

BRITISH LINER DROPS TO PORT BRINGING 1500 TONS OF PLATE

The British liner *Corinthian*, under charter to the Portland Flouring Mills company, will arrive at Portland today and will load flour for Dartford in Manchuria. The steamer was fixed several weeks ago and brought a cargo of raw sugar to Vancouver, B. C., from New York.

A full cargo of flour to Manchuria or any part of the Orient is unusual at this time. Grain has been going in full cargo shipments but flour only in parcel lots and mostly on owners' account. The rate on the *Corinthian* is private and was made by M. H. Houser for orders.

There is a steady demand for wheat in the Orient and two Japanese vessels of the Suzuki line will be before the end of the month with full cargoes. In the parcel lot shipments space has been taken on all the regular liners. The steamer *Vinita* of the North China line of the Columbia-Pacific is due today with general cargo and will sail on regular schedule with mixed cargo.

GRAYS HARBOR WORKING

Hoquiam, Wash., Feb. 18.—Grays Harbor will get a sea-going dredge if congress makes its appropriation for work on rivers and harbor work, according to Alex. Polson, who has returned from Washington, D. C., where he and Frank H. Lamb, president of the Port of Grays Harbor, conferred with engineers and members of congress relative to securing a dredge for the harbor.

The engineers, Mr. Polson said, have plans for a dredge and if one is enough is appropriated for the two, Grays Harbor will get one.

STEERING WHEEL STRIKES

CAPTAIN FRACTURES LEG
Hoquiam, Wash., Feb. 18.—Captain Hans K. Johnson, veteran master of the bar tug *John Cudahy*, sustained a compound fracture of the right leg below the knee and painful cuts about the head and shoulders when he was struck yesterday afternoon by the steering wheel of the tug. The rudder of the ship was struck by the wheel, causing a powerful turning of the wheel which he was unable to dodge. The tug, which is owned by the Grays Harbor steamer company, was in the harbor at the time.

MIRACLES OF THE STRIP COST THE CITY \$19,917

Acqurement and improvement of the 30-foot triangular strip of land at Hawthorne and East Water streets for street area cost the city \$1119.91, according to the report filed this morning by O. Laugaard, city engineer.

The strip formerly owned by the Page Investment company was purchased by the city for \$609 and has been converted into street area. The cost of laying curbs and hardurfacing pavement, which was done by the municipal paving plant, amounted to \$511.91.

A. G. Johnson, assistant commissioner of public works, pointed out that by taking over the strip the city has eliminated a corner that was dangerous to traffic. Formerly a telephone pole stood at the intersection of the street into street area. The cost of laying curbs and hardurfacing pavement, which was done by the municipal paving plant, amounted to \$511.91.

The demand for a station at the foot of Washington street is of long standing, but due to the viaduct, high grade and single track, railroad officials have contented that it would be an inconvenience. The union station is more than a mile from the business center of the city, and passengers from towns up the river have been carried by and forced to walk back, due to lack of streetcar service from the station.

World War Vet Dies In Refrigerator Car

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 18.—(U. P.)—Mute evidence of a futile fight for life on the part of a man in the icebox of a sealed and empty refrigerator car was discovered in the Boise freight yards Friday evening when yard attendants broke into the car and made the gruesome find of the frozen body of a young man, approximately 25 years old, and evidently a former seaman. The face was covered with ice.

S. P. & S. Agrees to Downtown Station Plan at Vancouver

Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 18.—Superintendent Davidson of the S. P. & S. railroad has promised to stop incoming local passenger trains at the foot of Washington street to discharge passengers, according to Mayor John P. Kingma, who in conference with Davidson Thursday urged the advantage of the concession. The council will be asked to erect a platform and a small waiting room there, as this is one of the conditions of the agreement.

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THOUSAND WOMEN AND CHILDREN ARE KILLED BY TURKS

Rome, Feb. 18.—(I. N. S.)—The resignation of Premier Bonomi and his cabinet is in the hands of King Victor Emmanuel today for the second time in less than three weeks, as a result of the defeat inflicted upon the government in the chamber of deputies Friday. The Bonomi ministry failed to get a vote of confidence.

Retrial Denied in Circus Holdup Case

Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 18.—A motion and affidavit were filed Friday by George Vanderveer, in the case of Roy Moore and Bert Orcutt, convicted circus holdup men, for a stay of 30 days to allow time to file a bill of exceptions, also for an order directing the official court reporter to prepare a transcript of the trial at the expense of Clarke county.

The transcript would cost approximately \$350 and that his clients are without funds, that he received a promissory note for \$225 payable in six months signed by an uncle of Orcutt for the transcript. Judge Simpson recently denied the application for a free transcript. Judge Simpson denied a motion for a new trial and the case will be retried on February 17.

Thousands of Women and Children Are Killed by Turks

London, Feb. 18.—(I. N. S.)—One thousand women and children are reported to have been massacred by Turkish nationalists in the region of Samoun, according to an exchange telegraph dispatch from Constantinople today. The Greek residents of the Samsun district were said to have risen in arms against the Turks and bitter fighting was in progress for several days.

The Turks were reported to be under orders to give no quarter. Samoun is on the Black sea in the Vilayet of Trebizond.
