WEATHER CONDITIONS
High pressure prevails over practically the entire country, the highest readings being in South Dakota, where the barometer stands nearly an inch above normal. Precipitation has occurred over an area reaching from New Mexico to Missouri and southwest to Texas, coast and a few places in New England, New York, Utah and California. Snow in the mountains of the Rocky Mountains, New Mexico and Texas. The temperature is below normal except in the Atlantic and Gulf states and over a small area in Western Kansas. The deficiency is greatest in the Plains states, where a considerable area is amounting to more than 20 degrees. Zero weather reaches southeastward to Kansas. Relative humidity at Portland—noon yesterday, 70 per cent; 5 p. m. today, 48 per cent. Precipitation, 0.00 inch. Total, 6.73 inches. Normal, 12.23 inches; deficiency, 5.53 inches. EDWARD L. WELLS.

Burgluff to Attend Meeting—An effort to establish a better system of cooperation between sportsmen and farmers of Josephine and Jackson counties will be made by Captain A. E. Burgluff, state game warden, who left Saturday to attend meetings of sportsmen's organizations of the two counties this week. Today Burgluff will attend the meeting of the Josephine County Sportsmen's association at Grants Pass and Wednesday the meeting of the Jackson County Sportsmen's association at Medford. Burgluff will urge co-operation in the protection of game birds and animals and in the destruction of predatory animals.

Forest Service Methods—An illustrated talk on the work of the forest service and its methods of fire prevention was given six times by Forest Ranger Albert Wiesendanger at James John high school Monday. At each class 50 students were present. Wednesday Wiesendanger will speak before an open assembly of the Woodstock school; Thursday at Ainsworth; Friday at Shaver and Thompson schools. He will be at Shattuck Monday of next week, at Failing March 9 and at Jefferson high March 20. Wiesendanger is speaking under the auspices of the forest service to enlist cooperation of students to leave clean camps and dead fires.
