

INTERMINGLING OF RACES FORBIDDEN BY CITY COUNCIL

That the intermingling of colored races with white people in cabarets or restaurants will not be tolerated in the city, was the policy outlined by the council this morning when the license of R. D. Stuart to conduct a restaurant and hotel at 220 North Fifth street was revoked.

"It is degrading to think of white girls, no matter what their reputations may be, mixing with colored people," Mayor Baker said, expressing the sentiment of the council.

"I care not whether it be Japanese, Chinese or negroes—the mixing will not be allowed. Any place where such intermingling is allowed will be immediately put out of business."

"STATUTE IN VIOLATION"

Ted Lansing, attorney for Stuart, then broke in to ask the mayor if there were any statute in Oregon that prohibits mingling of races.

"Yes," came the prompt reply, "the law of decency, which we are now trying to enforce."

Stuart was charged with conducting a disorderly place where both white people and negroes were admitted. A police raid March 5 resulted in his arrest and being brought before the council for revocation of license.

In voting for the revocation, it was the decision of the council that the statute should be closed at once, but that 30 days would be allowed within which to sell the hotel.

ORDINANCE IS ORDERED

To prevent any further misunderstanding, the city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance prohibiting mixing of races at dances or in restaurants.

At the hearing Stuart said he believed in segregation of races, but that, due to bad business conditions, he had allowed a few white people to come to his place. He said in many instances he had asked the police to help him clean out the disorderly element.

EASTERN OREGON MAY GET NEW RAILROAD

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where the compact timber grouping is to be arranged.

With a guarantee of a movement of from 15 to 16 cars of lumber daily from a mill capable of producing 150,000 feet it is believed that this traffic will be a strong incentive to encourage the rail extension. No overtures have yet been made to the O. & L. according to the Malheur people, who believe the development should be pushed by the men who intend to carry on the timber development.

Extension of this rail line would mean encouragement to numerous irrigation districts now in an embryonic state. Already the Stivers river project north of Burns has been formed into a district and bonds are soon to be issued. This project includes 200,000 acres. Several smaller projects include vast tracts of land.

By the time the timber supply began to run low the irrigation lands would then be producing sufficient traffic to make the railroad a paying proposition. Henry F. Chaney of Portland has been approached by the Harney interests with the proposal of such a rail-road extension and believes that with state-wide support the development can mean a great future to Oregon and the Northwest. Chaney has studied the plan and will likely be prepared to make a bid on the development when advertisements are issued.

Man Is Accused of Non-Support of His Four Minor Children

Sheriff Robinson of Butte, Mont., appeared at the Multnomah sheriff's office this morning to take into custody Dennis McCarthy, formerly a Portland contracting company, who was arrested early in the week on a warrant charging him with non-support of his four minor children, who are living with his sister in Butte.

McCarthy told deputies who had arrested him on telegraphic warrant that

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he left Butte a year ago, putting the children in his sister's care. He said it was only a short time ago that he was able to obtain work, though, he finally did find a lucrative position and was preparing to send funds for his children's care.

According to Sheriff Robinson, McCarthy's sister has four small children of her own and is hard put to care for the eight.

BAGMAN ON TRIAL FOR MISREPRESENTING FUNDS

William E. Knepp, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, went on trial in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court today. He is alleged to have represented to H. F. Evans, a business man, that the Winkelman Bag & Bait company had \$1000 in the bank, and on the strength of this representation to have had Evans cash a \$1000 check for him. Deputy District Attorney Shockman is representing the state. Dan Mackay, for the defense, told the jury that the case in reality was a civil matter.

JOS. E. KNEPP ARRESTED

ON CHARGE OF FURNISHING

Joseph R. Knepp was arrested late Thursday on a secret indictment returned by the grand jury, and released on \$1000 bond. He is charged with furnishing on four counts in connection with the suit in equity of David Morgan, trustee vs. Clear Lake Irrigation & Lumber company, on November 28, 1929, wherein he is alleged to have testified falsely while under oath to four different questions put to him during the trial of bonds of the Eastern Irrigation, Power & Lumber company bonds for those of the Clear Lake Irrigation company.

SIX MEN AND WOMEN JURORS TO SIT IN STATUTORY CASE

E. C. Delagard went on trial before a jury in Circuit Judge Gatch's court this morning, charged with a statutory crime against a girl under 16. The 1921 law requires that certain cases must be heard by juries made up of six men and six women. This is the first case of the kind to come up in the Multnomah circuit court since the passage of the law.

JURY FAILS TO AGREE IN CASE AGAINST COLORED MAN

The jury trying Kelly Swanning, negro, with assault and robbery failed to agree and was dismissed by Circuit Judge Evans at 10 o'clock Thursday night.

Swanning was alleged to have accosted Martin Bye at Broadway and Everett street the night of December 28 and walked with him several blocks. He then took \$10 and a watch from Bye at point of a gun, it was charged.

Bye identified Swanning at police headquarters as the man who robbed him, and when he was arrested a pawn ticket for the watch was found in Swanning's possession.

Pacific University Alumni and Board in Agreement on Fund

Cooperation in a campaign to raise a \$1,000,000 endowment fund for Pacific university at Forest Grove has been agreed upon by the board of trustees and alumni association of the university, according to an announcement made by H. J. Kirkwood, president of the alumni association. Plans for cooperation were the result of a meeting of representatives of the two organizations at Hillsboro Wednesday night, it was announced.

Friction between the trustees and the alumni ever proposed methods for financing the university reached a climax at a meeting of the alumni association last week when resolutions were passed calling for the resignation of all members of the board. As an alternative it was proposed that members of the alumni association be chosen to fill four or more existing vacancies on the board. E. J. Kirkwood and H. E. Witham of Portland and William G. Hare and E. B. Tongue of Hillsboro were chosen to represent the alumni on the board, which consists of 13 members.

The association has undertaken to raise \$20,000 to meet a deficit in the 1932-33 budget and Kirkwood stated that \$12,000 of this amount already had been subscribed.

Concerts by Radio Phones to Be Given At Meier & Frank's

Concerts via the radio telephone will in a few days be a feature at the Meier & Frank company store. A high-powered receiving set, with amplifiers and loud speaking magnavoxes, has been assembled and an aerial is being constructed on the roof of the building.

Tunes by experts who are installing the set have been highly successful. Music from California stations and from Seattle were heard.

Meier & Frank's is the first department store in Portland to install the wireless phone service.

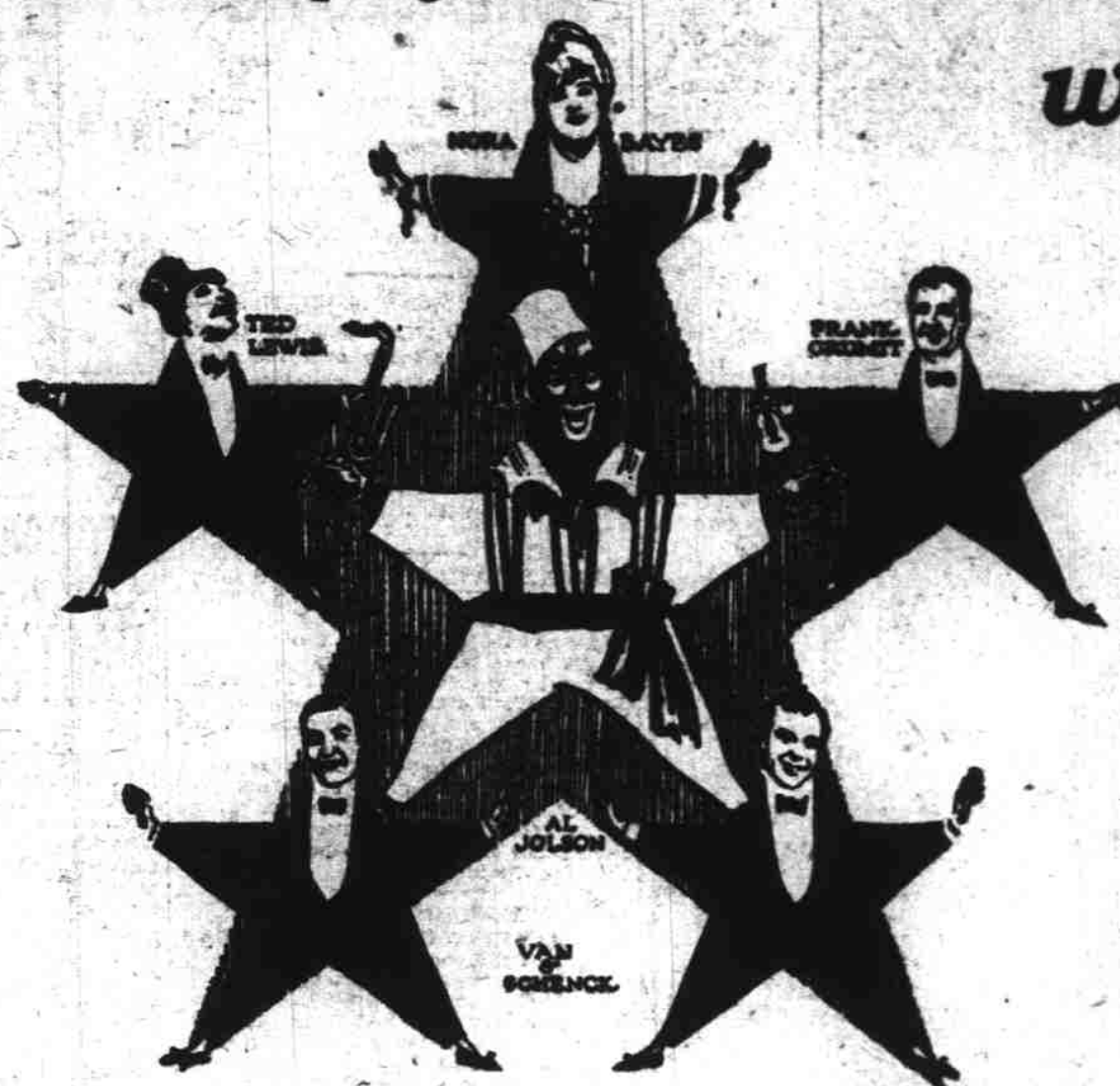
Japanese Consul to Be Dinner Guest
