

PROPOSAL MADE FOR WIDENING WASHINGTON ST.

Washington street, from Front to Sixth, will take on the appearance of the main street in a Spanish town, if the plan to widen the street 15 feet on each side by arched the first stories of all buildings, proposed this morning by O. Laugaard, city engineer, is carried through.

In a report to Commissioner Barbur, it is suggested that a conference of all building owners on the street be called to ascertain their opinions on the idea. Laugaard points out that the street is too narrow for traffic, and expresses the fear that, as traffic increases, it will turn to other streets, unless some steps are taken to widen the street.

"Merchants and owners of buildings should welcome this plan," he said, "for business will leave Washington street as the city grows, unless the street can accommodate vehicles. It cannot do this any too well at present."

OWNER TO BEAR EXPENSE

The plan is for the owner of each building to stand the expense of arched, or cutting the first story of the building back 12 to 15 feet for sidewalk area. This will give Washington street a width of 68 feet between curb lines, which Laugaard says will be ample for any amount of traffic.

As the buildings are renewed, either from loss by fire or by becoming obsolete, new structures are to be built on the new property line, which will then be the inner edge of the sidewalk. The arched plan is to have the second and other stories above extended over the sidewalk area and supported by pillars. The plan, Laugaard states, has proved successful in many European cities.

RECOMMENDS ASPHALT

In the report recommendations are also made that the wood block paving between Front and Third streets be torn up and relaid with asphalt. The maintenance period for the present pavement has expired and the cost of keeping it up is excessive. That laid between Front and First streets was completed in 1911 and is costing 43 cents per yard for maintenance, while that between First and Third completed in 1903, is costing 17.3 cents. The cost of maintenance should not exceed 3 cents per square yard, Laugaard said.

Repair of the streetcar tracks in the street is also included in the recommendations made. The report says that the stone-block paving between rails is poorly kept and should be replaced, and that the rails themselves are worn out. No improvement of the street will be made until the trackage has been properly repaired, Laugaard said.

WEIGHT TESTS WILL BE

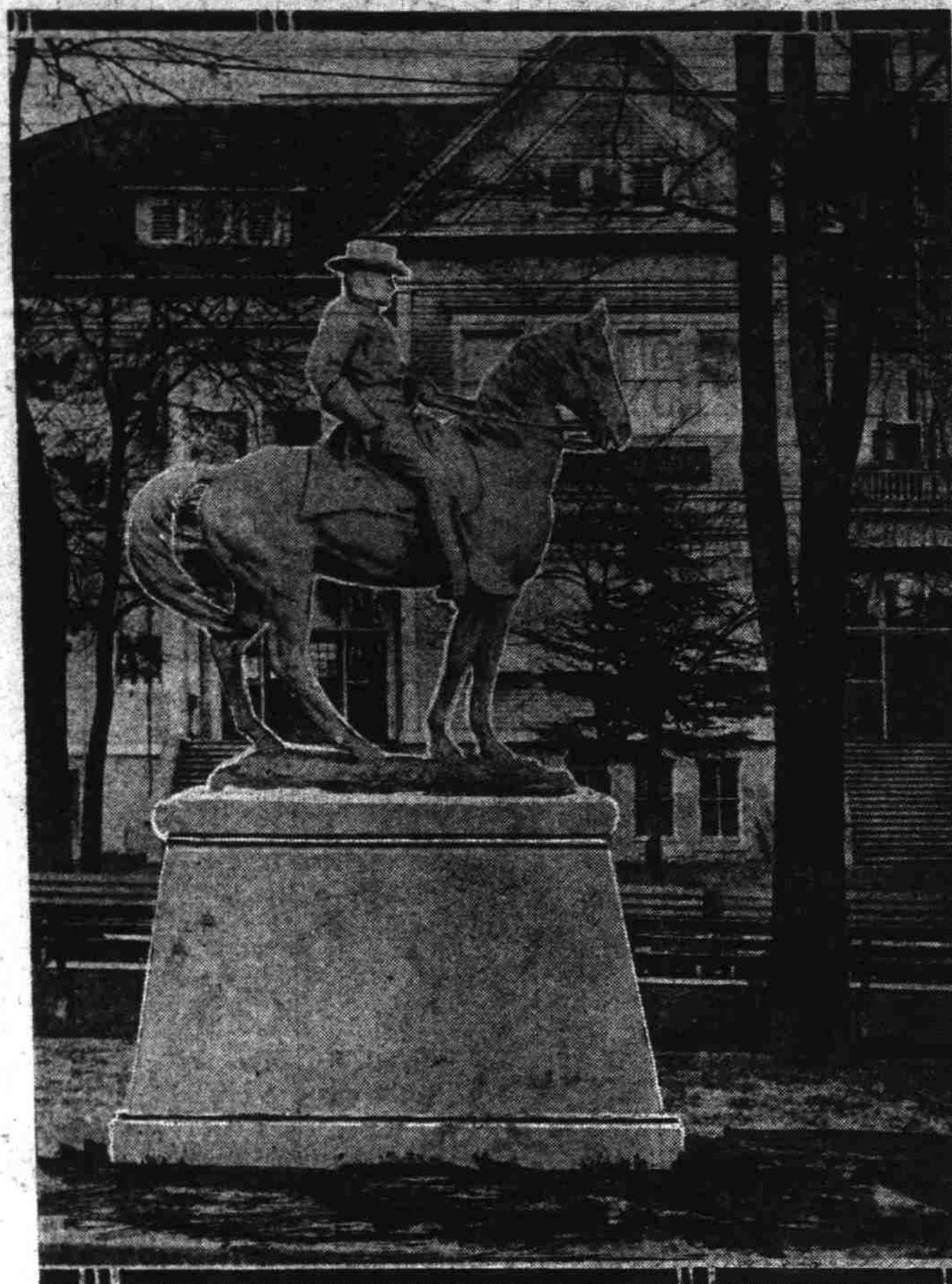
APPLIED TO AUTO TRUCKS

DEAN R. T. HICKS OF PRO-CATHEDRAL RESIGNS HIS POST

In a formal letter addressed to the Right Rev. W. T. Sumner, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, the Very Rev. R. T. Hicks, dean of St. Stephen's Pro-Cathedral, has submitted his resignation as dean, effective April 1. This announcement was made this morning by Dean Hicks. The resignation, he said, was placed in the mail Monday night, but will not be received by Bishop Sumner for some time, as the bishop is conducting Lenten services this week in Trinity church, New York city.

The resignation will not come as a surprise to the bishop, said the dean, as the two held a conference before the bishop left for New York, when the dean advised him of his intended action. The formal resignation is merely a fulfillment of his promise, the dean said.

The dean said today he intended to take a much needed rest after the first of April. He says he has no plans for the future.

"I do not want another parish for a time at least," he said. "I am now contemplating what I shall do when I leave my present position. I expect to be able to make an announcement shortly."

Friction between the bishop and dean developed at the diocesan convention held at the pro-cathedral during January. It was reported that the dean had refused to instruct pro-cathedral delegates to vote for a candidate favored by the bishop. The bishop also accused the dean of disloyalty and charged him with uttering defamatory remarks during a Sunday morning sermon. All these accusations the dean denied.

Bishop Sumner said after the trouble started that he did not hear any of the alleged disloyal remarks, but based his demand for the dean's resignation on reports furnished him by churchmen. The bishop's demand was made February 10, the resignation to be effective March 1, but was withdrawn February 22.

It developed following the bishop's demand that the dean made out a resignation February 9, but upon receipt of the bishop's demand he refused to submit it. The dean declared he would not be formally ousted.

Comment was rife at the time concerning the power of the bishop to remove the dean. The bishop contended the pro-cathedral to be his church, and declared he had power to appoint and remove the dean. The dean held that the canons of the church did not vest such authority in the bishop.

Dean Hicks came to the pro-cathedral over two years ago from Spokane, where he was dean of All Saints' Cathedral. The annual report of the parish showed that the pro-cathedral had never been in such a "flourishing and united condition for 50 years," according to a report printed in the February issue of "The Oregon Churchman," official publication of the diocese.

to be lining up against ratification unless such reservations are attached to the treaty which the Republicans do not want. Underwood will be beaten if that many Democratic votes are cast against the treaty with those of four Republican "irreconcilables," Borah of Idaho, Johnson of California, La Follette of Wisconsin, and Francis of Maryland, and with Crow absent and "not paired."

LODGE AND UNDERWOOD ARE
CONFUSED ON FACT MEANING
Washington, March 6.—The amazing ignorance of the four-power treaty defenders concerning the purpose and effect of the pact was again strikingly exhibited in the senate Monday.

Senators Lodge and Underwood, both signers of the treaty, were shown to be in complete disagreement as to what would happen to the Lansing-Ishii agreement between the United States and Japan if the treaty were ratified. Underwood contended that the agreement would be wiped out by the treaty. His statement to this effect was challenged by Senator Robinson, an opponent of the treaty, and by Lodge, who declared Underwood was mistaken. Lodge said the agreement would be nullified by the Chinese treaty, but not by the four-power treaty. Underwood finally admitted his mistake, explaining that it was "so long ago" since he read the treaties that he was unfamiliar with all their provisions. He added, however, that he hoped to see them all ratified.

This exhibition of confusion and misunderstanding by the treaty defenders served to demonstrate the wisdom of having debate on all the treaties prolonged until it can be learned what they really do mean.

SAYS FRANCE WILL RATIFY
BUT WITH RESERVATIONS

Paris, March 7.—The debates in the American senate over the Washington treaties are being followed here with great interest. This correspondence is still of the opinion that the French parliament will ratify these treaties, but not until after the United States had done so and, perhaps, following the American precedent, not without reservations.

If the truth must be told, French opinion, preoccupied with grave European problems, has never given serious attention to the Washington conference. The terms of the allied debt refunding bill have convinced France that no further understanding, sympathy or aid can be expected from the United States at least for the time being.

There is a vague idea that events at the Washington conference had something to do with this evolution of American opinion. The belief is general that the French delegation made mistakes both in matter and manner. Generally speaking, opinion supports the original French demand for 850,000 tons of capital ships as well as the French stand regarding submarines and auxiliaries.

There is a certain degree of humiliation felt that France, with its long naval tradition, should have accepted a smaller tonnage of capital ships than was allowed new-born Japan.

The original demand for 10 capital ships was not considered excessive. Moreover, people fail to understand why the delegation agreed to allow Italy naval equality with France, Italy's power and responsibility being much less. Morally, say the newspapers, the Washington treaties have diminished the prestige of the French navy and materially France has sacrificed a good share of the first line navy which she had a right to build, but practically, they add, it is doubtful if France would have been able in any case to build more than the 175,000 tons actually allotted.

Vienna Bookmakers Fleeced by Yankee; Trick Is Discovered

Vienna, March 7.—Wilbur Duba of Los Angeles, a United States navy radio operator, assigned to shore duty with the American relief administration in Vienna, has succeeded in "putting it over" on Vienna bookmakers but he got himself in trouble doing it.

Owing to the difference in time between Vienna and Paris and the slowness of transmission, bookmakers here have been accepting bets on horse races after the races were run in Paris. From this situation Duba developed a system of obtaining quick returns from the Paris races. With a friend he visited the bookmakers and placed bets in several ways to allay suspicion, taking care to win on "long shots." One win was on 135 to 1 shot.

One of the bookmakers became suspicious. Duba was arrested but was released upon parole to the chief of the communication when restitution was made. Another American was fined 10,000 crowns and a doctor's expenses for treating being called a "scholar" (professor) which is an odious epithet in Vienna.
