

LOW BID TO CUT LEVY ON FOSTER ROAD PAVING JOB

Assessments for the improvement of Foster road, both in the primary and secondary districts, will be materially reduced by the low bid made by the contractors, Henson & Johnson, George H. Funk, city auditor, said today.

As estimated by the city engineer, the cost of the improvement from Powell Valley road to East 73d street was \$214,423. The contract was awarded for \$152,423, or approximately 25 per cent less than the estimate, which, Mr. Funk points out, will be reflected in the assessments to be levied on property involved.

The exact cost on each lot has not yet been definitely ascertained, he said. "For that reason no information can be given as to what the assessment will be, save that it will be about 75 per cent of what was originally calculated."

In the secondary district, the assessments originally ranged from \$50 to \$25, this according to Funk's statement, would now become from \$12 to \$19.50.

Residents of the southeastern section of the city are keenly interested in the improvement, A. L. Barbur, commissioner of public works, said. The civic organizations of Lents are trying to have the return of the Mt. Hood Loop road route from Boring to Foster road, instead of from Gresham along the Powell Valley road, he said.

The connecting link of the road, from 12d to 12d streets, will be completed today, Barbur said. This comprises an 18-foot strip connecting with the road to Boring.

TO DISCUSS RESTRICTIONS

IN WABASH PARK ADDITION
Residents of the Wabash Park addition will meet in conference with the city engineer and Commissioner Barbur this afternoon to discuss enforcement of the building restrictions of the district. The residents contend that in the first lots sold a restriction to erect a building to cost at least \$1500 was made but that later the restriction was abandoned by the dealer with the result that a number of shacks have been built next to lots on which there are restrictions.

WOULD BARRICADE UNGRADED

STREETS CROSSING GULCH
Erection of permanent barricades to all streets that are not graded to cross Sullivan's gulch is to be recommended as a part of the 1922 budget, O. Laurgaard, city engineer, said today. Several streets east of East 28th will be affected by the order, he said. The O. W. R. & N. company has agreed to pay 50 per cent of the cost if the city will pay the remainder. The cost has not been estimated, though Laurgaard said the present barricades, temporary in nature, need replacement.

BONDS TO BE SOLD

City of Portland improvement bonds, amounting to \$63,466.51, will be sold to the highest bidder at 11 o'clock the morning of April 12. The bonds bear 5 per cent interest and mature in 10 years. Bids must be filed with the commissioner of finance in sealed envelopes before the hour of opening.

to carry out a contract. Although the contract was never actually signed, all the board members but Director Shull believe they have sufficient grounds for collecting the \$25,000, and on this mission Director Thomas is in Washington.

Following a talk by Mayor Baker, setting forth the value of a talk by Canon W. H. Bliss of Seattle on the dangers of narcotics to high school students, the board agreed to give high school students opportunity to hear him on April 18.

The board will furnish Mayor Baker with a schedule for talks by Bliss at the different schools.

next high school to be built will have an excellent chance of being named after the Civil war general.

CALLS IT WASTE

When the committee on education recommended negotiating for the use of the old Buckman school for another year, because of the Holiday fire, Chairman Newell strenuously objected, saying that he would sooner have a one-half term school than to conduct it in that fire trap. He believed the \$2000 rental a year to be sheer waste of money, and agreed to "negotiating" only so long as it was kept in the negotiating stage.

The civic uses of school buildings for February show only 23 dances to have been held out of a total of 610 meetings. Community meetings, athletic gatherings, Boy Scout meetings were included in the uses.
