

# COTTAGE PRAYER MEETINGS IN 59 HOMES ANNOUNCED

Fifty-nine cottage prayer meetings in prominent Methodist homes of the city tonight will formally launch the united gospel crusade in Portland. Meetings will be held Tuesday and Friday nights from 7:30 to 8 o'clock until Dr. George Wood Anderson arrives on March 30 to open the six weeks' campaign at the tabernacle at East Third and Irving streets.

Thereafter the cottage prayer meetings will be held each Tuesday and Friday morning from 10 to 10:30 o'clock.

Wednesday has been named "volunteer day" for the crusade. Over 200 Methodist laymen are expected at the tabernacle site Wednesday to help erect the building. Carpenters expect to have the framework completed by tonight and ready for the volunteers to put on the sheathing and roof. At noon the women of the various churches will serve lunch and addresses will be made by Dr. B. Earle Parker of First Methodist church and Dr. Charles MacCaughy of Centenary-Wilbur church.

# Anti-Rent-Hog Law Upheld by Supreme Tribunal of N. Y.

Washington, March 21.—The supreme court upheld the anti-rent profiteering and housing laws of New York Monday by affirming a decision of the New York courts in a case brought against the Edgemoor A. Levy Leasing company by Jerome Siegel, a tenant. The decision is in accordance with one about a year ago, upholding the law. The court's decision was 6 to 2.

The court sustained the people of Oklahoma against the Oklahoma Natural Gas company, which failed to keep the gas pressure up to standard during the winter of 1917-1918. The company must make refunds to the consumers, the court held.

Appeal was filed Monday by the government in its anti-trust suit against the American Linsseed Oil company, a case similar to the Hardwood Lumber company case in which the court decided for the government.

The American Linsseed Oil company, it is alleged, was carrying on statistical information for the purpose of curtailing production and raising prices.

The application of the state of Arkansas to be made party in the Red River boundary dispute between Oklahoma and Texas was denied.

# U. of O. Examinations Keep Students Busy

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 21.—Except for Bill Hayward's tracksters, students at the University of Oregon are confining their activities to "boning" for examinations, the second of the university year. All social functions are at a standstill. The men are doing enough training to keep in trim. Few students will leave Friday, when examinations close, for their homes to spend the spring vacation, ending April 3. The men's glee club and the orchestra plan vacation tours, the former to include Cottage Grove, Medford, Ashland, Oakland and Roseburg. The orchestra will visit Eastern Oregon.

# Man Held to Answer Mann Act Charge

Following a hearing Monday afternoon before United States Commissioner Frazer, A. C. Bains was held to answer the federal grand jury under \$2000 bonds on a charge of violating the Mann white slave act. Bains is charged with unlawfully transporting Mrs. Rosetta Cook of Aberdeen to Portland last November 9. Mrs. Cook's bond was set at \$500. She is held as a material witness. Mrs. Cook testified that she had deserted her husband and three children to live with Bains. Both defendant and witness are held in the county jail in default of bond.

# Haywood to Attend Berlin Meeting for Radicals of U. S.

Berlin, March 21.—Big Bill Haywood will represent the American radicals at an anti-Socialist congress to be held in Berlin beginning April 2, according to Moscow reports. At this meeting the three international organizations will attempt to reach a compromise, uniting them to the moderate Socialists of the world. This will include the Vienna, Amsterdam and Moscow internationals. The last named comprises Trotsky, Lenin and their Bolshevik adherents in Russia.

This "peace conference" of radicals and workmen is the result of the realization that singly each party is too weak to accomplish its aims and that to gain anything the three internationals must cooperate. The German Social Democrats, who are generally regarded as constituting the moderate party, are somewhat reluctant about taking an official part in the congress, as they suspect that the present government will be condemned along with most of the others at the meeting and that its overthrow will be recommended.

So far Lenin and Trotsky have disapproved the congress officially, but as Karl Radek has been selected to represent the Russian section of the third international at the conference, it is believed generally that the soviet government will recognize anybody appointed by the congress if Radek should accept its decisions.

# Shah in Solitary Communion? Not Yet; He's Seeing Paris

Paris, March 21.—Although the chubby young shah of Persia is reported to be in solitary communion with himself at this time of the Persian new year, Paris is hearing from unofficial sources that the youthful ruler did some of his communing Monday on the liveliest and loveliest boulevards of Paris and in the evening at a boulevard theatre.

The royal secretary informed the United News Monday afternoon that the shah would be unable to receive any visitors before Wednesday owing to the demands of the Persian rites attending the occasion of the new year. He was and would remain in the seclusion of his rooms at the Meurice.

There is to be a reception Tuesday for the well-to-do members of the Paris colony of Persians.

Parisians who remember the visit of the old shah, grandfather of this youngster, recall that the old man missed very little of interest in Paris. He even witnessed the execution of a man on the guillotine and it was in order to insure his seeing the spectacle that the poor victim's end was hastened a few days.

# Spokane, March 21.—Street car officials will place a proposed franchise for a consolidated car system before the city commissioners no later than Wednesday. It will call for a 7-cent fare.

# Voters to Pass on Franchise Calling For 7-Cent Fare

If the voters of the city reject the franchise at the special election May 2, all consolidation negotiations will be ended and the partial or total discontinuance of street car service may result. These were the outstanding indications Monday in the Spokane street car situation. Heads of both street car systems were reticent and refused to issue statements definitely as to the future of their lines in the event that their franchise is rejected at the polls.
