ceremonies unforgettable for picturesqueness and solemnity the body was placed in its casket and borne to the sarcophagus.

Starting at 3 p. m. the services were finished an hour later. A vast throng stood outside the cathedral during the ceremony.

The burial service was begun when the cardinals of the sacred college, each carrying a lighted candle, began arriving by interior corridors and stairways from the Sistine chapel in the adjoining Vatican. They were escorted by the patriarchs and heads of the religious orders and took their seats in the sacramental chapel where the body of Pope Benedict was still lying in state.

PROCESSION MOVES
The procession then moved toward the entrance to the vault, the choir beginning the anthem "In Paradisum." One by one the highest dignitaries of the church, in their pontifical robes, gave absolution. An anthem "In excelsis" was then sung, after which Cardinal Merry Del Val gave the body of the pontiff final absolution.

The four private chaplains placed the plain wooden coffin in one of cyprus. The three bags containing the gold, silver and bronze medals struck during Pope Benedict's reign, and a parchment containing a brief history of the reign, were placed in the casket.

A white veil was spread over the pontiff's face and the body was covered with a red silken shroud. The coffin was then placed in the vault, and the archbishop of the Vatican.

THREE CASKETS USED
The casket of cyprus was placed in one of oak, which, in turn, was enclosed in a chestnut case and, amid the chanting of the choir, deposited in the temporary sarcophagus.

The pope's private chaplains and secretaries advanced toward the bier, knelt and slowly lifted the body of the pontiff and placed it in a wooden coffin lined with silk. Cardinal Merry Del Val descended from the altar with all of his assistants and took his place in front of the coffin.

CHORUS SINGS
The bier, borne by the four private chaplains of the pope, was surrounded by a detachment of the noble guards, while the canons of St. Peter's acted as an escort of honor to the sacred college.

Slowly as the bier moved out from the sacramental chapel into the main body of the basilica, the members of the sacred college fell into line, two by two, behind the bier, and finally, dressed in deepest mourning, and finally priests and clergy.

The procession moved slowly to the singing of the Sistine choir, accompanied by the huge organs of St. Peter's. The spectacle was seen in its full grandeur when, after crossing from the right to the left nave of the basilica, it swung under the great central nave, halting for a few seconds in front of the bronze statue of St. Peter and next in front of the confessional, where the statue of Pope Clement XIII kneels in the act of prayer.

PONTIFICAL REQUIEM HIGH
MASS HELD HERE FOR POPE

Hundreds of Portland Catholics thronged St. Mary's cathedral this morning for the solemn pontifical requiem.

The altar of the cathedral was draped in mourning and the special celebration centered around the catafalque. The Most Rev. Alexander Christie, archbishop of the diocese of Oregon City, was celebrant. He was assisted by priests and clergy of the diocese.

Following the mass the sermon was given by Monsignor Lane of Albany, who enjoyed a 12-minute audience with the late pope last June, when he went to Rome as the personal representative of the archbishop.

The speaker took issue with press dispatches stating that the pope sought to extend the temporal power of the Holy See. He said that was "not the concern of the late Benedict. His one ambition was the salvation of souls."

Anti-Lynching Bill Is Passed by House

Washington, Jan. 25.—(U. P.)—The house late today passed the anti-lynching bill. Democrats fought the bill to the finish, but lost on the final roll call, 230 to 173. Democrats rose and cheered as Representative Alice Robertson, Oklahoma, voted against the measure.

SEPARATE ASYLUM FOR CRIMINALLY INSANE IS ADVISED

A separate asylum for criminally insane people should be established, in the opinion of Dr. W. T. Williamson, alienist, representing the Oregon State Medical association, who delivered an address before the annual meeting of the District Attorneys' Association of Oregon in the commonwealth today.

Dr. Williamson recommended that this asylum should be established so that the criminally insane might be detained long enough to safeguard community interests and from which the patient could not be readily discharged. He also advocated official medical recommendation and the recommendation of a non-partisan medical expert board should be required before any release could be made from the institution.

The attorneys will continue in session Friday. The two-day session was called to discuss problems confronting them today and to bring about a closer cooperation.

According to investigations made by Dr. Williamson, there are the insane, moral paretic and selfish classes of convicts who have been committed as insane to the insane asylum, most of them having committed crimes which were the product of insane control or impulse.

"There are persons who by heredity or environment are strophical, or otherwise affected physically, morally and intellectually, whereby they have attenuated or are without responsibility for the commission of the crime," stated Dr. Williamson.

"Society defense and criminal reformation should be the guiding principles. Sec. He said that the infliction of punishment as such. The characteristics of the individual rather than the crime should determine the quality and duration of the sentence."

"The knowledge of right and wrong and the knowledge of the penalty of the act as a test of responsibility for the crime should be regarded by adding the criterion that the accused must possess the power to do, or forbear doing, the alleged criminal act."

The principal speaker of the afternoon session was W. W. Williams, handwriting expert, who spoke on the "Principles of Forgery and Certainty of Detection." A round table discussion and election of officers was to complete the meetings of the afternoon session.

DR. LOVEJOY IS HERE FOR VISIT WITH HER MOTHER

Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, chairman of the executive board of the American Women's hospital, is visiting her mother, Mrs. A. M. Clayson, 328 Williams avenue, having reached Portland from her headquarters at New York this morning.

Dr. Lovejoy has had varied experiences since leaving Portland in the latter part of 1920. Most of the time she spent in her office at New York, in the administration of the executive work of the hospital, in which she is greatly interested and of which she is the executive head.

OVERSEAS THREE MONTHS

For three months, however, Dr. Lovejoy was overseas inspecting the string of hospitals maintained by her organization in Serbia, Armenia, Russia and other sections, when the time has come monthly by the American Women's hospital has taken over the Erivan district of the Near East Relief. Plans are now being perfected to go into Russia proper, probably with the Hoover relief.

While in Macedonia, Dr. Lovejoy was stricken with "sand fly" fever, something unknown to this country but prevalent there. It is a fever of usually short duration, but carrying a high temperature and leaving an extended period of depression in its wake. The malady is transmitted from person to person by the bite of a transparent and an almost microscopic fly, which can scarcely be seen with the naked eye until after it has filled up on blood.

Dr. Lovejoy will visit in Portland for about two weeks before returning to her office in New York. She intends to spend much of her time here "getting saturated with good Chinook air," she says, and plans to come back here some day when the time has come which will permit her to live in Oregon all the time. But for the present she is all wrapped up in the advancement of the American Women's hospital, which she considers one of the biggest constructive things that has come out of the war. She has a dream, she says, of seeing a string of hospitals, maintained by her organization, scattered throughout the United States and devoted to the maternity needs of women in America.
