

KLAMATH COURTS MAKE RECORD IN 3-MONTH PERIOD

Klamath Falls, April 7.—Twenty-seven years in the state penitentiary, 401 days in the city and county jails and fines totaling \$2486. This is the toll of punishment meted out by the courts here during the last three and one-half months and is believed to establish a record for convictions in Klamath county resulting in jail or penitentiary terms.

Fifteen persons, including two women, have been sent to the state penitentiary for terms of imprisonment ranging from six months to 10 years. Twelve indicted on felony charges are awaiting trial, while some 15 criminal charges are awaiting attention in the justice court.

During the three and one-half months period six persons were paroled. Of these three are said to be making good, two violated the conditions of their parole and were sent to the penitentiary, while one left the state and has not been apprehended.

Nineteen persons arraigned before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas during this period on liquor

charges were bound over to the federal court at Portland. At this time five liquor cases are pending.

A feature of the effort to check the crime wave here has been the proportion of convictions obtained and the length of terms imposed. While it was formerly whispered that even a bootlegger seldom was convicted in Klamath county courts, it is generally agreed now that culprits are "getting all the law allows." This condition is due in no small part, it is said, to the efforts of Circuit Judge C. F. Stone, who has shown a disposition to deal severely with law breakers.

Idaho Farmers Take Shot at Game Heads

Moscow, Idaho, April 7.—A rap at the state game department was taken at a meeting of farmers in this section. After considering the expenses, actions and duties of the department, on the basis of information issued by the Idaho State Woolgrowers' association, the meeting went on record favoring authority in the hands of constables and sheriffs.

WAR HERO WINS HONOR

University of Washington, Seattle, April 7.—David L. Spaulding of Hood River, Or., has been pledged to the Ballinger Inn chapter of Phi Delta Phi, men's honorary legal fraternity at the University of Washington. He is a federal board vocational service student and holds medals for bravery overseas.

COMPTON RESIGNS; LEWIS IS NAMED

Salem, April 7.—L. H. Compton, Thurnington as warden of the state penitentiary here, to become effective May 1, Compton is resigning to become head of the Hamilton Narcotic Institute, with headquarters in Seattle.

Simultaneously with the announcement of Compton's resignation, Governor Olcott announced that he would appoint J. W. Lewis, present deputy warden, to succeed to the wardenship on May 1. E. C. Halley, principal keeper at the penitentiary, will succeed Lewis as deputy warden.

Both Lewis and Halley have been connected with the prison administration throughout Compton's incumbency, which dates back to February, 1920. Prior to that he was for several months parole officer for the prison.

EXPRESSES REGRET

"I deeply regret severing my connection with the state penitentiary and the present administration," stated Warden Compton in making known his resignation. "I also deeply regret leaving the state of Oregon. For some time I have had under consideration this new connection in Seattle with the Hamilton Narcotic Institute, a \$600,000 corporation, organized for the purpose of the treatment and cure of narcotic addicts.

"I became particularly interested in this work when Governor Olcott inaugurated his campaign in the Pacific Northwest against the use and sale of narcotics, and have followed its development very closely. I believe, in my new field, a great work can be done along this line, and it is only for the reason that I feel greater accomplishments can be brought about in this field that I finally determined to leave my present position."

"For the last week I have been in Seattle perfecting arrangements in connection with the new institute, and will devote my entire time to that work."

GOVERNOR PRAISES WORK

Governor Olcott expressed keen regret at Warden Compton's decision to leave the prison.

"He has effected some wonderful improvements at the institution," said the governor. "The physical plant and the morale of the men both have been developed to a great degree under his management, and I am deeply sorry to see him leave. Mr. Lewis informs me that at the same organization and policies maintained by Warden Compton will be continued under the new management. The prison management, both as to its internal workings and the small number of escapes during Mr. Compton's handling, has been exceptionally good and deserves warm commendation."

Government Plans New Mail Routes For Grant County

Washington, April 7.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—The postoffice department informed Sinnott it plans new bids for three star routes in Grant county, Oregon, in which a large part of Eastern Oregon is interested. The conclusion has been reached, it is stated, that service may be given from Dayville to Prairie City instead of from Canyon City, leaving Dayville early enough to dispatch mail by train at Prairie City.

In the meantime bids will be asked for three times a week service between Dayville and Mitchell, and six times a week from Hamilton via Monument to Kimberley, where connection will be made for Posell and Dayville, also for service between Long Creek and Mt. Vernon or Canyon City.

The route between Beech Creek and Canyon City will be decided on basis of the lowest bid whether by Long Creek to Canyon City or Long Creek to Mt. Vernon.

Bids upon which the entire program is based will be received up to May 2, the department expressing the view that since construction of the John Day highway patrons will not be satisfied to have mail from the afternoon train at Prairie City stop at Canyon City.
