

**DECLARES NAVAL
CUT MEANS SAVING
OF \$175,000,000**

Washington, March 18.—The house committee on naval appropriations today reported that it has decided on reductions in the navy which will save the taxpayers at least \$175,000,000 in the next fiscal year.

Of this saving, \$50,000,000 will be directly traceable to the recent arms

The navy appropria- tion bill, to be reported to the house next week, will carry "under \$250,000,000." Representative Kelley, Michigan Republican, chairman of the subcommittee framing the

\$5,000 ENLISTED MEN

An enlisted personnel of \$5,000 men practically has been agreed on by the committee, Kelley said, adding that the reduction from 97,000 men, the present strength, would make for a "smaller but more efficient navy."

The commissioned personnel, Kelley said, probably will remain as is, about 61,000 officers, because of the large amount

The principal saving, Kelley said today, will be effected through the laying up or sale of thousands of auxiliary craft which the navy gathered in during the war, but which are now useless and are

DESTROYERS ARE DEADWOOD

As an example of the load of deadwood the navy is carrying, Kelley cited 300 destroyers, all of which are now in full commission, but doing nothing.

A great many useless short stationers also will be put in "cold storage," Kelley said, and only enough men left to guard them.

Kelley said that 163 destroyers will be kept in commission and the rest scrapped.
