

### JENKINS IS CHOSEN VICE PRESIDENT AT BELLINGHAM MEET

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 26.—(U. P.)—Talk at the sheriff's convention here today centered largely around the \$25,000 school in Seattle for instruction of peace officers in modern methods of criminal detection.

More than 40 deputy sheriffs have already pledged to enter the school and take intensive courses in handwriting, chemistry, analytical psychology, microscopic work, photography, electricity, phonology and kindred subjects.

The school is to be conducted by Luke S. May, chief of the Reveille International Secret Service of Seattle, who was elected president of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police.

The sheriff's convention moved to Vancouver, B. C. Tonight the officers will close their annual session, which lasted for two days here, with a "blow-out" in Vancouver as the guests of the constabulary and the city and provincial police.

Other officers chosen were: Vice president, Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins of Portland, and secretary, Sheriff Clarence E. Long of Spokane.

The board of governors are: Chief of Police James Anderson and Sheriff Charles McDonald of Vancouver, representing British Columbia; Sheriff B. Rennie of Lincoln county, who with Sheriff Matt Starwick of Seattle, represents Washington; Captain of Police L. A. Harms of Portland and James Dunson, chief special agent of the S. P. & S. railway, representing Oregon; Sheriff J. L. Woody and T. L. Quarles, representing Idaho, and Constable David Ritchie and Commissioner Alfred Cuddy, representing Alberta.

### School Housing Big Problem at Capital

Salem, Jan. 26.—With the high school and junior high school here already filled beyond intended capacity and new classes in prospect with the new term, the Salem school board is confronted with a serious housing problem. Entrance of the new freshman class in February will increase the high school enrollment to approximately 825 in buildings planned to accommodate but 700. At the Washington junior high school 400 pupils are studying in a school planned to accommodate 100. The school board has under consideration the advisability of providing two portable school buildings to care for the increased enrollment.

### S. Benson Helps Out Loan Fund at O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 26.—Simon Benson of Portland has deposited \$2000 for the student loan fund as a help through the present crisis. The loans have amounted to \$6514.50 this year—an increase of 175 per cent over the same time last year, and the funds are virtually depleted. Computing the needs of students for the rest of this year at the present rate of increase, the committee anticipates requests will amount to \$30,188.50. Salem alumni sent in a check for \$50 and \$130 was raised by the College Women's club at a benefit.

### Endeavorers Hear Appeal for Peace

A strong appeal for peace and a suggestion that the Christian Endeavor forces of the nation join in the demand for a warless world, was made at the First Presbyterian church Wednesday night by Dr. Ira Landwehr of Chicago, before a gathering of several hundred Portland Endeavorers.

"Our boys are the cannon fodder of tomorrow and our girls the war nurses," he said, "and therefore peace is a young people's affair."

**KIRBY APPEAL ARGUED**  
Salem, Jan. 26.—Argument of the appeal of Elvie D. Kirby, attacking the constitutionality of the state capital punishment law, was presented before the supreme court Wednesday afternoon. The executions of Kirby, John Rathle and Dan Casey have all been stayed by reprieve from Governor O'cott, pending action by the supreme court.

### Legion Commander For Fort Stevens As Veteran Center

Astoria, Jan. 26.—The support of the American Legion in its effort to establish a vocational training and rehabilitation center for disabled veterans of the World war at Fort Stevens was pledged Wednesday in a telegram received by Clatsop post from Hanford MacNider, national commander. The official promised to rush the matter through the proper channels in an attempt to have the new training center due the Northwest established at Fort Stevens.

The efforts of Clatsop as the center followed the recent visit of George M. Hyland, representing the veterans' bureau, and a number of other officials, who declared the coast defense post a few miles west of Astoria admirably suited for a rehabilitation station. The barracks and cantonments at the fort can accommodate 2000 men. It is provided with a large hospital, with recreation facilities, and Hyland declared the climate at Fort Stevens to be ideal for the purpose proposed.

### Three in Rowboat Reach Land Safely

Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 26.—After being 20 hours adrift in a rowboat in which they left Taholah for Raft river Saturday night, Harold Armerman of Seattle, William French, said to be of Portland, and a third man, who were thought to have been lost, landed safely on Destruction island.

### Last Stage Coach Barn Is Destroyed

Salem, Jan. 26.—With the destruction of the old barn on the Sam Brown donation land claim, 10 miles north of Salem, the last reminder of the old stage coach days has disappeared. The barn, razed to make way for a more modern structure, was one of a string of similar barns along the route of the old Oregon-California stage line, which flourished in the days of the gold rush to California.

### Woman Breaks Neck Combing Her Hair

Syracuse, N. Y., Jan. 26.—Miss Helen Winkley, 31, a nurse, jerked her head while combing her hair and broke her neck. She is now confined to her bed, and has not moved since Sunday.
