The San Carlo Grand Opera will present "Madame Butterfly" tonight at the Auditorium as the initial offering of a week of grand opera. Tamaki Miura, the Japanese soprano whom critics the world over agree is the best interpreter of this role on the operatic stage, will make her first appearance with the San Carlo here. Tamaki Miura has been heard in Portland twice before, featured by the Chicago opera company when Cleofonte Campanini was the conductor. Tomorrow evening in "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliacci" several other popular artists will be heard. Among these are Bianca Tancori, soprano, and Romeo Boscacci, a tenor of noteworthy voice, in "Cavalleria Rusticana." In "Pagliacci" the great favorite, Anna Pizzi, will make her first appearance of the season. Gaetano Tommasini, hailed as one of the great living dramatic tenors, will also sing in this production. Joseph Boyer, the famous French Canadian baritone, will make his appearance here in this opera. The curtain at the evening performance will be at 8:15 sharp, while the matinee begins at 2:30.

New York, Feb. 13.—It always seemed a pity that florists did not take up the lovely garden flower which it deserves to be. But what the florists have neglected, the fashionmakers have adopted and adopted with an enthusiasm which makes up for former slight. Along Fifth avenue the shop windows are glorious with the strong yellow shade known this spring as dandelion. It is seen on cotton crepe sport skirts, in Jersey gowns, in sweaters, in parasols, in silks, chiffons and satins. There are hats of it, being made in straw, satin and silk with a softly curling plume of the same shade or a knot of flowers. One wide satin hat shown is trimmed with a little pyramid of flowers at the front of the crown and among the yellow blossoms were just two in the dandelion shade. There are white sport gloves, too, stitched with dandelion silk.

London, Feb. 13.—Among the prettiest of the spring frocks is the flowered organdie. A little knot of flowers emerges from the shoulder and three other little knots are scattered over a slightly bouffant skirt, compose the chief decoration for one model. Another gown, which is sprinkled with tiny embroidered flowers in many vivid hues. A tawny sand organdie has large copper tinted satin roses here and there on the skirt and a row of satin roses at the rather low waist line. There are organdie hats, not in matching, but in contrasting shades, to go with these desirable gowns. at Liberty

ED "HOOT" GIBSON, the cowboy movie star, who won high honors at the Portland Round-Up in 1932, is appearing in person at the Liberty this week in connection with his latest starring vehicle, "Headin' West."

A clever little monologue has been arranged to introduce "Hoot" to the Portland movie fans. "Hoot" rides up on the stage on a beautiful white horse, wearing typical cowboy apparel. He explains how he broke into the movie in a most delightful way and he was cheered to the rafters in his first appearance.

"Hoot" is a handsome, likable sort of fellow, with a contagious grin and the slouching walk of the cow puncher. His yellow hair is combed so that one lock falls over his forehead, and with his sombrero tipped back on his head in nonchalant fashion he is the cowboy from head to foot. His voice is well modulated and his personality delightful.

"Headin' West" is a thrilling Western drama with Gibson taking all the honors. "Hoot" has plenty of opportunity to fight and make love though the picture lacks the usual kissing bee at the fade-out. The plot is after the usual Western type, with bad villains and cattle rustlers in evidence. It is "Hoot's" part to round up the whole bunch, which he does very creditably.

"Hoot," who takes the part of Bill Perkins in the cinema, enters the picture via parachute after a leap from an airplane high in the clouds, upon which he was beating his way. He lands on the "Half Moon" ranch and is engaged as a dishwasher after an unsuccessful attempt to ride a wild horse. It later develops that one of the cowboys had doctored the saddle, accounting for Ben's fall.

After several battles, thrilling rescues and tense moments, Bill establishes himself as heir to the ranch and is awarded a good looking bride. The supporting cast is very good, though no stars are in evidence.

"Hoot" will appear five times daily at Liberty all this week. A clever comedy finishes a very good bill.
