

BILLIE BURKE IN RENTAL DISPUTE; LANDLADY LOSES

Chicago, April 6.—(I. N. S.)—If it had not been for Judge Charles M. Foell, Billie Burke, the actress, might have had to leave her modest little 18-room apartment with its three baths and its garage today. The domestic stage star, who, in private life, is Mrs. Florence Ziegfeld Jr., might have had to go to one of Chicago's plebeian hotels and might have been forced to park her limousine alongside some humble grocer's gas carriage.

But Justice Foell saved the "old homestead" when he issued an injunction by virtue of which Miss Burke remains in possession of the apartment.

FOR MAY FLY
Mrs. Frank Townsend Brown, who owns the apartment, promises that "the fur will yet fly," to which Miss Burke and her attorney reply: "Let it fly."

When Miss Burke came here to fill a three weeks' theatrical engagement, she rented the apartment from Mrs. Brown. According to the stage star, the apartment was to be occupied from March 19 to April 9.

The lease, however, read to April 2; Miss Burke and the agent who negotiated the lease contend the discrepancy in dates is due to a stenographer's error. Mrs. Brown says it is "just a dodge to get out of paying a week's rent."

The lease provided that Miss Burke was to pay \$1150 for the use of the apartment.

ARREST FIVE MORE ON

**Charge of Stealing
O-W. R. & N. Passes**

Five more men charged with stealing trip passes from the O-W. R. & N. company were arrested during the night by federal officials. Two were taken here and three in Tacoma. This brings the total number of arrests up to 13. Secret bench warrants have been issued for three more men by Federal Judge Bean. The two arrested here are Vito Bavaro and V. Vimeil, and those taken in Tacoma are A. M. McInnis, Chester A. Nicholson and R. E. Nicholson.

P. G. Apple, who was arrested several

days ago in Seattle on a similar charge, pleaded guilty this morning before Judge Bean to selling forged passes obtained from W. S. Cameron and was fined \$500. Cameron, a former employee of the railroad, has been arrested and charged with forging signatures to applications for passes. Apple secured the passes from Cameron and sold them on commission. Assistant United States Attorney John Veatch told the court he had no way of finding out how many passes Apple had handled, but was certain that his operations had been extensive. Five sales were introduced in evidence. Apple gave the name of George Cody when arrested.

Electrical Utilities Meeting Convenes

Olympia, Wash., April 6.—An informal conference called by H. H. Cleland, supervisor of public utilities of the de-

partment of public works, opened Wednesday with 21 representatives of electrical companies in the state attending. The purpose is to discuss the distribution of expense in the extension of new lines and handling of unpaid accounts and to make uniform regulations.

Hard Luck Strikes Sandy Farmer Jolt

Sandy, April 6.—B. Nelson, farmer, had hard luck last week in losing stock. His first loss was a valuable six-month-old Jersey heifer. He fed the carcass to two fine brood sows, which caused a loss of 25 pigs and both sows. In addition he lost a \$200 horse Sunday, which seemed to be affected with throat trouble. Several people have lost horses in this section recently.

Man Pleads Guilty As Jury Is Called

As the clerk of the federal court called the name of the first juror this morn-

ing to try W. Vollins of Seaside for violating the Volstead act, counsel for Vollins arose and told the court a trial was not necessary, as Vollins desired to plead guilty. After a brief statement by opposing counsel, Federal Judge Bean imposed a fine of \$250. Vollins, who conducts a soft drink establishment, was

charged with selling a pint of moonshine liquor to a federal agent who is alleged to have begged for the liquor under the pretext that he was sick.

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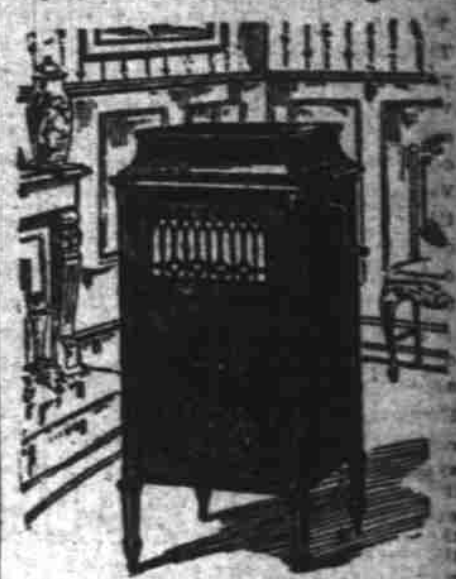
