

Chicago Lightweight Beats Title Contender : Heavy Advance Sale for Boxing Smoker

Jackson Gets Real Drubbing; White Winner

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—Little Hymie Gold of Chicago won the judges' decision over Willie Jackson in their 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden Monday night. White will meet Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, in a bout for the title next month, as the result of his victory tonight.

For the first three rounds Jackson fought like a champion. He was in and out throwing rights and lefts to the jaw while Gold most of his work inside. He let Willie throw over his head left repeatedly, which shook Willie up.

In the second White landed a few long left hooks, which shook up Willie but the latter took it right in and repaid him with interest. When the fourth round started, White rushed after Jackson and landed his gloves at Willie's head. The Chicago lad was desperate.

BOTH TEAR UP
Jackson jumped all over him and snatched him with gloves. Then White drove in a few hard punches. Willie's gloves were coming off his hands. He kept pounding away as if smacking a bespattered equiner were the best thing known. Willie kept up his good work in the sixth, splashing and slipping away at the slanted window.

Jackson went along fine in the seventh, until Willie threw a few hard rights and left hooks. Charlie really annoyed Jackson. The latter tore right in to the bell.

WHITE HITS CLEANER
In the eighth White kept on top of Willie, sending him lefts and rights to the body in rapid succession. Willie seemed content to box at long range, but once rushed Willie to the ropes. Jackson made a target of White's bad eye, shooting two in rapid succession.

In the ninth they exchanged lefts, to the face. Charlie sent left to the jaw, following it with the right. White seemed to be doing his best. Jackson kept after White, who danced out of harm's way when Jackson let go a wicked flight. The round closed with Willie sending a straight left to the chin.

A furious mixup took place in the tenth. Willie was the first to break ground after this mixup, when they indulged in a clinch. Jackson crashed two hard rights to the jaw at the bell.

JACKSON GOES DOWN
In the eleventh another mixup took place, White closing this round with two lefts to Jackson's jaw.

In the twelfth they clinched often. Jackson received a left and right on the jaw at the bell.

White set his last pace in the thirteenth, and Jackson was unable to get set for an effective blow. Jackson was floored, but rose and fought back courageously. In the fourteenth Jackson fought gamely, but his blows lacked steam. In the fifteenth round White kept punning Jackson's body, sending him to the ropes. They exchanged blows until the final gong, when the decision was awarded to White.
