Grace & Co., will also get away tomorrow and probably the French teamship St. Joseph. The to to Ecuador, Peru and Chile with ixed cargo. The Frenchman will have 4500 tons of grain for the continent and 750 tons of flour for Mexico. She also has 200 tons of pig lead.
