

MME. GALLI CURCI GEMS TAKEN BY BLONDES, BELIEF

San Diego, Cal., April 7.—Mrs. Galli Curci, noted concert and opera singer, was confined to her hotel suite this morning, in an effort to recuperate from the excitement and anxiety caused by the theft of her jewels at San Juan Capistrano yesterday. The jewels were valued at between \$40,000 and \$75,000.

The diva was reported to have rested well, but would not grant an interview. She will fill her engagement this evening here tonight, and continue on to Los Angeles for a concert Monday. It was announced.

Mrs. Galli Curci's maid, Mrs. Mae Hendrickson, had possession of the missing jewels, which were in a jewel case described by Homer Samuels, the singer's husband and accompanist, as a little larger than that of a portable typewriter, of dark blue leather and having a gold clasp.

Samuels said that the jewels were partly covered by insurance. Included in the missing gems were several of his wife's valued for above their intrinsic value. One was a gift from Queen Victoria of Spain, another from Queen Maria Christina, mother of King Alfonso VIII.

Local police were busy today working on the case, but were handicapped because so many persons were in the case at San Juan Capistrano at the time the jewel case was taken. This was left in the women's rest room, carelessly, by Mrs. Galli Curci's maid. It was three quarters of an hour after the maid left the jewel case in the rest room that the diva noted that Mrs. Hendrickson did not have the valuables with her. This was after the party had finished lunch.

A thorough search was made, but no trace of jewels or case was found.

A meager description of two blonde women, one taller than the other, was the last clue given the authorities to work upon. These two women were said by the maid to have been in the rest room at the time she left there to return to the dining room. Stages arriving here were watched up to a late hour last night, but no trace of the missing jewels had been discovered.

Samuels stated last night that in all the years that Mrs. Galli Curci has been appearing before the public this is the first time she has ever suffered a serious loss by robbery. The list of jewels furnished is only partial and was made from memory. Samuels plans to get in touch with the insurance company at once and believes that it will offer a reward for the recovery of the jewels.

The diva's maid has been with her for five years and the singer's husband and also her manager expressed the utmost confidence in her honesty.

12 U. S. Hunters Get 145 Coyotes and Five Badgers Last Month

The highest March average on record in the predatory animal activities of the United States biological survey was reached this year with an average of 18 coyotes per man east of the Cascades.

During the month 12 men trapped and hunted predatory animals for 355 days, capturing 145 coyotes and bobcats and five badgers in this time.

Harold Dobyns secured the highest number, with 39 coyotes in 23 days to his credit. Albert Peterson was second with 24 coyotes. Both these hunters are working in Umatilla county, which will mean an immense reduction in loss of lambs by coyotes this spring in that particular section, says Stanley G. Jewett.

In Malheur county 17 coyotes were trapped alone. Hunters have now discontinued all poisoning operations because of stock being turned loose on the range, and are using every precaution against the poisoning of stockmen's dogs.

In the poisoning of coyotes large numbers of magpies and crows have also been killed. The magpie is considered almost as destructive to game and stock as the coyote, according to Jewett. Each spring the magpies destroy thousands of birds' eggs, to say nothing of picking out the eyes of young lambs.

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Declaration of Hall For Governor Filed

Salem, April 7.—A clean American business administration" is the slogan under which Charles Hall of Astoria will seek support of his candidacy for governor before the Republican primaries next month. In person he filed his formal declaration here Thursday morning.

Hall promises "To administer state affairs in the interest of all people; reduce taxes; urge budget system; substitute departments for useless commissions; improve marketing facilities; aid farmers' credits; equitably adjust automobile taxes, using gasoline tax for highways only; treat fairly employers and employees; further good roads; favor compulsory attendance in primary grades and teaching pure Americanism to all pupils; oppose Japanese land ownership or control, and strictly enforce the law."

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CRUSADER DAMNS SELFISHNESS AS BASE OF ALL SIN

"Selfishness is at the bottom of every sin and selfishness is responsible for every failing life," Dr. George Wood Anderson said at the United Gospel Crusade tabernacle, Thursday night.

The audience was the largest week-night crowd since the meetings opened here. Thursday night was "men of the church night." The men turned out in greater numbers than the women of the church did on Wednesday night and provided the first real enthusiastic service of the campaign.

Tonight is young people's night, when a larger crowd is expected. Centenary-Wilbur church stood behind the pastor and brought 200 men to the tabernacle as had been previously promised. Large delegations were also present from the Rose City Park, Sunny-side and Laurelhurst churches. The men enlivened the meeting by giving original yells and songs. Special music was also furnished by Walter R. Jenkins, musical director.

The crusader's sermon was directed against the church patriots who cannot be stirred to the battle for God against sin.

"Everything that God has control of is busy," he said. "Something always happens when the forces of God start to work."

Tonight the crusader will join with the young people of the Epworth leagues to a parade through the downtown streets which will terminate at the tabernacle at East Third and Irving streets. The young folk will give their yells and songs and Dr. Anderson will preach an appropriate sermon.

All Methodist Sunday school superintendents are asked to attend tonight's service also, and to be present at a brief conference at 9 o'clock, when next week's program will be outlined.

Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock Dr. Anderson will hold his first meeting for children. Walter Jenkins will also teach the children new songs.

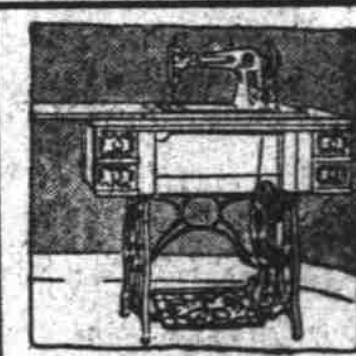

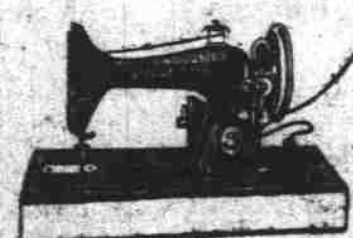

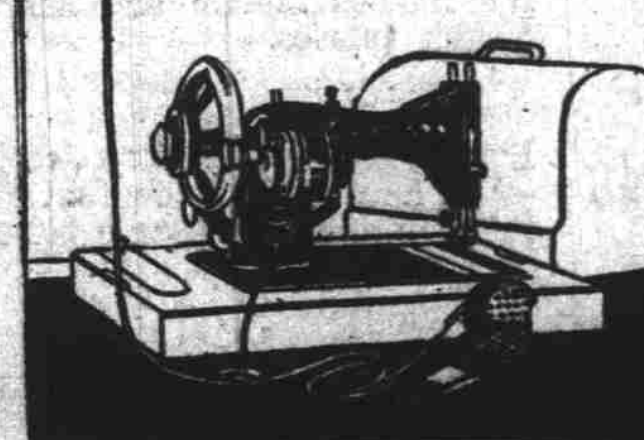
