

U. S. NARCOTICS AGENTS' PARTY CAUSE OF ROW

Alleged unbecoming conduct on the part of Agents W. R. Wood and Harry Brown, federal narcotics officers, which police say ended in a fight in the Oregon hotel Sunday morning and resulted in their being taken to police headquarters with one other hotel guest and three women, led Harry G. Smith, chief of the narcotic division on the Pacific coast, with headquarters in San Francisco, to reprimand the two officers and to issue an order for Wood to report at San Francisco to answer for his conduct.

According to a police report, members of the sextet taken to police headquarters showed evidence of drinking. They were questioned by Captain West of the second night relief, who dismissed them with a warning.

The men were taken to police headquarters after Arthur Myers, manager of the hotel, complained to Patrolman George Kelly, house detective and member of the Portland police force. Kelly, who was just recovering from injuries received in an automobile accident, immediately sent to police headquarters for assistance.

When Chief of Police Jenkins received a report of the affair, he sent a message to Smith regarding the federal officers' conduct. He received an answer Friday, telling of Smith's actions regarding the matter. Smith declared that previously Brown had had a clean record, and is one of the best men he has on the coast for getting results. He said Wood has been the cause of other complaints, and intimated that if he is unable to make a logical explanation of the affair he may be dismissed.

School Bond Issue Boosted in Parade

Roseburg, April 1.—A monster demonstration was held here Friday boosting the \$10,500 school bond issue which is being voted on at a special election today. The money is needed to supply the schools for the coming year, and if the taxpayers vote against it, several important departments will have to be taken out of the high school curriculum. Every school child in Roseburg joined in the parade, which was featured with banners and unique stunts. It was led by the Douglas county concert band.

CLEAN-UP DAY SET

Ashland, April 1.—April 4 has been set aside as clean-up day in Ashland by the city council. Already boxes and sacks of a winter's accumulation of trash are dotting the streets along which the clean-up squad will gather on that day.

Seven Taken From Klamath Jail to State Penitentiary

Klamath Falls, April 1.—Eleven prisoners were taken from here Friday in custody of Sheriff Low and four in the custody of United States Marshal Davidson to face the federal court at Portland on liquor charges.

Then men taken to the penitentiary are: Lester Hixon, larceny of horses, 10 years; Plymouth Storms, larceny, three years; Jack Haley, bad checks, two years; and Claude Perry, Earl and Floyd Haskins, larceny, one year each. Those going to the federal court were N. J. Schilling, George McGahan, Edward Dusterhoff and A. D. McCormick. J. A. Joe, local jitney operator, arrested by federal officers for selling moonshine, waived hearing Friday and also will be taken to Portland. The seven convictions are a result of the present criminal court term here.

Many Foreigners in Petrograd Hostages For Genoa Delegates

Berlin, April 1.—According to the Russian Daily Rul, published in Berlin, a large number of foreigners were arrested in Petrograd after the soviet delegates had left for the Genoa conference and were imprisoned, to be held as hostages for the red delegates. The Rul gets the story from the Krasnaya Gazeta, of Petrograd. This measure was taken, it is claimed, as the result of the discovery of a plot in Berlin after the murder of the Rul's managing editor in a Berlin lecture hall.

The soviet government officially has requested the German government to vouch for the safety of the soviet delegation while on its way through Germany to Genoa.

Urges Selection of More Adequate Site For Training School

Salem, April 1.—Postponement of construction work on the new boys training school until the next legislative session is given opportunity to make provision for a more suitable site is recommended by W. L. Kuser, superintendent of the school, in a letter to the state board of control. Kuser's recommendation is contingent upon the assurance that the \$280,000 available for the new institution will not be lost through delay and upon the pledge of opponents to the present proposed building site to support a move for the purchase of additional lands.

A site adjoining that of the present boys' institution was selected by the board of control, Governor Olcott and Secretary of State Koser concurring. State Treasurer Hoff opposed the selection as entirely unsuitable both as to character of soil and environment. The act appropriating funds for the new buildings, however, provided that the institution should be located on lands already owned by the state, which left little choice.

FACES CHARGE OF RECEIVING STOLEN GOODS IN STORE

Hyman Cohen, a second hand dealer, called by the district attorney's office the "Fagan of the North End," was indicted Friday afternoon by the Multnomah county grand jury on a charge of receiving stolen property.

Cohen was indicted on seven counts in 1919. He escaped with a fine of \$500 and a parole. The district attorney's office allowed him to plead guilty to one of the counts, dismissing the others, but Earl Bernard, who handled the case, objected to Circuit Judge Gatens allowing a parole on this one count.

Bernard at that time pictured Cohen as a man who had worked for him a gang of thieves, ranging in age from 17 to 21.

LIKE DICKENS' FAGAN

Much such a gang Dickens' Fagan had in London, he declared. When Cohen had a sale for a necklace or a picture or a rug he sent one of the boys out to steal it, according to Bernard.

Nate Cohen, Hyman's brother, is jointly indicted in the indictment returned Friday. Nate Cohen is at No. 301 Jefferson street. The specific charge is that they received stolen tools from D. Christoff. The tools were stolen from Enoch Harlow of Tigard, Or.

Christoff first entered the shop to sell an overcoat, according to information in the hands of the district attorney. He was invited back and became a constant customer. He is said to have used 16 names on the second hand store books, so as to avoid suspicion of the police.

The grand jury report closed the work of the March grand jury and it was dismissed.

DOCKET WELL HANDLED

Of the seven persons serving, five were women. Deputy District Attorney Jay Stockman, who handled most of the work before the grand jury, said that there were only a few cases left unhandled.

The docket is more nearly cleared than it has been in the last six months, he said. Crime is on the decrease, according to Stockman, who attributes this to heavy sentences imposed recently by the courts and prompt work of the grand jury in indicting accused men.

The grand jury gave its approval to the new county hospital on Marquam hill and advised segregation of the sexes at the Frazer detention home.

Urge Free Toll on Interstate Bridge

Castle Rock, Wash., April 1.—Mayor Roake, returned from a cooperative conference of civic and city organizations of Southwest Washington at Tacoma, said cooperation, particularly between the Columbia river district and the rest of the southwest section, was urged. The state highway commission was asked to complete the Pacific highway to Vancouver as expeditiously as possible and abolishment of tolls on the Interstate bridge at Vancouver was favored.

Mary Garden Gets Over Effects of California Cold

GWINN WILL SEEK SEAT IN CONGRESS

Pendleton, April 1.—James H. Gwinn, Pendleton abstractor, Friday announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for representative in congress. Gwinn has not yet prepared his platform, but indicated that his policy as a representative of the state in the national house would be to encourage the development of the west, particularly Eastern Oregon.

Gwinn has not been active in politics recently, but formerly was one of the Republican warhorses here and in Idaho, from which state he came to Pendleton. For several years he has been active in lodge work. He served one term as grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, and in recognition of his services was chosen supreme representative from Oregon. He was elected to this office a second time and is now supreme master at arms of the national organization.

Gwinn was born in Illinois and came to Pendleton 22 years ago. His father was the first Methodist missionary to Idaho, going to that state in 1871. Since 1900, Gwinn has been a continuous resident of Pendleton except for two years when he was secretary of the National Livestock association, with headquarters in Denver. He is president and manager of the Pendleton Abstract company.

400 Attend Church Reception Tendered Rev. Thomas Villers

Four hundred members and friends of the White Temple attended the reception Friday night at the church in honor of Dr. Thomas J. Villers, new pastor, and his wife and mother-in-law, Mrs. E. H. Prichard. The parlors were decorated with palms and large baskets of red tulips.

F. C. Knapp presided at the formal services where a greeting from the churches of the city was brought by Dr. H. L. Bowman of the First Presbyterian church; greetings from the educational interests by Dr. Leonard W. Riley, president of Linfield college; greetings from the Baptist churches of the city by the Rev. F. Hoffman; from the press by Marshall N. Dana, and from the Baptists of the state by Dr. O. C. Wright. Dr. Villers responded. Dr. W. B. Craven and Dr. W. A. Waldo, two former pastors, were unable to attend, but sent messages of congratulation.

Earl of Craven Says He Can't Pay Debts of His Wife

London, April 1.—The Earl of Craven, whose mother was a daughter of Bradley-Martin of New York, published an advertisement today declaring that he cannot be responsible for the debts of his wife.

Last month the earl was named as correspondent in a divorce suit in which it was shown that he had eloped to France with Countess Cathcart. In 1916, when he was but 19 years old, Craven, who was then Viscount Uffington, married the daughter of William George, town clerk of Invergoron, Rossshire.

The Earl inherited the title last summer when his father toppled off the deck of his yacht at Cowes and was drowned.

Gets Small Boost For Senate Seat

Spokane, Wash., April 1.—Republicans of Spokane, Pend Oreille and Lincoln counties have advised Congressman John W. Summers, who recently called for "a frank discussion" of his potential strength as a senatorial candidate, that he has not a chance to defeat Senator Miles Poindexter for the Republican nomination. Summers sent hundreds of letters into Eastern Washington, but so far his sounding has found little encouragement in the Northwestern part of the state, although some of his constituents of the Walla Walla district have urged his candidacy.

To Start Campaign Against Beetles

Klamath Falls, April 1.—The \$15,000 recently appropriated for combating the pine beetle pest, was made available Friday when Secretary Fall signed an agreement between the government and private timber owners providing for an equal expenditure by the owners in conjunction with the government, according to information received here. As soon as weather permits control work will start with 300 men employed.

Girl Hit by Truck; Leg Is Fractured

Teresa Little, seven years old, daughter of J. Little, No. 180 Sherman street, suffered a fractured right leg Friday afternoon when an Associated Oil truck, driven by C. V. Flanders, struck the little girl as she was crossing the intersection at Hood and Caruthers streets. She was knocked to the pavement, but the driver prevented the machine from running over her. She was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

FIGHT WITH SWORD OF KINDLY SPIRIT, CRUSADER URGES

"The church is not the maker of wounds. We are the healer of sores and irritations, and the weapon with which we are to fight is not the sword of steel, but the sword of a kindly spirit and unwavering fidelity to Christ and his kingdom," said Dr. George Wood Anderson at the United Gospel Crusade tabernacle Friday night. It was church night, and the sermon was directed especially at church members. The text was the "Swordless Crusader."

"I do not know of a single church quarrel in this city," he continued, "but if there is and you are a party to it, I beg of you to sheath your sword and ask God to forgive you before you go to bed tonight. In a church quarrel there is only one side that's wrong. That's both."

CHRISTIANITY IS CONFLICT

The evangelist implored the audience

not to sit quietly by and be content with thinking itself better off than that portion of the world outside the church.

"Christianity is not a watch tower in which one may safely sit and view the landscape o'er," he said. "It is a conflict. There is no time for idle contemplation and meditation. It is warfare. The conflict is a death battle, and never ends until the last drop of blood flows from our open veins. We are not members of the 'church triumphant.' That is in heaven. We are members of the 'church militant,' although that sounds like a joke when we look at the sleeping, careless and indifferent churches of today. The call of Christ is always a call to chivalry and a demand for the heroic."

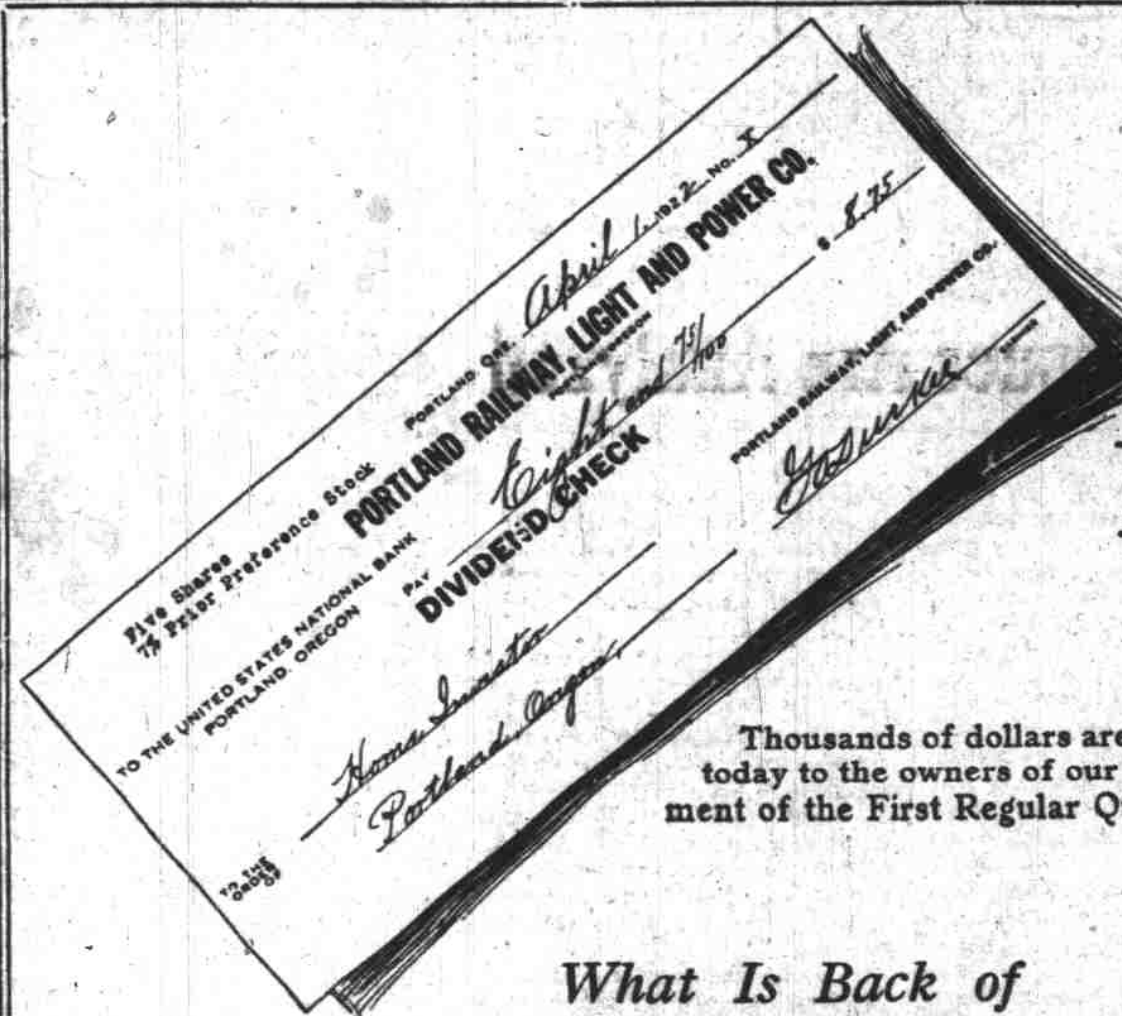
MEMBERS STAND
