WEATHER FORECAST
Portland and vicinity: Tonight and Tuesday rainy, increasing southeasterly winds.
Oregon and Washington: Tonight rain west portion, cloudy east portion; Tuesday rain, fresh southeasterly winds, increasing in force.
WEATHER CONDITIONS
A low pressure area, central in Colorado, extends from the southern Platte states to Missouri, and another depression is approaching the North Pacific coast. Elsewhere the pressure is high, the highest readings being in New England and in Middle-Western Canada. Precipitation has occurred in Central California, after a heavy rain from Utah to Manitoba, and over an irregular area extending from the Lake region to Florida. Abnormally low temperatures prevail over most of Western Canada, the lowest being 28 degrees below zero at Prince Rupert, Saskatchewan. In the North Atlantic states the temperature is considerably above normal.

Highway is Now Clear—The snow and ice crews of the Columbia river highway in Hood River county, have completed clearing the winter's accumulation of snow at the full length of the department between Hood River and the Multnomah county line. Crews are now engaged in clearing the debris left by slides between Hood River and Modoc. Nickelsen thinks the clearing of the highway in Hood River county will cost approximately \$10,000.

Postoffice Patrons Indorse Bramwell—Officers of the Linn county Republican central committee and the committee-men of the Halsey precinct have united in an indorsement of Karl A. Bramwell for appointment as postmaster at Halsey. The indorsement of Bramwell followed a popular election among the patrons of the Halsey postoffice, in which Bramwell received a large majority of the votes cast. In a recent civil service examination Bramwell, Jay W. Moore and Arthur F. Robnett were placed on the eligible list for appointment to the Halsey office.

Portland Firms Get Highway Contracts—Three Cowitt contracts on the Pacific highway were let last week by the Washington state highway board. The Pacific Bridge company of Portland, which is building the new Kelso bridge, got the contract of grading the Kalama at a price of \$53,527. The Hill Construction company of Portland obtained the contract for grading seven-tenths of a mile of the highway in North Kelso, their bid being \$16,102. They were also given the contract for grading a mile of the highway within the Kalama town limits with a bid of \$24,536.
