

WHEAT SHIPMENTS FOR SIX MONTHS DOUBLE '21 MARK

First 7 Months of Cereal Year Featured by Heavy Movement; Puget Sound Ahead on Flour.

During the first seven months of the cereal year Portland shipped by water 26,069,525 bushels of wheat to all ports as compared with 12,106,872 bushels for the corresponding period of 1920-21.

Exports of wheat for the period closing January 31 were only 4,276,019. Grain shipments from Portland for January topped those of the same month of 1921 by 450,000 bushels, according to figures compiled by the Merchants Exchange.

Puget Sound takes the lead in flour shipments for the seven months with 2,037,082 barrels against 1,413,468 barrels shipped from the Columbia river. The grand total of the wheat and flour shipments from the Northwest amounted to 47,873,019 as compared with 28,861,008 bushels for the corresponding period of 1920-21.

Republican Offshoot From Russia Sanely Applies Tested Methods of Government—Leaders Able.

Helsinki, Finland, Jan. 1.—Through sane application of tested methods of government along democratic lines, the Finnish republic has emerged from a formative period covering four years as one of the most vigorous and economically solid of the many states born during the war.

Foreigners visiting Finland, especially those who have sojourned in soviet Russia, are impressed by the contrast between these two political states, which were born during the same years of the world's convulsion.

It may not be correct to assign all of Finland's well-being to the fact that she adopted a republican form of government. Her people are innately industrious and to them must go the greatest share of the credit, but the effects of a balanced, representative government were all favorable to rapid reconstruction.

SURVIVES RED REVOLUTION. During 1918 the Finnish people were embroiled in the seething political conflict that raged in Russia with the same extreme of opinion fighting supremacy.

First, there is the impression in many quarters that Finland's population harbors a predominant element of Red and radical Socialists, and that another revolution with possibilities of great assistance from Russia might occur at any moment.

WHITE GUARD STILL POWER. If Russia ever has the temerity to undertake a war with Finland, it will be with full knowledge that nine tenths of the population must be killed or subjugated under iron military rule.

WORLD SUPPORT SISTER STATES. This same spirit of independence also militates against any new regrouping or assignment of control in the Russian border states such as suggested by certain American statesmen who believe that Estonia and Latvia, at least, should become a Finnish independence.
