Pressure Is Shown In Cotton Trading

New York, March 16.—The cotton market was unsettled again today, but near month liquidation seemed to be a little less active and recent reactions seemed to have left futures in rather a firmer position, both technically and in relation to spot cotton in the South.

There was a renewal of pressure against March and May at the start, and after opening unchanged to 4 points lower, active months soon showed net lesses of 8 to 13 points. This carried May contracts off to 17.60 and October to 16.58, but as soon as the selling of near months slackened the market showed a tendency to rally. The principal development in the cotton mar-

The principal development in the cotton market today was the slackening in the liquidation of nearby months. This helped prices to rally after an early week spent and the recovery was further assisted in the late afternoon by reports of floods in the Mississippi vallay and by the strength in the stock market added to the recovery in grain. Merchants Exchange bids FEED OATS BARLEY

Armour Reported As Selling Wheat

(Chicago Bureau of The Journal) Chicago, March 16 .-- A narrow scalping martet was disclosed in today's trading in wheat. Lower cables caused pressure at the opening and lower prices, but some of the big locals supported the merket and forced a good return to slightly above the previous close. The bulge brought out seiling credited to Armour and thereafter it was a case of public traders selling and being forced to cover because of the commission house demand around \$1.31 % for May. Sentiment is mixed, but there are a good many in the trade who still favor the selling side on the bulges.

The domestic cash wheat situation is hardening and well posted cash handlers do not expect cash wheat to follow any further decline in futures because of the moderate stocks of unsold wheat in this market. Minneapolis reported medium grades of cash wheat 20 to 3c higher. Frimary receipts were \$47,000 bushels, compared with \$618,000 bushels a year ago.

Export demand is tame, a little continental business being worked, but United Kingdom resellers are offering wheat at 8c below seaboard interest. Liverpool spot wheat was unchanged to 2c lower and futures 1 % c lower. Busnos Aires wheat opened 3c lower. Argentine shipments were estimated at \$1,05,000 bushels this week.

Corn started lower, but there was good commission house buying on the break and prices showed firmness thereafter. Locals were the principal sellers and they were forced to cover on the bulge. Receipts of corn were light, but primary receipts were \$79,000 bushels, compared with \$41,000 bushels last year. Cash basis was %c to 1c higher. Shipping demand was light. Liverpool spot corn closed %d to 2d lower and Antwerp % franc higher.

Oats followed the trend of wheat. Trade was uninteresting and featureless. Receipts were moderate, but were in excess of last year, primary arrivals aggregating \$17,000 bushels, compared with \$47,000 bushels last year. Shipping demand was light. Sales of 100,000 bushels of oats were reported to go to store.

Provisions were higher from the start. There was buying by cash interests and by houses believed to be et was disclosed in today's trading in wheat.


