

'WORLD MARKET' PRICES COMING BACK TO BERLIN

Berlin, Feb. 21.—"World market prices" which, according to German economists, were needed to keep the bank note presses busy and stabilize the German market, are gradually going into effect in many important industries, with the result that the glamor of Germany as the star in the sky of cheap countries is fading gradually. The chain of conferences held by leading business men to find means of preventing Germany from going bankrupt was endless in the solution. Germany could not afford to continue selling her products at prices which, for a time, were below the world standard and attract so many foreign buyers that this country almost had to put out the "sold out" sign, according to industrial statistics.

TARIFF WAS OBSTACLE
By and by Germany also realized that there were two prices while keeping the factories busy and the unemployment figures acted as a boomerang because many countries put into effect protective tariffs which either entirely barred German products or put prohibitive tariffs on them. Confronted with this problem, and also with the allied demands at Cannes, that the printing of paper money had to be discontinued, the government also figured that by putting new taxes on products of every kind prices necessarily would have to go up, and so new taxes were slipped on, sometimes several times the original tax to foreign countries.

RESULT IS NOTICEABLE
The result is already quite noticeable. The number of buyers who have come from the United States to Germany this winter has been almost insignificant as compared with that of two winters ago, when Americans placed contracts running into millions of marks for everything from needles and toys to Diesel motors. Other countries have been equally conspicuous by their purchasing of German goods. Marks have gone up tenfold.

Berlin is now having its "fashion week," which is said to attract large numbers of buyers from Scandinavia, Holland, Switzerland and other European countries. Last year the prices for tailor-made gowns were around 2000 marks, while this year one cannot look at anything under 30,000 marks.

WAGES TAKE RISE
It is pointed out the wages have gone up only slightly in the last year, while the clothing manufacturers are in the agreement to charge "world market prices." Foreign buyers say they can buy the same or better gowns in Paris for the same price.

What this situation will lead to, German manufacturers have not yet figured out. Travelers' associations, which are already hoping that foreign tourists in large numbers will come to Germany this summer and leave some of their gold
