

PUNISH VENDORS OF DRUGS RATHER THAN USER, WORD

Punishment to the limit of the law of traffickers in narcotic drugs, rather than prosecution of addicts, is recommended in a special report submitted Wednesday afternoon by the federal grand jury.

Thirty true bills, 11 secret indictments and nine not true bills were returned. The special report follows: "The grand jury in its deliberations has found that a large percentage of the cases that have been presented for our consideration are for violation of the narcotic laws. It is apparent to us that the traffic in drugs is growing at an alarming rate and that drastic action on the part of the officers and the courts is required to stamp out the practice.

"We are of the opinion that but little can be accomplished by the arrest and punishment of those who have become addicted to the habit, but that the full penalty of the law should be imposed by the courts upon those who are convicted of dealing in narcotics of any kind. The profits to be derived from this traffic are enormous and the imposition of fines or light jail sentences will not stop the traffic.

"We believe that if the courts, federal, state and municipal, would impose the maximum penalty upon those who traffic in drugs, it would make the traffic too unprofitable for many to engage in, and we respectfully submit this suggestion for the court's consideration."

Inglis and James Allen on prohibition charges; Mrs. Frances Krum, charged with stealing property from the postoffice while employed as charwoman, and Earl Davidson, charged with selling liquor to Klamath Indians.

Inquiry in Alleged Corruption of City Officials Suspended

Astoria, March 2.—Assistant Attorney General Liljeqvist adjourned the Clatsop county grand jury Wednesday until Tuesday. Pressure of legal business in Portland made it impossible for the state prosecutor to continue the investigation he is conducting into alleged vice conditions and reported corruption among city and county officials.

In the event that Liljeqvist will not be able to present next week, it is understood that Governor Otott will send another state official here to continue the investigation. The grand jury continued in session Tuesday night until 10 o'clock, examining in all 20 witnesses. Many more were called Wednesday. It is understood that the investigation's scope embraced various offenses from disorderly conduct to bribery and that several witnesses have testified to paying protection money to officers, while others whom they implicated denied such dealings.
