

PRISONERS FACE FORGERY, WHITE SLAVERY CHARGES

Raymond Rice, Frank Thomas, Clarke Sullivan, Joyce Ford, and Marie Gustafson are all being held by the police while bad check and white slave charges are investigated. Rice and Thomas are charged with issuing a bad check and forgery, respectively, and the others with vagrancy.

Rice was the first arrested. He attempted to pass a \$15 check in the Meier & Frank company's store. The check was made out by Frank Thomas, who gave it to the forger, who, in turn, gave it to Rice. So Thomas and Marie Ford were also arrested.

Clarke Sullivan and Marie Gustafson, in the same clique, according to the police, were next rounded up.

White slavery charges may be filed after an investigation of the girls' trip to Portland from Spokane, the police say.

Columbia River and Coos Bay Projects Included in Bill

Columbia river and Coos bay improvements as recommended by United States engineers are included in the forthcoming river and harbor bill, according to a telegram received here this morning from Congressman C. N. McArthur.

The item for the Columbia river, recommended by the federal engineers, covers a total of \$850,000, and is for the operation of three dredges, the work in Willamette, Clatskanie and other streams, and an investment of \$250,000 in dykes as permanent channel control. A sum of \$1,750,000, recommended by the engineers for additional dredging equipment and for permanent works in channel control may be included; if not, it must be made the subject of a separate bill.

Coos bay people are asking for jetty reconstruction and harbor entrance channel deepening, but it is not certain yet that their petition has been incorporated in the United States engineers' recommendations.

INCLUDE TILLAMOOK HARBOR AND OREGON SLOUGH SURVEYS

Washington, March 1. (WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—The house rivers and harbors committee is reported to have agreed to include surveys for Tillamook harbor and for the extension of the Oregon sloop improvement in the river and harbor bill. The Oregon sloop extension contemplates no government expenditure, the work to be done by local interests. This action further signifies that army engineers will withdraw their recommendation for discontinuance of the existing project for North Portland.

Holladay School, Destroyed by Fire, Was Fully Insured

The fire at the Holladay school, which was destroyed by flames Tuesday morning, started just two and one-half hours before the fire insurance policy would have elapsed.

"But a miss is as good as a mile," said members of the school board, who turned their attention to the insurance detail after the safety of the 500 pupils and 15 teachers was assured.

Portland schools are covered by insurance until March 3, under the plan of the insurance companies in issuing temporary insurance for a 10-day period until the permanent insurance has been satisfactorily adjusted among the different companies. The first 10-day period ended at noon Tuesday, but the renewal period became effective immediately.

"The schools are fully protected," said R. H. Thomas, business manager of school district No. 1, "and the companies will carry them on for these temporary periods until the insurance is finally distributed."

This protection takes the place of the old insurance fund of the school board which on January 1 was absorbed in the general budget.

State Dictation of Church Must Not Be, States Dr. Cadman

During the late war the church allowed the state to dictate to it but it must never permit a recurrence of this mistake, said Dr. Cadman, lecturer and minister of the Central church of Brooklyn, the largest congregational church in the country.

Dr. Cadman is in Portland to lecture at the Auditorium tonight. He is en route to Berkeley, Cal., where he will deliver a series of addresses for the students of the University of California. His addresses are known as the Earl lecture and their subject is "The Church and State."

Today Dr. Cadman was interrupted for a short time as he was occupied in writing a series of articles to the Brooklyn Eagle on the Pacific coast.

"I'm telling them that I am firmly convinced that the great and glorious Pacific coast has the future of the world."

Kollock, Ted Lansing and Clarence Young. Other officers elected: Ralph A. Coan, first vice president; Rose H. Hurlst, second vice president; W. T. Vaughn, third vice president; John Guy Wilson, secretary; J. A. Beckwith, treasurer; Clarence H. Gilbert, Clarence Young and J. P. Boyd, counselors.

A congratulatory resolution was sent to Judge Northrup in honor of his eighty-fourth birthday. He has practiced more years in Oregon than any other attorney.

The committee of five to be named by Judge Tucker will formulate plans for new legislation.

National Expert on Tuberculosis, Here For Hospital Tour

Dr. H. A. Paktison, supervisor of the medical service of the National Tuberculosis association, with headquarters in New York, arrived in Portland this morning for a three-day stay, during which he will study medical and hospital facilities of Portland and Multnomah counties for the tuberculosis.

This morning he was in conference with the staff of the Oregon Tuberculosis hospital in the Sells building. At noon he addressed the Oregon Social Workers' association at its weekly luncheon, and this afternoon he visited the medical school of the University of Oregon. Thursday morning he will visit Dr. Pierce's sanitarium and in the afternoon he will visit the tuberculosis clinic of the Free Dispensary. A visit to the Open Air sanitarium will occupy Friday morning, and in the afternoon he will be taken to the tuberculosis pavilion of the Multnomah county farm at Troutdale.

Walter G. Lynn to Run for Congress, Dame Rumor Has It

Rumor has it that Walter G. Lynn, now a member of the legislature from Multnomah county, has about made up his mind to be a candidate for the Republican nomination for congress from the Third or Multnomah district. Lynn was a candidate for the Portland postmaster position prior to the final appointment of Postmaster Jones.

It is understood that Lynn, should he become a candidate, will advocate free Panama canal tolls for coastwise traffic and American naval vessels; rigid enforcement of the prohibition law so long as it remains on the books; bonus legislation as soon as possible and such tariff legislation as would equalize the cost of production between home and foreign articles, with free entry of non-competitive raw products and a revenue only tariff on imported luxuries. He advocates development of feasible water courses and harbors.

Game Law Violators Pay Total Fines of \$525 During Week

Fines amounting to \$525 and prison sentences totaling 100 days were handed out to game violators in various sections of the state during the week-end, according to reports filed at the headquarters of the state game commission today.

Harry Becker, Lewis Decker, J. C. Becker and William Smith of Coquille were each sentenced to serve 25 days in jail for having deer meat in their possession on game season.

Carl Leonard and Dan Calender of Duncan were fined \$100 each for killing deer out of season. F. C. Bow and D. G. Finney of Coos Bay Slough were fined \$25 each following trial at Marshfield on charges of hunting without license. Edwin N. Malley of Bend was fined \$25 for offering parts of game birds for sale. Dean Horton of Dimond was fined \$50 for having deer meat in his possession during closed season. A. C. Miller and J. H. Williams of Astoria were fined \$25 each for angling without license and Hub Walters of Nyssa was fined \$25 for having deer meat in his possession.

Arthur E. Evans, driver of a wood wagon, whose head was injured Tuesday night when a load of wood fell from the wagon, was sent home from the emergency hospital shortly after he was given treatment for his injuries. He was unconscious but recovered quickly.

Lawyers Will Be Asked to Donate More to Chest

Approval to the occupational method of canvass for the Community Chest was given by members of the Multnomah County Bar association at a meeting Tuesday night, who pledged themselves to the solicitation of their own profession.

The motion was made at the meeting that a committee of three be named by the president to direct the solicitation and that the committee report to Chest headquarters for complete data and instructions. Judge Robert Tucker, president of the association, will name this committee and the attorneys have declared themselves as ready to set to work among the members of the profession to swell the Chest total.

Today the Chest total was reported as \$521,635. Reports from the canvass of the medical profession are expected to be filed soon so that the totals may again be swelled.

This afternoon women workers in the campaign are meeting at the library, where they were called together by Mrs. C. B. Simmons, chairman of the residential division, who wanted to express her appreciation to all who helped. Complete reports on the work of the women will be made at this meeting.

Fred S. Norcross, Former Football Star, Visits City

Fred S. Norcross Jr., mining efficiency engineer for one of the leading mining companies, spent Sunday in Portland.

In 1906, 1907 and 1908 Norcross was coach of the football team at O. A. C. and left one of the best records ever made by a coach when he instituted in 1909 the three year system of the University of Oregon for the three years the scores were respectively 6 to 0, a victory for O. Construction Work On Sovereign Hotel To Start at Once

Construction work will begin immediately on the new Sovereign hotel at the southwest corner of Broadway and Madison streets and the building will be completed and ready for operation by September 1, according to announcement made today by Claude D. Starr, president of the Sovereign Hotel company.

The building will be nine stories in height with 100-foot frontage on Madison street and 66½ feet on Broadway and will cost approximately \$500,000.

Plans for the new hotel were filed with the city building department Tuesday afternoon by Carl L. Linde, architect, and are being checked over by Inspector Rayner.

The building will be of reinforced concrete construction with facing of Columbia ruffled red brick, manufactured in Portland, and trimming of solid sandstone.

The main entrance to the hotel will be at the center of the Broadway front. A tea room and stores will open onto Madison street and the balance of the ground floor will be used for lobby, offices and apartments for the manager and housekeeper. The eight upper floors will be divided into 72 guest rooms, each equipped with a buffet kitchen, breakfast room, bathroom and wardrobe.

Morals Squad Makes 875 Arrests During Month; Fines \$12,624

Opium, morphine, cocaine—in large quantities—whiskey, wine, miscellaneous liquors—indiscriminately called moonshine, opium pipes, bowls, lamps, gambling tables, cards, chips, fan tan outfits and a lot of interesting things were confiscated during the month of February by the morals squad, according to Sergeant Oelsner, who submitted this morning the best individual monthly report made out in a long time by any despot of the morals squad.

In the matter of whiskey—which includes moonshine—the morals squad confiscated 873 pints. Twelve skulls were destroyed. Ten tins of opium; 82 ounces of cocaine and 14 ounces of morphine were seized. They took 35 opium bowls and 18 pipes.

During February the morals squad made 875 arrests. From cases in the municipal court, activities brought to the city treasury \$12,624 in fines. The market value of narcotics seized during the month reached a total of \$55,560.

Astoria, March 1.—Caught between the giant scoop of a steam shovel and its base while working as a laborer on a construction job for the Big Creek Logging company near Knappa, John Pierce was so badly crushed Tuesday that he died at a hospital here Tuesday night. He was about 35 years old. Nothing is known of his family. It is thought that he was from Portland. He had a letter in his pocket written by H. A. Stanford at the New Foster hotel, Portland. His head was badly crushed.

Pierce was known to H. A. Stanford of the New Foster hotel as an occasional resident. Stanford said today he knew really little about him although he had lately written him a letter at Pierce's request that mail be forwarded to him.

Miss Grace Amos, Business Woman and Reform Worker, Dies

Miss Grace Amos, whose record as a business woman and as a prohibition and reform worker stands out prominently in the state, died at 2:30 a. m. today at her family home, East Twenty-seventh street and Hawthorne avenue.

Miss Amos was for many years one of the most brilliant factors in prohibition and reform work in the state. She was a member of the state executive prohibition committee and succeeded her father, the late I. H. Amos in membership on the national executive committee. She was a member of the Women's Christian Temperance union and served as its business secretary for some time. She was also for many years secretary of the Oregon Civic league. She was widely interested in educational work of the state.

Upon her father's death she succeeded him in his business as manufacturing agent and made a brilliant record as a business woman.

Her mother, Mrs. I. H. Amos, and a brother, Dr. W. F. Amos, survive her. Funeral services will be held at Finley's chapel Saturday afternoon at 3:30.

Dentist Extracted 'Wrong Teeth,' Says Damages Claimant
