A form of trimming deserving attention is the use of folds of self-material worked in many ways, such as tucking, bias bands, or various applique patterns. Half-moon organdie folds, from palest tea-rose to deep coral, trim the neck and the bottom of the skirt. The long-evaluated bodice is slightly bloused over a sash of taffeta ribbon. Endless variety may be added to the little frock by changing the girdle, which might even be of the original, novelty ribbon made of taffeta and organdie combined. 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Creepy Comedy
At Baker Is
A DelightBy C. T. H.
EVERYBODY got those "creepy blues" at the Baker theatre Sunday when the talented stock company presented the first performances of "The Haunted House." Of all the spine-chilling shrieks, rappings, clammy hands, ghostly apparitions, crime, mystery, trapdoors, shots in the dark, trails of blood, psychological deductions, footprints in the dust—the author has omitted none.

The play, which starts as an honest-to-goodness mystery story, turns out to be a side-splitting farce. But all the loose ends of mystery are cleared up cowers for the dainty lady and the voluble vamp, who fills in and out of the story, leaving destruction in her wake and almost blighting the life of every male of the cast. The play is excellently staged and acted. All the action takes place in the bungalow of a pair of newly-weds, but with this simple setting some wonderful effects are produced, what with trick lights and hidden cabinets and disappearing people.

Leo Lindhard has possibly the most difficult role of the piece—that of a best-seller author who makes a practice of living through the stories he produces, much to the discomfort of all upon whom he works. His psychological experiments when he endeavors to solve the supposed murder of the mysterious stranger lead to startling revelations. Selma Jackson as the distressed bridegroom, whose new wife disappears at the height of the murder mystery, put his usual fidelity in a hitherto untold field. William A. Lee as an all-wise detective from the city handles the part with his usual enthusiasm and Irving Kennedy as the rustic policeman adds the rural touch. George P. Webster as the bride's nervous father who had spent a summer in the haunted house and Lawrence Keating as a chauffeur complete the well-balanced cast.
