

# CABINET FORM OF STATE RULE IS TO BE INVESTIGATED

Salem, March 2.—The move for consolidation of state departments and re-organization of the machinery of the state in Oregon, which met with disaster at the hands of the legislature of 1919, was revived Wednesday by Governor Olcott, through the appointment of an honorary committee of five men to investigate the so-called "cabinet" form of government, in operation in other states.

The personnel of this committee as announced by the governor follows:

T. H. Kay, Salem, former state treasurer and a former member of both houses of the legislature, chairman.

Frank J. Miller, Albany, former member of the public service commission and former member of the legislature.

A. J. Johnson, Corvallis, president of the Benton County bank, former member of the state legislature and chairman of O. A. consolidation and efficiency commission created by the legislature of 1917.

Judge Charles H. Casey, Portland attorney.

F. I. Dunbar, Astoria, attorney and former secretary of state for Oregon.

## REPORT TO LEGISLATURE

The committee will be asked to make an exhaustive investigation into the success of the "cabinet" plan of government in other states and to prepare a report for submission to the next legislature.

The plan of consolidation submitted to the session of 1919, and which met with disaster at the hands of the lawmakers, was closely copied after the Illinois plan of government, with modifications to suit the conditions in this state.

Governor Olcott calls attention to the fact that since that time the Illinois plan has been adopted in Washington, Idaho, Nebraska, New York and other states.

"Considerable differences of opinion has arisen in states where the cabinet form of government has been adopted as to whether it is successful in its actual operations," stated Governor Olcott in announcing the appointment of the committee. "Claims have been made on both sides by the various states, some to the effect that economies have been effected by the new plan, and on the other hand claims have been made that the adoption of the plan has resulted in higher costs, larger salaries and no material increase in efficiency."

## IMPARTIAL SURVEY

"I am asking the committee I have selected to make a nearly an impartial survey as possible of the success or failure of the plan in other states, so that the next legislature may be intelligently informed in that regard. If it is discovered that the plan is a success the work of the old consolidation commission will be available for use by the incoming legislature."

"It must be remembered that in Oregon a large majority of the boards and commissions are made up of unaffiliated members and conditions in some states, such as New York and Illinois, are not altogether analogous with conditions in Oregon. But all of these phases may be gone into by the committee I have selected for an impartial report."

## OREGON WANTS BEST

"We want the best sort of government obtainable in Oregon at the least possible expense. If the cabinet form of government is superior to ours and has so proved itself, I will lend every influence I have to obtain its adoption in this state. Or the other hand if it has proved itself more expensive, less efficient and generally less satisfactory, I naturally will be opposed to it."

"The men I have selected for this committee are men in whom I have great confidence to make a careful investigation and an impartial report."

## Many Are Invited to Narcotics Meeting

Salem, March 2.—Governor Olcott has issued an invitation to all federal, state and other officials present at the recent conference on narcotics in Portland, to attend the conference of western governors on the narcotics bill in Portland, Saturday. The heads of all men's and women's organizations are also invited. The conference will be held in the council chamber of the city hall beginning at 10 o'clock.

# Vancouver Power Company Seeking Rights in Rivers

Additional water power applications have been made by the Spirit Lake Railway & Power company of Vancouver, Wash., for water power permits on the lower Toulle river and the Green river. The same company already has on file applications for power projects at Spirit lake, at the immediate base of Mount St. Helens and one of the most valuable recreational areas in the Northwest.

The company contemplates taking water out of the Toulle river at the mouth of Cold Water creek, and on the Green river northeast of the town of St. Helens, and bringing both waters to a power house at the town of St. Helens. The proposed Toulle river project would generate a minimum of 2,200 horsepower and a maximum of 24,600 horsepower. Water would also be taken out of the Toulle river below the junction of the south fork with the main river and carried to a power house on the Toulle river. The power would be approximately 17,500 horsepower.

The applications will be thoroughly investigated by P. H. Dater, district engineer of the United States forest service, who will then forward the papers to the federal water power commission at Washington, D. C., together with his recommendations.

# Concrete Warehouse Planned at Corner Main and E. Second

Plans for a one-story concrete warehouse building, 100 by 150 feet in dimensions, to occupy the quarter block at the northwest corner of East Second and Main streets, have been prepared by Clausen & Clausen for the Pacific Lime & Gypsum company in a distributing agent for the Acme Cement Plaster company, an Oregon corporation operating lime and gypsum mines near Huntington. Investments of the parent corporation in Oregon aggregate \$700,000 and its products are shipped to all points in the Northwest.

# Prayer Bands Will Offer Spiritual Aid To World Missions

The Northwest Missionary Prayer bands, a branch of the missionary department of the National Holiness association, in a three-day convention here beginning Friday, will offer spiritual and material aid to church missions throughout the world. Prayers will be offered and the collection box passed.

The prayer bands take in the territory of Western Oregon, Washington and Idaho. They are un denominational.

The program will be opened at 7 o'clock with a song and praise service to be followed by an address by the Rev. A. P. Gouthey of Seattle. Morning, afternoon and evening sessions will be held Saturday.

# \$15,000 DONATED TO AID ZIONISTS

With a gratifying measure of success crowning the efforts of the international Palestine Foundation Fund mission now in Portland, the three members of the party, Nahum Sokolow, Professor Otto Warburg and Dr. Celina Sokolow, will spend one more busy day in Portland before seeking new fields.

Intense interest in the cause of a Palestine restored was aroused among the Jews of Portland Wednesday at the council chamber, where the mayor and other officials welcomed the visitors, at the Portland Ad club luncheon, at Reed college, at a kosher dinner and at a mass meeting at the Labor Temple, arranged by the Portland Teachers' union.

\$14,000 IS RAISED

The important work of raising funds to provide a refuge for Jews in Eastern Europe was speeded by the raising of \$15,000 Wednesday. One prominent Jew donated \$1000 and several gave \$500. A noticeable feature of the response to the plea for funds was the stream of donations from residents of meager fortunes lately arrived from Russia.

Collections made Wednesday amounted to more than half of the city's quota, which is set at \$25,000. The mission hopes to raise \$250,000 in the United States and \$2,000,000 in British territory. The guardians of the fund will rely upon the United States and the British Empire for the \$15,000,000 it will need in the next two years, Professor Warburg joyfully remarked.

"We might fill a building with donated rubles, but we'd have no use."

Two luncheons and a dinner today will give Portland people who have not yet met the visitors an opportunity to hear them.

MEETINGS ANNOUNCED

Professor Warburg will speak at a luncheon of the Professional Jewish Men at the Beason hotel at noon, with Dr. Leo Rosen presiding. Dr. Celina Sokolow, daughter of the chairman of the foundation fund, and F. M. Raskin, poet and editor, will speak at a luncheon of the Portland Council of Jewish Women at the Multnomah hotel at noon, Mrs. Julia Louison presiding.

All three members of the party will appear at the complimentary dinner tonight at 8 o'clock at the Multnomah hotel. Rabbi Jonah Wise will preside and prominent men attending will include Rabbi N. E. Kruser, Dr. Richard Scheis and John Trant, British consul.

TO MEET PUBLIC

During the afternoon, from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., the visitors will meet Portland citizens at the Multnomah hotel.

The party will leave for Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., and will then return to Europe where Professor Warburg will resume his duties at the University of Berlin and Nahum Sokolow and Dr. Celina Sokolow will continue their efforts for the establishment of a Jewish homeland, having visited more than 20 states.

The mission reports excellent progress of the fund in this country. The \$25,000 quota for Los Angeles, incorrectly reported as \$100,000, was more than doubled, \$115,000 being raised.
